IDAHO TECH PRESIDENT PRAISES JUNIOR COLLEGE COURSE

For the student who does not wish to carry more than two years of college or university work, the junior college is both a boon and a life-saver, according to president of the Idaho Technical Institute, who addressed the thirty-fourth annual gathering of the Idaho State Teachers' association on the place of the Junior College in American academic life.

"There is too great a space," President Retherford asserted, "between the skilled worker and the highly trained professional class. That gap, as it may be called, should be filled by a semi-professional group composed of men and women perhaps not quite so intensively trained as the bona-fide specialist but who nevertheless perform as true, useful functions. The education of students preparing for work of this latter type bids fair to become the greatest accomplishment of the Junior college."

Attention was called to the astonishingly high student mortality rate, particularly among freshmen and the sophomores, in the great universities and expressed the opinion that many high school graduates, particularly those who have not passed the period of adolescence, should be given the benefit of the first two years of collegiate instruction before home ties are definitely severed.

"We hear a great deal of talk among educators," he said, "about the step from high school to college. Some think the break is too great; others think it is not great enough. The general organization of the work offered in the first two years of the university or college is much more like the work in the high school than it is like the work of the last two years of those schools. It is not in the province of the high school to do research work, or to begin to any great extent the specialization with courses offered, but to claim any degree of specialization would be erroneous. The same may be said of the work in the junior college. The method of instruction by recitation is universal in all well-regulated high schools. The same is true of the first two years' work in the college or university. The courses are general.

"In practically all colleges and universities in the country today, for example, the first two years in engineering are almost identical for all forms of this science. The specialization in any one form, or the divergence of the courses, begins in the junior year to be marked, but not before. The same general principle holds for all the courses in college and university.

"The conclusion to be reached from this discussion is that the logical place for the break to come in our educational course is between the sophomore year and the junior year rather than between the high school and freshman year in college. Here the break comes anyway, and the continued organization of general courses in the high school and junior college suggests no such change."

MORONI OLSEN PLAY GETS HIGH PRAISE FROM NOTED CRITIC

The Salt Lake Tribune critic gives the following reasons of the play "Friend Hannah" appears before February 15 under the auspices of the business & Professional Woman's club at the Orpheum theatre, indicating an arrangement of characters, which, the critic claims enhances the effect:

A profound drama played with such a nicety as to leave an entire unpoped emotionally in "Friend Hannah" that which the Moroni Olsen play has not only presented at the Salt Lake theatre. The play itself is a later tragedy, yet rich with incident, romance and humanities. Its story is the story of George III of England and his unworried queen of fifty years, Hannah Lightfoot.

There were some misgivings in more than one person last night upon reading in the program that Byron Foulser was to play George, and Dorothy Adams the quiet and lovely Hannah. But that was before the curtain was up. The first act was more than sufficient to convince the most exacting that the roles were in competent hands and that these two very young people were going to give a splendid account of themselves. In this one scene disappointed.

Impetuous youth, tempered with a becoming dignity, made George III a man and King worthy of England as Byron Foulser deftly and strongly pictured him. In the third act, in which, as George, husband of Hannah, and delirious in his domestic instincts and complete adoration of her, Foulser's work was markedly strong, and many thought he had attained the highest point in his interpretation. Yet in the last act as the mind cold king still content to his memory and heed of his past love, Foulser held his audience in a spell which none wanted broken.

She had the dominant tone of the minor role of Hannah Lightfoot, uncle to Hannah. Whether in the leading role or in minor cast, Olsen never fails to make his part an important and interesting one. Laura Thatcher captivated her late share to the success of "The King" in the role of mother of Hannah, and a devoted Quaker.

Construction of Roads in Arkansas Progresses

There is excellent progress throughout Arkansas in road building. In 1924 a total of 1,200 miles of improved highways were completed and it is estimated that between seven and ten million dollars will be expended by the state highway department during the present season and that approximately 4,000 men will be employed. This will bring the state's mileage from virtually nothing in 1915 to more than 6,000 miles at the end of the first ten-year period of modern highway building in Arkansas. The formal opening and dedication of the little Rock-Tulsa Springs highway, which has just taken place, was one of the most important events in the highway building history of Arkansas.

Billion Dollars for Roads

It is estimated that more than one billion dollars will be spent on road construction in the United States in 1925 to build 30,000 miles of new highways. More than 3,000 White trucks are now in use in Michigan and other states in the construction and maintenance of highways, and they are being used in the American West of good roads built quickly, but for permanence and kept excellent.

Good Roads Hints

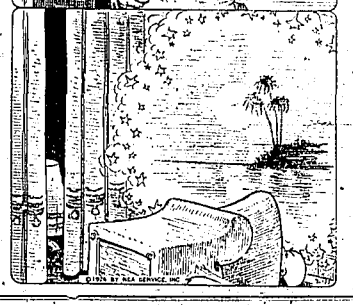

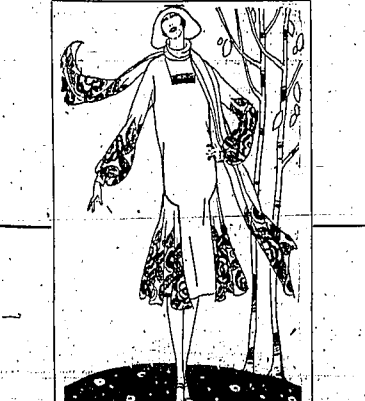
