CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—Martin Durkin, most desperate bad man that the "capital of crime" has produced in recent years, captured in St. Louis yesterday and now a prisoner in the county jail here awaiting trial for murder, laughed at the law today and predicted he would go free.

The laugh was not a merriment, perhaps he has anticipated the gallows but was the same laughing, cocksure laugh that he gave Chicago's police when they brought their job and arrested him to shoot his way out traps.

"This one is the millstone? That's a funny one. A good deal, a clever lawyer, Clarence Harrow, lawyer and snicker, it is a cinch."

STRIKE IN SENATE A PROBLEM

Peace Proposal to End Court Filibuster May Fail.

MORE OPPOSITION

Group Aligned Against the Tribunal, However, Agrees on a Vote.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—A peace proposal declined to end the filibuster which has held the senate's nose to the world court resolution for six days, by the exclusion of all other business is being worked out today by the irresponsibles with only a fair chance of success.

NEW TAX BILL MAY BE UNSAFE

Official Believes Slash Exceeds Good Safety Margin but Does Not See It as the "Danger Zone," He Says.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The new tax bill as reported by the senate finance committee exceeds revenue \$352,000,000 according the safety margin set by Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, but it does not go into the "danger zone," high treasury officials said today.

Secretary Mellon, it is understood, believes the senate bill goes beyond the amount that should be cut and may recommend, slight changes.
