

THIRTEEN MEN COLLECTED FOR BOTTLE PROHIBITION

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Death has again claimed its victim today in a mine explosion which took place in the shaft of the Pittsburgh Terminal company's Mine No. 1, near here.

Trapped in a passageway, 100 feet from the mine entrance, only two of 23 men at work, fighting a blaze in the mine were saved.

The explosion which occurred at 12:15 yesterday was the aftermath of a fire in the mine, which broke out when a cutting machine broke through a clay vein and set the powder. The 23 men were in the mine, 15, 4,000 feet from the mine entrance, to fetch the blaze at 9 a. m.

COLLAPSE OF ROOF TRAPS MANY REPORT

Weight of Snow Breaks Top of Foundry Plant and Workmen Are Buried in Debris.

NEW BRITAIN, Conn., Feb. 4.—Weight of snow which for almost 24 hours had fallen here caused the roof of the foundry of the North and South Manufacturing company to collapse today. Fifty workmen were trapped buried underneath the debris.

Two hundred men were trapped under the roof and six persons seriously injured, were carried away soon after the crash.

Fire companies and police reserves were called out to join other workmen from the plant in rescue work in the light of the fact that "snow" probably remains trapped beneath the wreckage of the roof and the mounds of snow.

About seven hundred men are employed at the plant.

The two known dead were found near the edge of the debris. They had not yet been identified.

All the employees of the company were called out to assist them as they dug feverishly to reach the others.

The six injured were taken to a hospital where they had been the night before the death list might run to a score. The roof of the building was flat and the increasing weight of the snow of the night continued unabated for more than 24 hours weakened the supports, it was believed.

Another Challenge to Syndicalism Law

O. and similar organizations a felony, was made in the United States supreme court today in a brief filed for William B. Lewis, convicted in California courts under this law.

Western Executives Meet in Chicago to Plan Battle Against Demands of Employees of Railroads.

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—Western railroad executives gathered here today to meet the demands of some of their employees for wage increases.

A meeting of the executives, which was held for the first time in their own city, today will discuss the claims of the Brotherhood of Railway Carpenters and the Brotherhood of Railway Employees, already have notified a number of the western roads that they were prepared to fight for higher wages.

Other organized groups are expected to follow.

Preliminary to tomorrow's meeting, Shown-Thompson, head of the bureau of railway statistics, issued a statement intended to show that wage increases were not justified at the present time.

The average pay of railroad employees is now 115 cents an hour, or less than 1914.

FLIER'S TRIAL COST \$35,000

Hull said the trial expenses were so high that it appears likely that the war department will be forced to request a deficiency appropriation.

CHURCH UNIT WOULD ALTER PROHIBITION

Temperance Society Backs Move for Sale of Wines and Beer Believing Dry Laws Are Causing Vice.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—The Church Temperance Society, of the United States, today is backing a move to alter the prohibition law, believing that prohibition has not reduced the work of 200 years of the temperance movement, and will work for modification of the Volstead act to permit the sale of 100 gallons and beer.

The society, as announced by the Rev. James McLaughlin, national secretary, is the result of a series of meetings of during the past year to urge members of the society, including both clergy and laymen.

Among the resolutions given for the decided modification of prohibition were the complaints that the Volstead act has "no effect in increased drinking among young people, the class legislation, discriminating in favor of the rich, and that prohibition has done more for all lawless men."

JUNIOR COLLEGE INCREASE MAY AID STUDENTS

BOISE, Feb. 1.—Possibility that the development of higher education in Idaho will require an increase in the number of junior colleges rather than the establishment of a second university, was indicated in a report filed recently with Governor J. C. Moore by the state board of education.

Idaho's resources cannot properly furnish two degrees, making it necessary, says the statement submitted by the board, "and in fact, the needs of the state of Idaho require one four year course university. Were there two four year course institutions in Idaho, neither would have the financial support, equipment or personnel or faculty to maintain and supply proper college curricula and standards. Two universities, one with Idaho's population and taxable resources, mean two mediocre institutions with a constantly deteriorating standard and this will be true for years to come.

On the other hand, the junior college covering the first two years of college work at different intervals, then, the last two years can possibly be given, make it possible for the student to attend in the state or foreign, and carry a graduate for enough along to determine whether he or she wishes or is fitted to beyond sophomore work.

Pligates issued by the Federal department of education and approved by the state board of education, are in effect for instruction purposes, but not for the purpose of conferring a degree, and the Federal government is not bound to recognize a degree conferred by a foreign institution.

Only three of these institutions have been established in Idaho, and the matter of higher education falls into the hands of the state board of education.

"The Vanishing American" is a very early play, as presented at the local theatre, and makes the audience regret that the lesson it teaches must not have been appreciated with like force to the excellent settlers who came from various parts of the world to this land, much of the misunderstanding between the races, due to failure to consider the other fellow's viewpoint properly.
