

GRAZING BILL IS ATTACKED

Secretary of Interior Work Criticizes Standfield Bill Before Senate Public Lands Committee.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—The standard grazing bill was criticized by Secretary of the Interior Work before the senate public lands committee today as hearing on the bill.

Work said he thought the bill was too cumbersome, complex and deprives the federal government, particularly the interior department, of much power which would be transferred to stockmen.

Work said he believed legislation to create grazing districts ought to be enacted, but this power ought to remain with the federal government.

Standfield, defending the bill, said the rights of the government would be protected because the lands would be appointed by the president.

The bill was also opposed by William D. Crowley, secretary of the Camp Fire Club of America. He presented resolutions recently adopted by that organization.

Teton Pass in Teton county, Idaho, was the national highway in the early trapper days, just after the Lewis and Clark expedition. John Colter, who was with Lewis and Clark, returned to the wilderness and came over the Teton Pass with the Crow Indians in 1808. After the battle that followed between the Crows and the Blackfeet Indians, Colter returned alone. He was the discoverer of the Yellowstone. The Siblets, Flzpaczka, Jeddiah S. Smith, Jim Bridger, Kit Carson and other celebrated trappers used this pass for many years. After Major Henry Bull Fort Henry, the Kentucky hunter, Hoback, Robber and Robinson used this pass. They met and piloted the Hunt expedition going to the Columbia for John Jacob Astor over this highway into what is now Idaho.—Exchange.

BURBANK AND RELIGION

Burbank, the noted scientist and who has contributed much good to the world and who has carried out the Biblical admonition of making two blades of grass grow where one grew before by doing with nature what a few years ago would have been considered impossible, is being condemned by professional religionists for expressing his mind and his thoughts as his science has taught him to believe.

Burbank says that he is an infidel in the true sense of the word, and that he does not believe in a personal resurrection, and that science disproves the popular theory of reincarnation after death.

As a scientist, he states, he cannot help but feel that all religions are on a tottering foundation, and the reason for that is that religion as it is commonly called and preached, has lost its appeal.

Last its appeal for the reason that it has failed to keep up with the intelligence and enlightenment, and the brand of religion that qualified in the days when a few did the thinking for the many, does not qualify in this more modern day when through education and the opportunity to study there is more individual thought and intelligence.

Burbank makes the claim that he is a "lover of Christ" in all that the word means and that he loves all things that help humanity, and he has proven his word by his works.

In discussing his belief Burbank, who has given so much to the world, says:

"All religions of the past and probably all of the future will sooner or later become petrified forms instead of living helps to mankind. As a scientist I cannot help but feel that all religions are on a tottering foundation. None is perfect or inspired. As for their prophets, there are as many today as ever before, only now science refuses to let them overstep the bounds of common sense.

"The idea that a good God would send people to a burning hell is utterly damnable to me, I don't want to have anything to do with such a God."

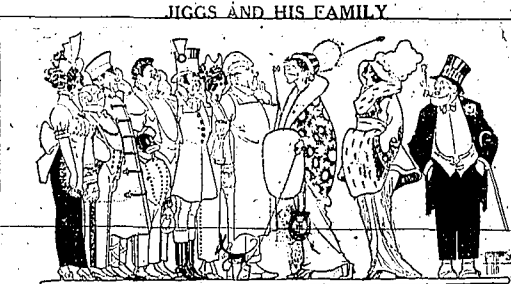
Touching on reincarnation the great plant scientist said:

"The universe is not big enough to contain perpetually all the human souls and the other living beings that have been here for their short span. A theory of personal resurrection or reincarnation of the individual is untenable when we but pause to consider the magnitude of the idea.

"Only the contrary I must believe that, rather than the survival of all—we must look for survival only in the spirit of the good we have done in passing through."

"Once obsolete, an automobile is thrown in the scrap heap. Once here and gone, the human life has likewise served its purpose. If it has been a good life, it has been sufficient. There is no need for another.

"I am a lover of Christ as a man and his works and all things that help humanity, but nevertheless I do not believe what has been served me to believe. I am a doubter, a questioner, a skeptic. What if it can be proved to me that there is immortality, that there is resurrection beyond the gates of death, then will I believe. Until then, no."

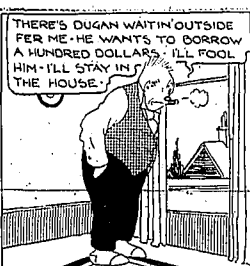

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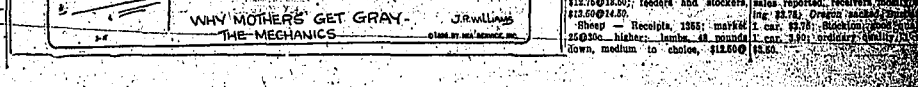

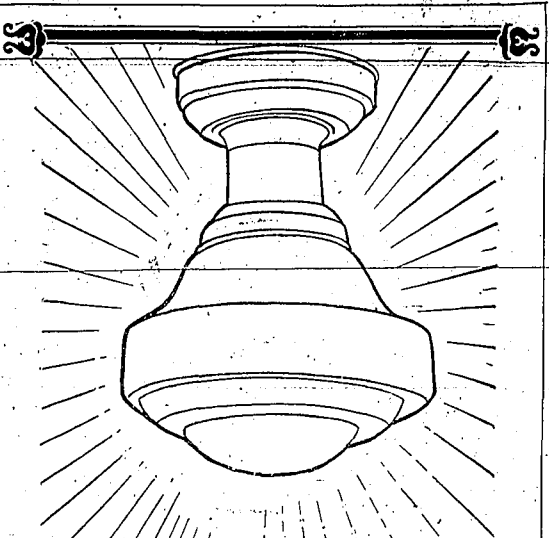
