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



CARPENTIER MUST SHOW HIMSELF FIT

New York Boxing Commission Says French Champ Can Fight When He Exhibits a Worthy Comeback After Bad Showing Here Last Time

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—George Carpentier will not be allowed to take part in another big fight in New York until he shows himself on his proper combat level and worthy of a big prize. It was learned today.

After his license is revoked by the New York boxing commission, Carpentier, who is to arrive here today, will have to undergo a medical examination or he may be asked to engage in a test bout against a first class opponent.

Carpentier's plans are not known here. Tex Rickard said he had rebuffed him an offer to meet Jack Dempsey, the lightweight, light-heavyweight contender with the present title in a championship match against Paul Bercebach if he defeated Pelaney.

Rickard said he "repeated" that George could pick up more dollars in this country, but that the purse depended entirely upon the class of opponent he was to meet.

New York managers were protesting loudly today that Carpentier should not be allowed to come here and fight. Carpentier, who had a bad showing in his last fight, was, however, Tommy Gibbons and Gene Tunney, who would protest to the commission, if the Frenchman fails to catch a championship match in this country.

Some reports were heard that Carpentier is talking about going to California and that he also wants to fight some heavy bellid Pelaney, the league champion, in whom he has an interest.

IDAHO HAS HUGE CROP VALUATION

Idaho made a remarkable gain in crop production during the past year, according to a report recently compiled by the Federal Crop Statistician for the Gem State. This report shows that a gain of 31 per cent was made in 1925 over 1924 which is a most remarkable gain. Here are the figures as compiled by this statistician of the leading crops produced in Idaho.

For the year just concluded, the crop valuation was \$110,504,000, as compared with \$78,336,000 for the year immediately preceding. Crops considered in the valuation are corn, wheat, oats, barley, rice, potatoes, hay, sugar beets, clover and alfalfa seed, beans, lettuce, onions, prunes and apples.

"Exceptionally good yields, coupled with generally good prices, tell the story," the report says.

"Compared with all other states, Idaho ranked first in acre yield of winter wheat, oats, beans, and clover seed, second in rice and barley; third in spring wheat, tame hay and potatoes.

"Wheat leads all crops in total value with \$32,558,000; hay is second, with \$29,776,000 and potatoes third, with \$19,041,000.

"In gross returns per acre," the report continues, "onions lead, with \$550; potatoes second, with \$284.20, and lettuce third with \$178.25."

Tribute to the apparent exceptional fertility of Idaho soil is paid in a table of comparisons which is included in the report.

Idaho ranks first in per acre yield of winter wheat, with a production average of 27 bushels to the acre, and the average yield per acre for the entire country is 12.7 bushels. With 49 bushel of oats to the acre, Idaho again ranks first. The average per acre yield for the country in this product is 33.9.

The Gem state is almost 10 bushels above the national average per acre yield of beans. In Idaho the average per acre yield is 22 bushels, and for the country the average is 12.1 bushels.

Idaho raises five bushels of clover seed to the acre, and the average for the nation is 1.3 bushels.

In the production of rice and barley, Idaho ranks second in per acre yield in the country, raising 20 bushels of rice and 44 bushels of barley to the acre. The average of rice yield for the country, is 11.9 bushels and of barley 26.4.

Twenty-nine bushels of spring wheat per acre is the Idaho average, compared with 12.9 for the nation; 3.28 tons of tame hay compared with 1.46, and 196 bushels of potatoes, compared with 103.8, are other production figures.
