TRUST PROBE MARKS TIME FOR MEETING

Gathering of Evidence Against Aluminum Company Is Held Today As Directors Assemble.

Federal Trade Commission Hopes to Prove Mellon Concern Had Monopolistic Tendencies.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Feb. 18.—Work of gathering evidence relative to the business practices of the Aluminum Company of America, Inc., which the Federal Trade Commission expects to prove its monopolistic tendencies, was halted today as the directors of the concern held their annual meeting.

The hearing in Pittsburgh, to be followed by hearings in other cities, has so far been devoted to the introduction of evidence relative to the Aluminum company and other concerns with which it deals.

Three hundred of the more important documents from the files of the Aluminum company, which have been received as exhibits, show the intricate relations between the company and other concerns.

FOOD PRICES ON INCREASE SAYS REPORT

Many Cities Are Paying 6 Per Cent More on Products While Few Show Very Small Decrease.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Food prices increased six and one-half per cent last year and it now takes \$1.24 to purchase commodities that cost \$1.00 a year ago, according to a report issued today.

Newsweek has a little report on the price index for the month of December 16 to January 15, however. A decrease of ninety one per cent in food prices was registered in the 30 cities.

The average cost of food in 37 cities increased during the twelve months ending this year however, 49 of the 61 cities showed increases ranging from one to 14 per cent.

FAINT STARS REVEALED IN NEW FIELDS

Scientist Explains Peculiar Lights Only Visible on Clear Nights, Rivaling Aurora Borealis.

Many of Tiny Planets Which Give Earth Rays Are Invisible Even to Powerful Telescopes.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 18.—Amazing explanations of the faint illumination which pervades the skies on starry nights are being given today at the annual convention of the southwestern section of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

An auroral display like the aurora borealis or northern lights, but a million times more intense, takes place in the earth's atmosphere at all times.

Also, the earth receives a measurable quantity of light from stars so faint that they are invisible to the naked eye.

Dr. Silliman's studies at the Lowell observatory of the faint illumination of the night sky was possible of the remarkably clear atmosphere at Flagstaff, Ariz., he declared.

Dr. Silliman said that his experiments revealed that the illumination of the open night sky was composed of several distinct parts.

1.—The light from stars so distant that no telescope will ever reveal them as individual stars.

2.—The continuous and all pervading but exceedingly minute auroral display in our own atmosphere.

3.—A certain amount of light from the visible stars which is diffused by the molecules of the earth's atmosphere.

4.—A certain amount of sunlight which is reflected down to us by the dust particles or meteors in the open spaces of our solar system.

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9.—The light from stars so distant that no telescope will ever reveal them as individual stars.

Heavy Snow Blocks Kansas City Traffic
