## NEGRO WILL DIE FOR HIS BRUTE CRIME

Kentucky Court Sentences Slayer and Attacker of Woman to Hang in Speedy Trial Held Today.

National Guard Protects Negro Who Killed Three, Including Father, and Assaulted Lexington Mother

LEXINGTON, Ky., Feb. 2.—Under sentence of death, John Edward Harris, Negro, who held up bank to Frankfort prison today with 1,200 soldiers to guard his against death.

Triied in a court house guarded by all the weapons of modern warfare, Harris pleaded guilty and was sentenced to hang, within 15 minutes after the verdict, called the court to order.

Harris, who confessed the murder of Clarence Bryant and his two children and attack on Bryant's wife, was tried on a rape charge.

In Kentucky's capital an anti-slavery committee, but one boasting members in high society, in which the crime was committed, Harris will hang March 5 in Lexington.

After the trial, lawyers and newspaper men, the only persons outside the court house, were held for ten minutes at the Harris a star.

He was bundled from the court house into the automobile of James A. Kehoe, state adjutant general.

Harris walked into the capitol this morning to stand trial at 9 a.m.

The crowd was not disorderly as the accused and his prison would be way into the day.

**University to Tighten up on Entrance Test**

Stricter Rules Governing New Students to Idaho Institution Are to Be Enforced, State Announces.

DOSE, Idaho, Feb. 2.—Improved standards for accrediting secondary schools, and new uniform entrance examinations for the higher institutions, were adopted by the state board of education in its January meeting.

Secondary school standards for accrediting, which have been propagated by the Northwestern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges, are those adopted by the board, and the new rules were adopted by the review of the State Teachers' associations. In order that changes need not be made too abruptly, the board considered that adjustments should be made gradually, and gave the associations of educators discretion to make them.

Entrance requirements for the university at Idaho will be stiffened by requiring more than minimum passing grades even in certain subjects. The new minimum requirements have been 15 units of high school work. Hereafter students will be admitted only on application unless they have obtained grades in two-thirds of their units which are "one step" above passing grade.

In schools where grades are designated by letters or other symbols, the rule will mean that two-thirds of the grades must be one step above the one which means passing. In schools using the straight percentage system of grading, the margin will be one-fourth of the difference between passing grade and 100 per cent.

## Film Stars Must Repeat Marriage

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Feb. 2.—Alma Rubens and Ricardo Cortez, Mexican film stars, must go through the ceremony a second time, according to court records revealed today.

Miss Rubens, whose first trial was heard on Jan. 29, 1925, before the Interborough court, and entered until February 5, 1925. She can not be legally remarried, therefore, until next Friday, according to interested attorneys.

The actress' home is located in Hollywood, Calif., and Ricardo Cortez, Broadway dancer, declared he was dismayed as well as disappalled in the legal turn of events.

"I can't understand it," he said. "Of course it is necessary, we will not marry again." Ricardo Cortez will be Max Rubens' third husband, the actor, also known as George Kraatz of New York, is venturing into matrimony for the first time.

The City Council of Twin Falls last night moved another step nearer to municipal power when they decided to hold the Clear Lakes site for power purposes for two years. The question of buying this site for \$43,000 for a municipal power plant will be submitted to the voters of Twin Falls between now and that date.

The City Waterworks bonds will be returned during the ten year period beginning January first next rather than refunded as requested by a representative of the bonding company last evening at the meeting of the city council. We agree that it is better to pay off some of our indebtedness instead of continually contracting more. This applies to both state and nation. Indebtedness is bad and should not be indulged in only in extreme cases and under extraordinary conditions. But the American people have acquired the habit of going into debt and it will be a hard thing to break this debt forming habit.

## IDaho Irrigation Congress

Next in importance to the Idaho state chamber of commerce is that of the Idaho irrigation congress which is to hold a three days' meeting in Pocatello the latter part of next month.

The scope of the irrigation congress is to be enlarged to the point where it means a survey of the water resources of the state, a study of their conservation and use. By a survey is not meant a physical survey had at great cost, but it means the use of the material and knowledge now available for the benefit of the state as a whole.

Irrigation while still the primary and most beneficial use of water, is not all of the uses to which the water can be put or is being put in the rapidly advancing state of Idaho.

Water for power development, without which the state cannot advance, ranks a close second to water for irrigation. The beneficial use of water to prevent waste and the conservation of water present big questions which are to be discussed and are yet to be solved.

Sources of supply and quality of water for municipal and domestic purposes through the medium other than the rivers and streams presents a big subject as does the matter of keeping the streams free from pollution which is a matter that will call for state legislation.

The development of the great mining industry in central Idaho which will depend in a large measure on water and its uses, is a present-day live subject for discussion. The proper development of this mining property will call for the large use of the waters of that section of the state to develop power.

The protection of the water supply by the observation of the newly created state forestry law and the grazing laws in order to hold intact the watersheds at the heads of the streams used for irrigation and power is another question.

One of the big problems to be presented and discussed will be the matter of the protection of the state's natural rights in water of the lakes of the north. It is well known that neighboring states are looking with covetous eyes on the now-laten-waters of the big lakes of north Idaho with the idea of having the waters of those lakes diverted to other states so that the rights of Idaho in these waters would be gone forever. The coming session of the irrigation congress plans big things for Idaho. —Exchange.
