

TEN DIE AS FIRE SWEEPERS IN TWO HOTELS

Victims Were Guests of Hostleries Caught in Flames. BLAZE SPREADS Entire Block Razed and Property Damage Estimated at \$100,000.

PERHAPS 12, Jan. 12.—A fire that swept an entire block here today destroyed two hotels and several other business houses, and cost the deaths of at least ten persons.

Most of the dead were guests at the Johnson and Van-Sooy hotels, and it was in the ruins of these buildings that through searched for more bodies.

Only three of the ten bodies recovered have been identified, the others being buried on a hill, that identification being impossible.

Twenty guests of the hostleries were taken to hospital, and several others suffered while enroute from the buildings.

The property loss is approximately \$100,000.

Of the six bodies recovered from the ruins, two were identified as those of a man named Keener and his 15 year old son. Friends are searching the ruins for any others who may have perished.

TWIN FALLS SHOULD GET CONVENTION

Twin Falls has an opportunity to add another convention to its history if it but shows an inclination to take it. The Idaho Woolgrowers association this year is holding its annual convention at Idaho Falls. That city, the woolmen have pointed out, has not the adequate facilities to handle the large delegation of visitors which will pour into the community for the two-day session that Twin Falls has. This city also has other features which are always an attraction to conventions. In fact it is felt the sheepmen would rather meet here, in the heart of the sheep industry.

There are great advantages to be gained from these conventions. They bring money into the city and they help give the point of meeting the advertising every city of any consequence desires so much. It would pay the business men of Twin Falls to get together and add the woolgrowers to their list of conventions. The woolgrowers, on the other hand, would be pleased to come to Twin Falls.

THE IDAHO PRESS RESOLUTIONS

There is a lot of mighty good matter in the brief resolutions of the Idaho State Press association adopted Saturday. Commendation of the passage of a county public bill by the Idaho Chamber of Commerce to "sell the world" of our advantages, and of the rehabilitation of the office of state commissioner of immigration, are all in line with Idaho development. In this last case, the office can be a means of adjustment between labor and capital, by carrying out the full purpose for which it was created by constitutional amendment. The title is "Commissioner of Labor and Immigration," and it can be the medium of settling differences between employers and employes, and of giving information to both, which will get workers to points where needed, and prevent congestion by keeping them from places already over-supplied. The plan to secure a complete survey of the power possibilities of the state is a good one.

Co-operation with the American Legion in its war on war is voiced strongly.

The resolutions relative to the invitation of capital to Idaho are well worded and express the exact idea. They are in line with the attitude of the Idaho Press of the past, which has stood for the upbuilding of the Gem State, and has labored to bring in outside capital. In this effort it has received too little co-operation from some who would benefit most by the increase in population.

The resolution is not a sure thing. It does not carry with it the implication that the anti-trust law, the public utility law, the fair trading law or the blue sky law should not be honestly administered but it does mean that the policy of co-operating with legitimate enterprise shall be continued by the press more systematically than ever. The resolutions on this subject reads:

"Whereas, a condition precedent to a prosperous population is the creation of additional payrolls and of more and larger home markets requiring heavy investment of new capital, therefore be it

"Resolved, that the association recommit itself to its policy of protection to capital already legitimately operating in this state and of encouragement to prospective investors."

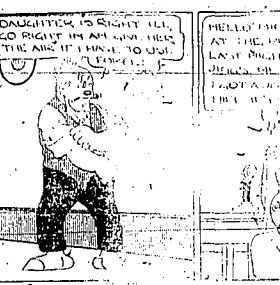
