## HIGH CLASS BASEBALL IS URGED HERE

Proponents of Utah-Idaho League Urge Local Business Men to Organize Team at Once.

Twin Falls has an excellent opportunity to organize a first class baseball club which will not only benefit the city as well as the territory to the way of advertising and progress in sports, proponents of the Utah-Idaho baseball league declared in their final plea last night before the chamber of commerce.

"Not only could Twin Falls put up a high class team, but would do so naturally because of its size and its proximity in business and industry," A. Edith Reed, executive director of the league declared.

"When the club is once organized there is little chance that it will fail financially as many believe," Mr. Reed declared.

The Salt Lake club guarantees a 75 per cent guarantee to all franchisees with any team that it plays and on highway construction in 1926 leads to play. Other franchisees make a similar guarantee.

Pocatello, Logan and Idaho Falls are the other cities included in the league. Each of these have already placed their needed funds and obtained franchises.

Mr. Reed pointed out that Twin Falls was the logical place to complete the six team league. And the club will have plenty of opportunity later on to call for players in the bigger leagues, which invariably follows in the organization of successful franchises.

The team here would be in a class standing, allowing three professional players and a salary roll of more than \$200 a month. It was the belief of Mr. Reed, C. C. Bennett of Idaho Falls, secretary of the league in that city, and J. A. Hallstead of Pocatello, another director who was here yesterday, that Twin Falls could obtain splendid material with little trouble here in the city.

And with a park already laid out here, it was pointed out that Twin Falls has a fair start for the league, provided the business men show the same intelligent interest to organize the club.

The advertising alone will mean much to the city, it was explained. Twin Falls would become one of the leading cities of the two states in the Utah-Idaho league. And it is naturally certain that the city could organize a team that will be on a par with any other team in the league.

We are not altogether against the organization of a class "C" baseball league in Twin Falls but we are fearful that same cannot be financed throughout the season. We are unalterably opposed to failure and we dislike to see this city or any other enter a league and then have to withdraw after a few months because of a lack of finance to carry on. This class of baseball is what we eventually want in this city because we should have a better brand of baseball than the other towns which are not nearly the size of the Magic City. The fans naturally expect more of this city than they do of the other towns in South Idaho and there is not doubt that a good baseball team in the class of Salt Lake City, Ogden and Pocatello is a credit to any city.

Twin Falls patronizes the library as shown in the report last evening by the number of books that circulate during the month. Twin Falls and Idaho Falls are about the same size, yet the circulation of books in Twin Falls for one month was 72,993 while in Idaho Falls was only 28,586. These figures show that we have a reading public and a thinking public. But the crying need of our public library is larger facilities and more books for the reading public. Several new departments should be established. One of the most important is a department of agriculture. We were told last evening that when a community like ours neglects its opportunity to serve the young and old in this manner we are actually committing a crime.

BORAH SHOULD MODIFY STATEMENTS

"The Borah for President" boom which has now been launched in Idaho, took definite shape in the first instance at the annual banquet of the Boot and Shoe Manufacturers (the trust) held in New York, January 20. Under the head "Pass It Along" its leading editorial feature, the Capital News of February 10, told of the initiation of the movement, quoting a speech from Robert M. Washburn, of Boston and Washington, declaring that "Borah is the greatest man in the United States today, barring none." The article was not original with the Capital News. It was taken from the New York Times of January 21, which gave it the caption "Borah for President," and was sent out by Norman H. White, a leading Republican of Boston, to certain Republican newspapers, which in this state were more or less identified with the power company. It appeared in the Pocatello Tribune on the same day that it did in the Capital News. How much the American Protective Tariff League, which has always praised Borah for his fight against the League of Nations which it has always led, had to do with the movement, if anything, is not disclosed. It is stated that 900 attended the Boot and Shoe association meeting at the Hotel Astor, where the movement was launched.

However wide may seem to be the divergence between the position of the shoemakers and the forces behind the distinguished senator in Idaho, they seem to have the same in common: an undying hatred of the League of Nations and all its works.

However, if Borah is really a serious candidate for the presidency it would be well for him to be a bit more careful in some of his statements. He must depend more so extent on the support of those who admired Colonel Roosevelt, who was the most virile supporter of a strong league, backed by military forces. Again, while no friend of Woodrow Wilson will relinquish possession of seats in his behalf, no sane person believes that he was a weakling as Borah implies. Senator Borah in Chicago repeated this sentence which he used in Filner: "Woodrow Wilson carried 14 points to Versailles as a basis of world peace. Versailles rejected 13 of them and turned the fourteenth wholly away from the aims and purposes of the author."

Waiving the objection, that Wilson took only 13 points, as he had repudiated the freedom of the seas as inconsistent with his final theory of a league of nations, a summary of the whole list shows that most of them are secured and in effect, and the ultimate success of the rest is at least debatable. Here they are:

- Open covenants openly arrived at and thereafter no private international understandings.
Freedom of the seas.
Removal as far as possible of economic barriers.
Guarantees for armament reduction.
Free, open-minded and impartial adjustment of all colonial claims.
Evacuation of Russia.
Restoration of Belgium and France.
Transference of Alsace-Lorraine.
Territorial settlement of Italy.
Autonomy of peoples of Austria-Hungary.
Settlement of Balkan states.
Settlement of Turkey.
Restoration of Poland.
League of Nations.

Another sweeping statement, which was fully controverted by Senator Hiram Johnson, in his speech against the world court in the senate January 26, is that "500,000,000 of the world's population are to be brought into 1920, in a sense that is true, but they did not do so consciously; millions of them being deceived into believing that the way to get into the League was to join the League."

# COMMUNITY DINNER IS BIG SUCCESS

### Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Hears Vital Subjects Discussed. Needs of Public Library and Eradication of Noxious Weeds Are Vital Topics Presented; California Excursion and Legion Plans Also Heard.

Twin Falls county farms are badly infected with noxious weeds, according to Ed S. Jarrett, head of the county bureau of noxious weeds, in an address before the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce dinner last evening. This is not cause for alarm, but it is a warning that the farmer and land-owners of this county make a definite fight on these pests.

There are about 300 farms in this county and 150 of these farms are infected with noxious weeds. In other words about 50 per cent of the farms in this county are infected with these weeds. The eradication of these weeds on this county will suffer heavy loss as a result. Much of this infection comes down with the water from the Snake river further up the river and for this reason this thing must be handled by the state, instead of an individual county, because vital changes are needed in the present law and the solution rests largely with the man on the farm. He must be led to do the best he can. Without his cooperation there is little hope that these infested areas can be cleared out. There are 12 different weeds that are classified as noxious weeds of this number we have five in Twin Falls county," said Mr. Jarrett.

She stated that there was grave danger that we might never have to close the present library unless the city committee cooperate by supplying the funds. 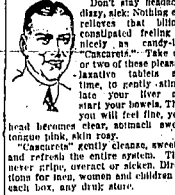

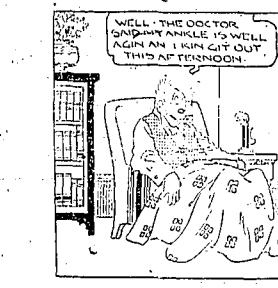

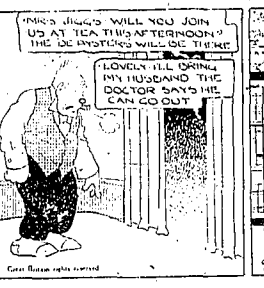
