KAPLAN WINS DECISION IN TAME FIGHT

Flyweight Champion Defended Title Against Herman in Bout Experts Boomed and Hissed at and Which Proved Extremely Tame, They Say.

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—"There are a couple of old men who ought to be back to work and not soon of this easy business," Jimmy Johnston, the top-hand of Broadway remarked today. "One of them is old man Kaplan and the other is old man Dunlop."

Johnston's opinion reflected that of 10,000 fans who sat in on a terrible 16-round bout in Tex Hickenham's garden last night. Jimmy Johnston, Kaplan and Babe Herman for the world's featherweight championship. Kaplan received the victory on the two judges and referee, but draw would have been more appropriate, as neither of the fighters was demonstrating of any kind of a campaign.

Kaplan became the recognized champion of his class when the New York boxing commission organized tournament among the contenders to find a successor to Johnny Dundee, resigned.

He was accepted as the best of the lot and perhaps he is still the best man of his weight, but he is the champion of a terrible class of fighters.

All the class that Kaplan showed as a fighter last night was a heavy scowl on his face and Herman showed fear. The champion inflicted and mauled Hickenham through 12 of the 16 rounds, but he was not moving forward and it was a disadvantage, no doubt, that prompted the officers to give him the decision.

Awarding points on the scale, Kaplan had 12 of the 16 rounds. He narrowly escaped being knocked out in the tenth and fourteenth rounds, but he covered up and retreated when Herman failed to follow the opening.

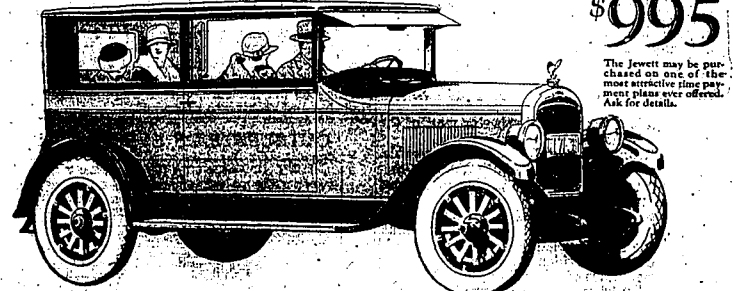

DO YOU KNOW IDAHO?

Idaho rallies—she is coming back! Fertile plains and river valleys, pouring out their wealth in farm crops; rugged mountains yielding from their inner fastnesses seemingly unlimited quantities of valuable metals; hillsides holding boundless lumber stores of the future—these, all combined, shout the challenge of the potential Idaho of the future.

Chambers of commerce of Idaho, realizing that an era of sudden growth for the state is at hand for the asking, have succeeded in bringing business men, farmers, miners and lumbermen under the standard of the Idaho chamber of commerce to work for the welfare of the commonwealth.

Principal men of the state, who believed themselves to be familiar with Idaho and her possibilities, said they were amazed at the potential resources as described in the several addresses.

Perhaps others in the state are equally unfamiliar with its resources.

Do you know Idaho? Idaho is believed to hold within her boundaries the greatest treasure of natural resources held by any state in the nation. During the year just rounding to a close, she has produced a total of \$224,412,000 worth of materials. Lumber contributed thirty-five millions to this. Mining contributed thirty millions, and the farmers produced the remainder.

Would you know Idaho's mines, her farms, her forests and playgrounds?

Idaho, according to Ravenel Macbeth, secretary of the Idaho Mining association, has the greatest variety of non-metallic minerals of any state in the Union.

There are vast phosphate deposits in the southeast, of which 110,000 tons were shipped to Anaconda and San Francisco last year. But for the huge deposits in Florida, naerer to water transportation, Idaho would be feeding the world phosphates.

State deposits in Blaine county are called the most magnificent in all the country. The states are there in tall corners.

Idaho has more limestones than any state in the west. Her building stone is excelled only by that of Vermont.

The only deposit of commercial asbestos west of the Rocky mountains is in Idaho.

Only Vermont competes with Idaho in black marble. Idaho has 44 counties. Of these 36 have minerals, and of these 18 have producing mines, according to Stewart Campbell, state mining inspector.

Idaho has a greater diversity of mines output than any state in the country. She has produced minerals worth more than one billion dollars since 1860, has paid out five million dollars in dividends and brings into the state an annual expenditure of six million dollars.

The Gem state ranks second in lead production, and turns out one-third of the lead mined in the United States.

Idaho is fourth in silver production and eighth in gold. Her zinc output is second in the nation. Prospect of oil and gas production in the near future is not a remote possibility.

So much, briefly, for Idaho's mines. Idaho's farms produced a crop valued at twenty million dollars in 1900. By 1910, under the influence of irrigation, the crop had a valuation of one hundred million dollars, and four years later it had jumped forty millions. In 1918 the crop was valued at two hundred forty million dollars, and in 1925, after Idaho has recovered from the post-war deflation, the crop is valued at two hundred and twenty-five millions of dollars.

Idaho has the argest stand of white pine timber in the world. Lumbering, one of the state's principal industries, is even yet in its infancy. The most of Idaho's timber wealth is untouched, virgin forest, waiting for the axe of some future woodsman. Idaho's lumber production for 1925 amounted to thirty-five million dollars, and that hardly left a dent in the vast forests.

