Idaho needs its wealth and much more for its own development. Idaho's natural resources are there for it, for auto and needed investment. Idaho money should be kept in Idaho to insure the prosperity of all.

Veterans surrounding compound of veterans at American were into the Boise barracks hospital were explained Saturday night here by C. A. Hudelson, medical manager of the U. S. Veterans' Hospital. 

Old Crown of Lombardy

This helmet-shaped crown is said to have been forged from metal taken from the gates of Jerusalem by Helena to her son, Constantine the Great.


