## Union Pacific Will Extend Vocational Agriculture Work

The Union Pacific last evening announced that it will extend the scope of its agricultural vocational cooperation hereafter open only to members of boys and girls clubs conducted under the direction of the state university extension service. In the states of Utah and Idaho, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Wyoming, Washington and Oregon to students of vocational agricultural schools in South-Highway high schools and students served by the Union Pacific lines. The new system, completed, a choice of two awards, one of \$100 for full term course in the state university, college of agriculture, and the other an award of \$50 for a winter course in agriculture or some equivalent at the college. Since its establishment in 1920, the Union Pacific scholarship competition has given a material stimulus to the work of the county boys and girls clubs, a total of 214 scholarships having been awarded in the states named, of which 17 were granted to boys and girls in Utah counties, and 77 to boys and girls in Idaho counties.

The present arrangement contemplates \$25 scholarship award payable for either a winter short course in the Utah Agricultural college at Logan and the Utah College of Agriculture at Moscow or applicable to a full-term or four years course by the college. As an added inducement to a wider and more thorough agricultural education, it has been decided to increase the amount total to increase the amount of the award for a full term course to \$100 the same time a new award of \$50 for the winter short course will be established. The competition is open to boys and girls between 14 and 21 years of age who are students regularly enrolled in the high school vocational agricultural courses in counties traversed by the Union Pacific including the South-Highway high schools established.

The counties in Utah are Box Elder, Cache, Davis, Iron, Juab, Salt Lake and Utah counties, and in Idaho they are Ada, Blaine, Cassia, Fremont, Gen, Goodhue, Jerome, Jefferson, Kootenai, Latah, Madison and Nez Perce, Owyhee and Twin Falls counties. The plan will be extended in the future to other Union Pacific counties in which South-Highway high schools vocational departments are organized hereafter. Scholarship will be awarded by committees in each of the counties consisting of the county superintendent, an appointive state supervisor, agricultural education and a third person selected by these two and will be determined principally upon the excellence of the students' practical agricultural project work, carried on under the supervision of the high school vocational department.

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## L. D. S. Committee Calls for Bids for New Tabernacle

Call for bids to be opened March 6 for the construction of a new tabernacle on the site of the foundation in the corner of Second street and Fourth avenue east, was issued last evening by the building committee of the L. D. S. church. The estimated cost of the structure was placed at \$48,000.

J. D. Young, well known Salt Lake City architect, came in Friday and inspected the foundation, which he said would, with slight repair, be capable of holding up the structure as it was built. The new building will be two stories high and have a basement. It will be built of brick. The auditorium will seat 450 people.



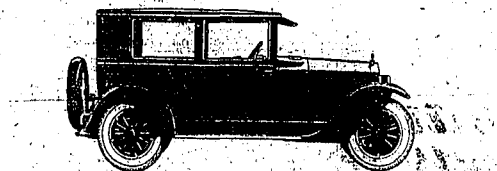

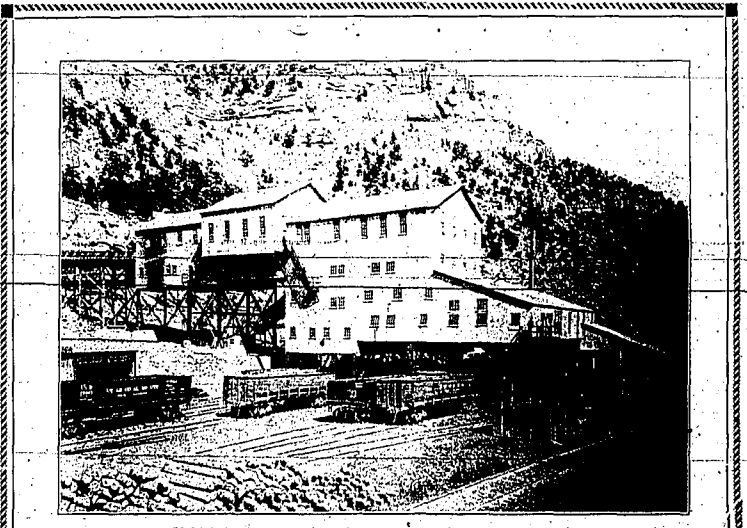