Did you know that the Snake river valley is more fertile than that of the ancient Nile?

Almost everyone knows something of Idaho's scenery and her lakes and streams, which afford great sport at fishing. Idaho's mountains are called the grandest in the country. The placid lakes, and rippling streams beckon to the sportsmen of the country, while her forests are plentiful with game. Idaho's Snake river has greater possible power development than the Muscle Shoals project in Alabama. The estimate of hydro-electric possibilities in the state is set at two million five hundred thousand horsepower, and of this vast amount there is but 298,837 horsepower in use in the state when all switches are turned on at one time.

Do you know Idaho? In order that the people of Idaho may know their

own state, and become first to tell people in other states about Idaho, the executive committee of the Idaho chamber of commerce will meet in Boise late in January to devise ways and means to sell Idaho to Idahoans and thereby sell it to the world.

The result of their deliberations may only be hazarded. At their last meeting, speakers sketched briefly the manner in which Idaho people might be informed of the outstanding things in their state.

It was suggested a speakers' bureau be established by each of the three divisions of the state chamber of commerce. The plan proposed was that the speakers endeavor to appear before all chambers of commerce in their district, and then, speak before chambers of commerce in other districts. Each group of speakers would cover the activities of their section of the state, under the proposal.

Another plan was to create a director of publicity who would be instructed to endeavor to work in harmony with the state's industries, in compiling reports to be released to the press. This, it was explained, would be a means of spreading information concerning the good things in Idaho.

But the executive board preferred not to take any hasty action in the matter and adjourned to give more thought to the manner of outlining the plan to put Idaho on the map.

Meanwhile the directors are endeavoring to interpret the feelings of the people of Idaho toward the plan they have been elected to promote and the three from each district are appearing before chambers of commerce within their jurisdiction for the purpose of explaining the purpose of Idaho chamber of commerce more fully.—Statesman.

SURTAX REDUCED ON MAIL ORDER HOUSES

The 133 democrats, nine republicans and five independents in congress who voted last night for the motion of Congressman Rainey of Illinois to recommit the tax bill with a view of fixing the maximum surtax at 25 per cent instead of 20 per cent, and to offset the increase in revenue by cutting taxes elsewhere are to be congratulated on their votes. The surtax is at present 40 per cent. It should be reduced proportionately with other taxes but certainly not more.

The principal backers of the low surtax rates include the great mail order houses of America. After the war, Congressman Ira H. Copley of Illinois insisted on reducing these rates because he said they bore with undue severity on the mail order houses and let the small merchant escape practically unscathed. He pointed to the fact that since the levying of these taxes during the war, the complaints on the mail order houses and let the small merchant escape practically unscathed, because competition was not dangerous from that source, when loaded with the heavy surtaxes on large aggregate profits.

Of course, a reduction in the amount of revenue collected is needed, for a surplus breeds extravagance, but the present bill, while it has good features, is far from perfect and bears too heavily on the small man while easing up on the very rich. On final passage only 10 democrats voted against the bill with the same number of republicans and the five independents. The law will likely be amended in the senate and this fact probably constitutes the reason why the democrats did not seek to delay the passage of the measure, which was inevitable from the first, beyond seeking to recommit.

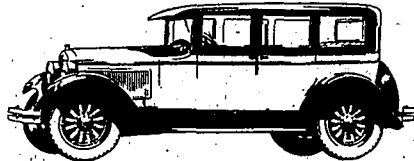

It was his story to fall like a bomb on the latter presidential ear. Some say that, from the minute he heard it, the national executive favored saving the

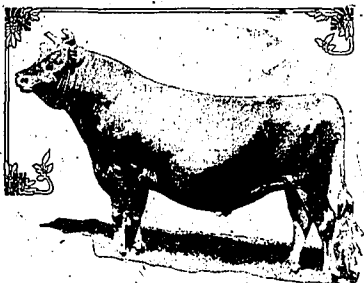
Italians better terms. But that's a joke.

Of course this is the latest version, Volpi being one of the few Italian statesmen or Mussolini's assassination wouldn't have been attempted a few days ago.

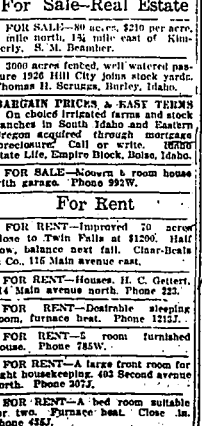

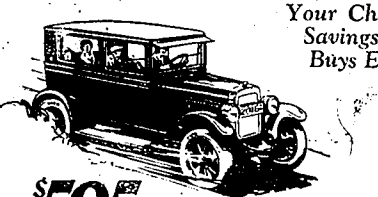

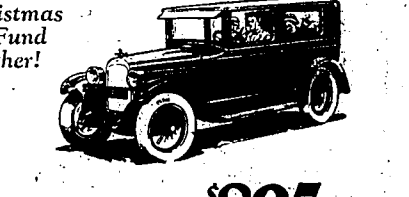
