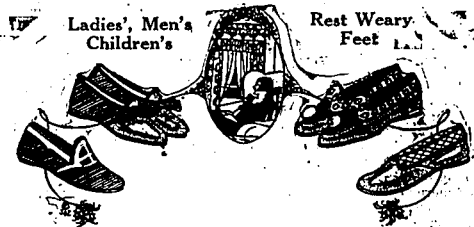

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AHERN GETS \$19,863.89 IN ACTION

Engineer Who Collected Data and Held for Idaho Central, Is Worked by Jury to be Person Responsible for Securing Certificate for Which Joseph L. Stewart Received \$25,000.

Verdict for the full amount claimed, \$19,863.89, with interest at seven percent from April 24, 1922, a total of \$19,863.89, was returned in a sealed verdict, opened this morning in the district court in the case of Earl Ahern against the Idaho Central railroad company. E. V. Larsen and Harry Boudt represented the plaintiff. The contention of the plaintiff, which was accepted by the jury, was as follows: Ahern, anticipating the ultimate construction of the road to Wells began in 1914 to work on surveying and collection of data and continued this for a period of six years, when he came to an agreement with George J. Davis. He continued to work for Davis on agreement two years ago. Based on this a certificate of convenience was received from the interstate commerce commission for the construction of the Idaho Central

line from Roseburg to Wells. The ownership of the line fell into the hands of stockholders, of whom the principal one was Joseph L. Stewart, and their interest in a committee here, with consent of all to buy Stewart and the original stockholders received \$25,000 for the certificate and the jury verdict amounts to a statement that this was made, in whole or in part, by the work of Ahern, in the opinion of the jury.

Ahern Is Guilty. When seen by a representative of The Times, Mr. Ahern said: "Needless to say, I am terribly happy. The verdict has touched me so deeply it is impossible to put my appreciation into words.
