Southern Idaho Baseball League Urged Rather Than Entrance Into the Utah-Idaho League Because of Additional Expense in Last Named; Buhl, Kimberley, Hansen and Other Towns Plan for Teams.

Three representatives from eastern Idaho arrived here today and are holding a meeting with the baseball fans of this city in the Chamber of Commerce rooms at 10 o'clock tomorrow. They are urging strongly that Twin Falls enter the Utah-Idaho Baseball League. The other two cities which will enter from Idaho are Pocatello and Idaho Falls. The advertising alone is worth what it will cost this city to enter the league, according to E. G. Bonnett, manager, and vice president of Anderson Bros. bank in Idaho Falls. J. Robb Brady and J. P. Hallwell of Pocatello are also here. Mr. Brady is manager of the Idaho Falls Post and Mr. Hallwell is owner of a large drug store in the Gato city.

EAT IDAHO BUTTER AND EGGS

The corn farmers of Iowa set up a great cry when they found themselves with a great crop of corn in their hands, produced at a cost greater than they could get, and as a consequence stood to face a loss.

Their request for legislation and help from the government did not get them very far, but it did attract a great deal of attention and all at once these corn farmers of Iowa awakened to the fact that their product, of which they had a surplus, is one of the greatest foods to be had, nutritious, rich in food value and when rightly prepared very palatable.

Idaho started out some time ago on a "cow, pig and hen" propaganda and platform, with the result that the production of poultry and dairy products has largely increased, and everyone felt good about it.

There has been a slump in the price of those products to the producer, particularly in the price of the producer of butter and eggs, and the price has dropped to a point that there is little or no profit to the producer and he is becoming discouraged.

Butter and eggs are cheap in Idaho, too cheap for the producer to make a great deal out of them.

The price of eggs to the producer has dropped as low as 25 to 30 cents a dozen. The mild weather the country over has put the hens of the nation into a productive mood.

There are several elements which enter into the problem: The first is that the producer must keep faith and not place eggs on the market as "strictly fresh" when they are not, for nothing so destroys the faith of an individual as to crack open what he has been led to believe is a strictly fresh product to learn that it has been laid away somewhere while the heavy run of production was on and then dug up and sold at a higher price and as strictly fresh.

There are other conditions. The retail distributor can encourage the consumption of eggs provided he does not seek to make too great a profit on his transaction which many are doing, and again the purveyor of eggs in the places where meals are served to the public has no legitimate right to charge from twelve and a half cents to fifteen cents for an egg, and some times more, when the raw product costs them about two and a half cents and maybe less.

There is a way to help regulate the market conditions, and that is by increasing consumption, by delivering a guaranteed article and having the general public demand of the retail dealers and public places of consumption that the spread between producer and consumer be not so great.—Exchange.

Eden Launches Bond Issue for New High School Building

EDEN, Idaho, Feb. 22.—The initiation of the local committee, in 1929, for securing of a high school building was instituted by the past few days, who held local public calling, the bond election was held by J. W. Rosen, clerk of the Eden Rural high school district, No. 2, following a meeting of the "board of trustees" of the school, which is called, for Tuesday, March 16, will vote patronage and expresses an opportunity to their approval or disapproval as to whether the trustees shall be empowered to issue negotiable bonds amounting to \$20,000, which will be used for the purchase of an adequate school site, the erecting of an adequate high school building, and equipping the same.

The Eden school is now completing its third year as an accredited high school and a suitable place for maintaining the school has long been a problem for the trustees for some time. As a result of this need, the trustees after considerable "thought" have decided to submit the bond proposition as a remedy.

SCHOOLBOARD ISSUES CALL FOR TAX VOTE

Custodian Submission Is Made to the Voters of Question of Authority Collection of State Taxes Necessary for Educational Election in March 5.

Following a custom prevailing ever since the change in the Idaho constitution several years ago, formal call has been made and notice given by the school board of the Twin Falls independent district for an election to be held March 5, to authorize the levying of an assessment of mill to exceed 7 mills for the purpose of carrying on the schools during the coming year.

Under the old statute the school board could make a levy up to 10 mills if it deemed necessary, and could then request and obtain, and did regularly request and obtain, from the state board of education permission to raise the tax to 15 mills.

Qualifications of Voters. That the qualification of voters entitled to vote at such election are:

- 1. Elector within the meaning of Article V, Section 2, of the constitution of the state of Idaho.
2. Residents of the district at the time of the election.
That in addition to the foregoing requirements, each voter at all tax levies must possess one of the following qualifications:

1. Parents or guardians of a child or children, whose single child or children are under 21 years of age, and when such child or children and the parents or guardians thereof are residents of the district at the time of election.

2. A person who has taken title in the district, and the husband or wife of such taxpayer, in case the taxpayer is married.

A paper of poll tax is not a tax upon the qualification, and the law defining the qualifications of qualified voters for such election.
