# LIND TELLS OF "Y TO Y" ASSOCIATION

President of Yellowstone and Yosemite Organization Describes How the Two National Parks in the West Should Be Our Part in Getting Ready

The following description of the trails which are expected to flow from the recent meeting at Pocatello are told by President C. F. Lind, at the Yosemite to Yellowstone Highway Association's first meeting at Pocatello, representatives from all the towns in Idaho, through which this route passes, as well as representatives from Nevada, including the former Yellowstone traffic quarantary of the Yosemite park in California, were in attendance.

This "Y to Y" route, as it will be nationally known, has for its base one of the most popular, as well as the most scenic routes in the entire west. The three hundred miles trip down the famous Snake river valley from Yellowstone to Twin Falls, Idaho, is a trip that cannot be made to any other place in the world without leaving a lasting impression of the wonderful productivity and property of the Snake river valley, which is as good as a red to the "The Nile of America."
