DESCRIBES IDAHO SCENERY

The following is the text of the address of H. Masters, proprietor of the Times, broadcasted from Boise over the radio last evening:

Just as Idaho ranks first among the 48 states of the Union in health so she ranks first in a diversity of natural scenery. On every hand natural beauty spots abound, some of these having been set apart as national parks and others are rich in the recuperation of broken health. Idaho is so rich in these beauty spots that she well deserves the title, "The Gem of the Mountains."

Much of Idaho's beauty and grandeur is due to her rugged mountains and picturesque plateaus dotted with lonely valleys and sparkling springs that afford ideal camping places for an outing. Foremost among the mountain ranges lying wholly within the state are the Sawtooth Mountains, which divide the state into two equal sections. These mountains have been called "The American Alps" and well deserve the name. It is difficult to find words adequate to describe these peaks on account of their remarkable grandeur and sublimity. The loftiest of this saw-like range is Hyndman peak which towers to the dizzy heights of 14,900 feet.

A few years ago a noted writer, visited this wonderland of America and described it thus: "Realize that there is such grand scenery in Idaho as that in the Sawtooths. This range is remarkable for its numerous high peaks, many of them never having been scaled. Should one climb one of these Sawtooth peaks and look over Idaho's limitless glory, one would see misty mountain masses, peaks in crested complexity, gaunt canyons falling sheer and deep; then an opulence of beauty with sun-lighted splendor, lakes in the Alpine regions, shadowy forests, silver flashing water falls, vast and boundless stretches of mountains, and always the overpowering sense of the stupendous grandeur of Idaho. These wonderful mountains and picturesque canyons are within a few hours drive of the residents of Twin Falls county and Southern Idaho."

Second only to her wonderful mountains is the Gem State's remarkable waterfalls. For the tourist who likes to pitch his tent where he can hear the roar of the waterfall, there is no better place than at Shoshone Falls on the Snake river just a few miles from the city of Twin Falls and below the ferry which leads to the Northside and Jerome county—Here this mighty river is 950 feet wide and the waters take a mighty fall over a precipice 212 feet high or 144 feet higher than Niagara Falls. This mighty cataract is often styled the "Niagara of the West." C. C. Goodwin, at one time editor of the Salt Lake Tribune, writing of the falls said, "Never anywhere else was there such a scene; never anywhere else on a background so forbidding and so weird—were so many glories clustered. Around and beyond there is nothing but the desert, serene, silent, lifeless, as though desolation had builded there everlasting thrones of Sorrow and Despair. But to feel all the awe and to mark all the splendor and power that comes of the mighty display, one must climb down the steep descent to the river's bank below, and pressing up as nearly as possible to the falls, contemplate the tremendous picture. There something of the energy that creates that endless panorama is comprehended, all the deep throbbings of the mighty river's pulse are felt, all the magnificence is seen."

About eight miles above are found the falls after which the city of Twin Falls is named. These falls are so called because the river here is divided in the center by a huge mass of rock with a cataract on each side of it. One of these falls drops over a precipice 180 feet in height and the other makes its descent by a series of cascades to the river below.

Some forty miles below Shoshone Falls are the Salmon Falls, which were first visited by the Astorians under Robert Stuart on their return eastward in the summer of 1912. They arrived at the falls on the 25th of August and noticed the myriads of salmon trying to "shoot the falls" which led to the name Salmon or Fishing Falls. These falls are about forty feet in height.

Going up the river above Shoshone Falls you come to American Falls where there is a mighty dam impounding millions of acre feet of water. But this is to be the site of the most wonderful dam in the world. This new American Falls dam which is being constructed at a cost of more than \$8,000,000, will be 110 feet high and will impound 1,700,000 acre feet of water. The waters from this great project will be backed up for 25 miles and will form one of the largest lakes in Idaho. "This lake will be 10 miles across at its widest end, and will cover approximately 75,000 acres. It will furnish additional water for irrigation of about 1,500,000 acres of land."

Another project which will mean much to Idaho is the organization just recently perfected in Poetello and known as the Park to Park Highway association. This is a movement to connect two of Nature's wonderlands by means of a boulevard from Yosemite National Park to Yellowstone Park. This new road will bring to the eyes of thousands of tourists the scenic wonders of Southern Idaho in a bold fashion. In time it will mean that motor buses will traverse this new highway from California to Yellowstone and since Twin Falls is just a day's drive to Yellowstone it will mean that the Magic City will be one of the important stopping points on this wonderful new highway. From here short excursions may be made to the many scenic points of interest in the immediate neighbor-

hood of the leading city of Southern Idaho. Just a few miles from this point and another of the important natural wonders of Idaho is the City of Rocks. This marvelous city has not been given much publicity and has been visited by only a limited number of sight seers but it bids fair to come into its own with the new Y trail opening up to do during the coming summer.

Another mark of the romantic beauty and grandeur in Idaho is her numerous lakes. The Gem State is dotted with these clear reservoirs of sparkling ice cold waters bubbling from Mother Earth. Perhaps the largest lakes in Idaho is known as Lake Pend d'Oreille (Pond Oray) in Blaine and Kootenai counties and this vast body of water is 2000 feet above sea level. It is 300 miles long and eight miles wide. The scenery about this lake is so grand surpassed. This lake is well stocked with trout and white fish and is known far and wide as the fisherman's paradise. In the western part of Custer county near the base of the Sawtooth Mountains, lies Red Fish Lake, which takes its name from the fish with which it abounds. It is about 50 miles from Ketchum, the nearest railway station, yet it is visited every season by tourists on account of its great beauty. A mile and a half to the northeast is Little Red Fish Lake, near the wagon road from Ketchum to Stanley, and Stanley lake is some twelve or fifteen miles northeast of Redfish. Lake Alluras is about the same distance in the opposite direction. It is in these lakes that the Salmon river finds its source, and it is this section of Idaho that congress has been asked to set aside as a National Park. Bear Lake in southeastern Idaho is about 25 miles long and lies nearly in a line. Its altitude is 5,900 feet and at its deepest point it is said to be 900 feet deep. It is well stocked with fish by both states.

Coming nearer home we find a few miles from Twin Falls the famous Blue Lakes which are named because of their crystal-blue waters which come bubbling out of the lava rocks like mighty torrents. These lakes are supposed to be the Lost river not far from Arco and these waters are supposed to have dropped down onto a strata of lava rock and then flowed along until this water burst forth on the Perrine ranch into what is commonly known as Blue Lakes. "This wonderful beauty spot may be converted some day into a country club and public picnic ground for the people of Twin Falls and Jerome counties. Just above this natural playground will be erected the greatest steel bridge that has ever spanned the mighty Snake. From this bridge the most gorgeous canyon with its abrupt walls and stately buttes on either side will rise to tempt the eye of man. This Rim to Rim bridge will become the scenic wonder of the West and will do more to draw North and South Idaho together than perhaps any other project since the gold rush in 1862. This bridge, which will by perhaps the most wonderful link of its kind in the world, will connect the great bridge link between the North and South highway into Southern Idaho and the natural outlet for tourists passing from the park or northern Idaho to California points.
