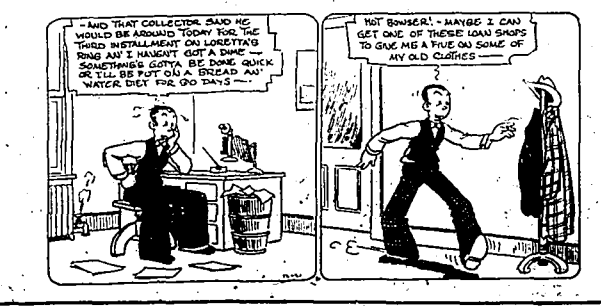

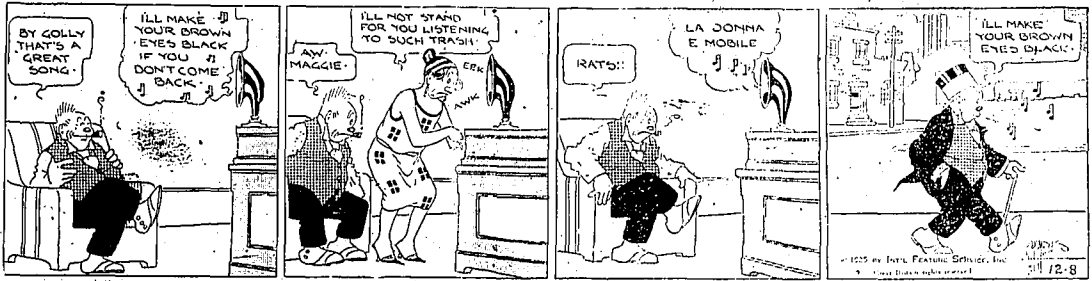

Bracke conducted the solo part of "The Holy Virgin Shall Conceive" and this was followed by an aria, "Oh, Thou That Deliverest," Nelson Hayward sang in Rock. "The Herald Angels Sing," the bass solo part. He rendered a solo, "The People That Walked in Dark Night" in melodious fashion and most favorable comments were heard later by the audience as they passed out.
