FIELD WICE WARNING GIVE OUT

Horticultural Inspector Gipson Asks Orchardists to Watch Out for Pest and Combat Them Should They Appear; Poison and Preventatives Are Recommended.

Orchardists over the state should make immediate investigation if there is any evidence of pest work, as it should take steps to eradicate this pest. The County Agent carries the necessary supplies, alkaloids as well as arsenicals, which is available at cost from resident county headquarters at Boise. It was asked today by E. V. Gipson, horticultural inspector here, he quotes from the U. S. department and university extension as follows:

Control of Field Wice.
The injury to trees and shrubs consists in the destruction of the bark, just at the surface of the trunk and in some instances for several inches above or below. When the stipules are complete and the cambium entirely eaten through, the girdling of the trunk and wind soon completes the destruction of the tree. If the injury is discovered before it is too late, extensive pruning of the trunk will usually save the tree. In any case of injury by wice, heading up fresh soil so as to cover the wound and prevent evaporation is recommended as the simplest remedy. To save large trees better grafting may be employed.

The presence of field wice is indicated by their many runways and trails which are usually on the surface of the ground under dead stumps, weeds or other trash.

The first signs in protective treatment by wice is orchard sanitation. This is done by cutting off the stems of all dead trees, weeds and other trash in and about the orchard, especially in close proximity of the trees. It is recommended that the work in open places, if this has not been done and the wice have infested orchards the best means of destruction is by poisoning and then cleaning all vegetation, dry grass and other trash away from the trees for a distance of about four feet and destroying all litter in and about the orchard.

The following poison formula, developed by E. E. Hindsdale, University, is recommended:
Directions for Poisoning.
Mix 1 1/2 pounds of clover starch in 1/2 pint of cold water, and add into a pint of boiling water to make a clear paste. Mix 1 ounce of powdered strychnine (1/1000th part is 1 milligram) of talcum powder and stir with the paste to a smooth, creamy mass free of lumps. Stir in this 1/2 pint of rain water and 1 1/2 of an ounce of saccharine and 1 tablespoon of glycerine. Apply to 15 square of 50 pounds of wheat and immediately to each kernel.
Distribute the poisoned wheat over the infested area, scattering it thinly in loose piles and in the open spaces. The poisoning is best so effective, when it is carried out systematically so that an insect (wice) is not able to find any clean wheat to get the poisoned bait directly into the easy runways.
If any orchard is badly infested with field wice I advise that it is thoroughly treated immediately with poison as given above, because if the wice are not destroyed now, they are likely to destroy many fruit trees by girdling them the week under cover of snow this winter when it would be difficult to operate against them.

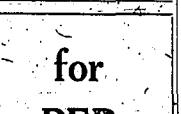
