Support will represent the sub-district including Paul, Rupert, Hobbs, Burley and Oakley. Gooding will represent the Gooding-Jermolov-Hillside, Idemo, Huerfano and King Hill districts. Gannett and Carey will stand for the Gannett, Talley, McField, Gannett and Carey sub-district.

Gannett and Carey sub-district has been considered the most likely victor of the district tournament. The Wildcats are not out of defeat this season in any of the conference titles.

GREB LOSES TITLE MATCH TO ATLANTAN

Tiger Flowers Wins from 'Whirlwind Harry' and Is First Negro to Take Crown Since Johnson.

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Tiger Flowers, who won a decision of 17 straight fights in Nevada, and who works at it, is the new middleweight fighting champion of the world.

The decision, announced and outshaped Harry Greb coach in Tex Rickard's Garden last night to win the decision of two judges and to take the title away from the faded Pittsburgh Whirlwind.

The referee, Gusbat Smith, voted for Greb and a good many of the big crowd thought that Flowers did not have enough of a margin to warrant a change in the title, but there was little counting about it.

Even the boys who had bet 3 to 1 on Greb turned against him because of the foul tactics he used in striking the bout and it was his unclean style that may have tipped the scales against him.

Flowers is the first Negro to win the middleweight championship and the first fighter of his color to win any title.

John Johnson defeated Fred Jeffers for the heavyweight championship.

The contest established a new record for receipts. There were 16,211 paid admissions and the receipts were \$105,434.20, of which Greb's share was 37 1/2 per cent.

There was plenty of action all during the fight as Greb worked to keep in front. There were no knockdowns and neither one of the fighters was in danger. Greb was tired at the finish.

The former champion looked drawn too long and he showed the effects of the punishment he has received in the ring. He never did grab seriously and it seems that the long expected "morning out" has come upon him.

Greb won the title from Johnny Wilson in 1922 after he had been the light-heavyweight champion.

Flowers is 27 years old and has been fighting for eight years. He has been through 129 fights and is credited with winning 29 of them.

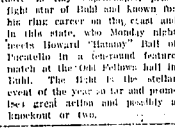
This committee suggests that we have only recently started on the task of putting our water resources to a beneficial use.

"We have a much greater area of water available than we have any commensurate use of it were all used in irrigation. Physical conditions suggest numerous schemes for increasing the state's interest in it to be adequate which the surplus might be utilized, namely, condensed, and it is believed that this is the sincere desire of all citizens, and particularly this congress, we must apply the remaining water supply to the uses which will contribute the greatest possible benefit.

"This institution is known as an irrigation conservancy. I am sure we can now fully realize the value of water for other purposes and thus the necessity of conservation in the various uses to which it may be beneficially applied. We can, therefore, no longer consider irrigation development as a mere means, but must take into account the use of water for manufacturing, power, domestic and other purposes.

"As our population increases the demand for wholesome, portable domestic water becomes more important, and as our industrial growth continues the value and need of every likewise increases.

"The use and protection of our waterlands, now largely given over to national forests and open public domain, present a problem of importance which, aside from the question of water, which has been mentioned before congress for solution.

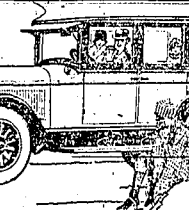

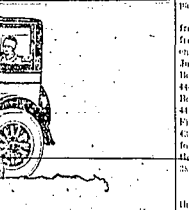
