

CLOTURE RULE MAY END FIGHT

Senate Majority Looks to Draconic Act For Vote.

ADoption LIKELY Leaders of Battle for Tribunal Adherence Believe Debate Will Be Closed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Final efforts for peace failed today as a vote approached in the senate on the move of the majority to invoke the drastic cloture rule against irreconcilable bills.

Involved in the cloture vote are: The outcome of the administration plan for American adherence to the World Court of Justice; the Dyer plan for restricted debate in the senate and the threat of finally limiting over the Dyer anti-bribery bill.

Senator Hearst, ranking republican floor leader, claims he has the twenty majority necessary for adoption.

Laynet said the Lyster plan would be the first matter brought before the conference when it convenes Tuesday afternoon.

American Tennis Champ Holds Her Own in Europe Despite Opposition, Wins Metropole Title Today.

CHICAGO, Jan. 25.—Miss Helen Wills, the American women's tennis champion, today won the Metropole International tournament at Paris by defeating Miss Bostwick of France.

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—In extending her second foreign invasion, Helen Wills has lived up to every ideal that she has been entrusted to her as an American tennis champion.

As a tennis player she bravely tackled the terrible cold, and as a young lady, she continued to do all the things that French people, who do not always take kindly to strangers.

On the tennis court she faced the determination of granite hills, unfamiliar courts and a foreign land and in public she withstood an ordeal that the most robust of our history hardly could have restrained her temper against.

Miss Wills was almost hundreds of times before she could win a match, and she thought of Miss Louie and she has been forced to answer the same question thousands of times in France and her surroundings never has failed.

Although she did not have a set that led up to the final round on her first tournament at Cannes, she was overwhelmed in Leclercque's final.

The rather ordinary way in which she went through the rounds leading up to the Metropole finals convinced many Frenchmen that she hasn't a chance against Miss Louie and she apparently has caused some concern in this country.

But this must be forgotten; if Miss Wills should be beaten, it is not these she must miss. Louie in the Riviera tournaments also will be the world's champion if she defeats the French star at Wimbledon.

The California girl was beaten once last season by Miss Elizabeth Ryan on a single court at Wimbledon, but her defeat did not take any sting from her victory in the national championships at Forest Hills.

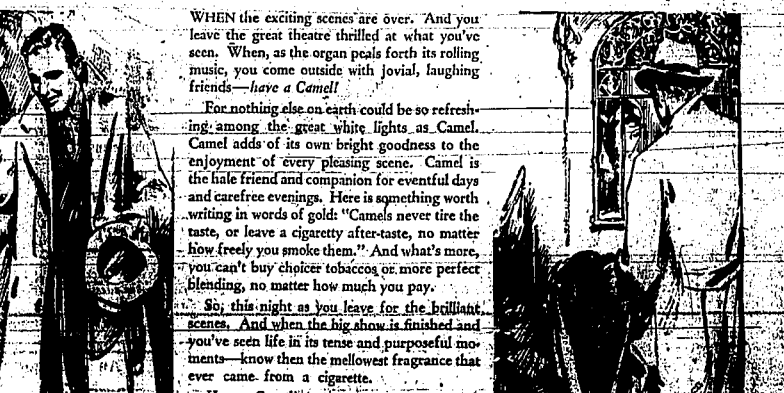
