MOSCOW, Dec. 29.—Leaving his last poem scribbled in blood, Serge Essenin, eccentric poet, husband of Isadora Duncan, today committed suicide in Leningrad.

Isadora Duncan, once famous dancer, married the Russian poet in 1922. He was many years her junior.

For a time the romance lasted and Essenin was famous in the circles of the young Russian poets.

After their marriage Essenin had a black eye on one occasion when he fell to his death.

After their separation, Miss Duncan in Idaho, investigated for sale of her property she had received in earlier years, but as far as is known, no report was made.

Essenin was possessed of an unbridled spirit which depicted into something akin to madness under the influence of drink, and it is believed that this failure was the primary cause of the breach between them.

TWIN FALLS, Dec. 29.—The joint session of the boards of commissioners of the Dravo Construction company and the joint board of commissioners of the Idaho State Board of Commissioners, Judge J. A. Walters, stated that the company had met with the success made by the commissioners at the last session.

The supplemental report is in the effect that the company will build at its own expense the bridge on the north side. Instead of a 30 year franchise with returns at 11 per cent, the company had secured a 20 year franchise with 12 per cent returns. It is the result that the returns shall fall below 12 per cent every year, the term of the franchise shall be extended to 20 years, the last year of the term shall have provision to change tolls annually in order to make up the 12 per cent return.
