Grandstand at Pasadena Collapses With Big Toll

MANY INJURED Hospitals Report That More of Victims of Crash May Succumb

PARADISE, Calif., Jan. 2.—Tragedy was a sorrowful reminder of the 1925 earthquake at Pasadena for the first time since the floral parade was inaugurated 11 years ago.

There were three dead and it was feared the toll would mount higher, as several of those in hospitals were in a critical condition.

Two persons died from injuries received, when the street became crowded, burying more than 200 persons in a mass of broken timbers and twisted steel.

Another woman was killed from shock received while witnessing the terrible tragedy.

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Countess Brings Suit On Secretary Kellogg

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Countess Katherine Karolyi of Hungary, today filed suit against Secretary of State Kellogg in District of Columbia supreme court, asking a judgment to compel Kellogg to instruct the United States ambassador in Paris to request permission to allow her to enter this country.

The Countess, dated October 15, 1925, asked that she, as a woman, be allowed to enter the United States, the passport application having been refused.

Kellogg, under certain instructions has ordered the Paris consular office to refuse a visa on the grounds that she is not a woman permitted to enter the United States.

Witnesses' testimony followed Kellogg's explanation, taken by the court. The Countess was backed up by President Coolidge and stood by the action.

MOTOR CARS ON INCREASE

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—More than 20,200,000 motor vehicles were registered in the United States in 1935. The gain over 1934 was 2,477,785, or 13.9 per cent. The total of passenger cars was 17,658,017, an increase of 2,132,756 over the previous year, while the commercial vehicle total was 2,565,769, an advance of 344,955.

The figures, collected by Motor magazine from all states, with part of December estimated, show the second largest numerical gain ever recorded although the percentage increase was the smallest. The record year in point of numbers was 1923 when registrations leaped ahead by 2,012,835.

Comparison of retail value figures for the United States this year with the gain in registrations indicates that more than one million ancient vehicles were scrapped or taken out of use.

There were an especially spectacular numerical gains by states. New York has the distinction of being the first to pass the 1,500,000 mark with a 14 per cent increase in cars and trucks. It now has in operation nearly three-quarters as many motor vehicles as all of Europe combined.

California still is New York's closest rival, but it slipped this year, showing a gain of only 2.3 per cent, as compared with 2.1 last year. Its total is 1,444,000.

The other states in the more than one million class are Ohio with 1,250,000; Pennsylvania with 1,227,000; and Illinois with 1,226,600. Kentucky next are Michigan with 923,000 and Texas with 927,000. In eighth place is Massachusetts with 774,000. Indiana is ninth with 719,000 and Iowa tenth with 623,000. The others with half a million or more are Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey and Wisconsin.

Florida leads the field in percentage of growth with 16.1 but its total is only 291,400 although this does not include cars operating in that state with license plates from all parts of the country.

The most highest percentage gains, in order, were: Oklahoma, 33.6; Mississippi, 24.7; Alabama, 23.7; Tennessee, 21.2; and Montana, 20.1.

BRIDGE BOND TO BE FILED HERE TODAY

Attorneys Drafting Terms; President Bears of Portland Bridge Company Will Talk Tuesday Night at Banquet on Various Matters About Structure; 125 Carloads of Material to Be Used.

Attorney John H. Hodge, in behalf of H. Murray and Oregon Trust Co., Portland, has filed the joint bonds of commissioners as work on the structure, Oregon Trust Co. is in charge of the work. The bond will be carried on the bond, it is understood, will be purchased from Stuart H. Taylor, bond broker. The agreement with the state made early this morning in Portland, will be a final agreement, said H. Hodge, president of the Portland bridge company.

President Bears declared that the matter of the bonding was a small one and that the bonds would be filed within ten days. He said that it would take a great deal of work to get the details worked out and that the company would start Monday morning for the project. "It will take 40 carloads of steel, 12 cars of equipment and ten cars of lumber with other material which will bring the total number of cars to be shipped in up to 125. There will be employment for a great many men, including the men who will be employed to get these and as many skilled workers as possible in Twin Falls. The best of the different departments will be brought in by course. When we start work with the steel work, we shall use about three cars of steel, or 40 in all. We shall start on an early date, putting up the material first. If necessary, we shall start on the steel work as early as possible. Much of the detail work of computation will be done by Engineer Murray, who has secured the franchise and for whom the bridge will be constructed. Mr. Murray emphasized the fact that the material would be up in schedule the time that that work would be pushed as fast as possible. It is understood that the steel comes from Portland.

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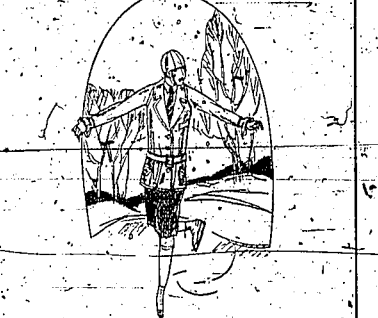
