

PRESIDENT'S FATHER GIVEN HIGH TRIBUTE

Snowm: Almost Blinds President's Family on Way to Vermont 'White House'; Nation Joins With Coolidge in Tribute to Hardy Pioneer of Vermont Hills.

Last Rites Over Father-Coolidge Were Carried Out in Accord With Sturdy Pioneer of 80 Summers; No Music Was Heard; Mournment Already Selected.

PLIMOUTH, Vt., March 20.—John Calvin Coolidge was buried here today in the funeral chapel of the hills of his native Vermont.

His son, Calvin, chief magistrate of the nation, performed a state funeral following the death of the great father and state patriot who was proclaimed "untimely America" at the culmination of the solemn funeral order for the burial of the dead.

The ceremonies were carried out just as the old man had directed—without music to the 80 years of his life.

No tears were shed from the throats of those who followed in the procession and the "Life" in which after scattering flower petals on the casket, he committed the body to the earth.

The little journey retraced the path of the Gettysburg trail the president and Mrs. Coolidge followed a year and half ago to bury their son, Calvin, Jr. in the same plot of the Coolidges.

The monument of John Calvin Coolidge was already there selected by the old man two years ago. In the spring a stone cutter will add merely the date of death—March 20, 1926—to that of the birth date—March 21, 1845.

The services began at 2 p. m. in the parlors of Colonel John's home which he occupied a few days ago to his son during the week for the death of his wife. The room now next to the dining room in which by a flickering oil lamp, by a native public officer of the late 20th president on August 1st, followed the death of Warren G. Harding.

There was no music. "I am the Reconstruction and the Life" says the Latin inscription on the tomb. Though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth and believeth in Me, shall never die. The words of the Gospels were read in the opening the last memorial to the best known Green Mountain native.

President Coolidge, his wife and the old man, only grandson—Governor William of Vermont, Attorney General Sargent, and the president's entourage were straggled back into the ways as they departed silently to the solemn rite.

Mrs. Coolidge wore black. "The body has a mantle of white" said the White House spokesman. It was a brief 15 minutes of devotion under the leadership of the ministerial voice of the Shepherd.

PLIMOUTH, Vt., March 20.—President Coolidge was buried here today in the funeral chapel of the hills of his native Vermont.

The president, Mrs. Coolidge and their son, John, arrived from Woodstock at 11:40 a. m. today after a winding journey, the last high in open fields, with the wind-blown snow lifting their feet.

They went immediately into the little white house of their father, directed by the president by the way and Vermont's few days before he died, last Thursday night, to view the old man's feet for the last time.

The body lay in a simple white coffin, dressed in black and the weather had been calm.

The coffin was laid with flowers from the White House agencies. It lay in the parlor of the home, adjoining the sitting room in which the man wore his son as president of the United States nearly three years ago.

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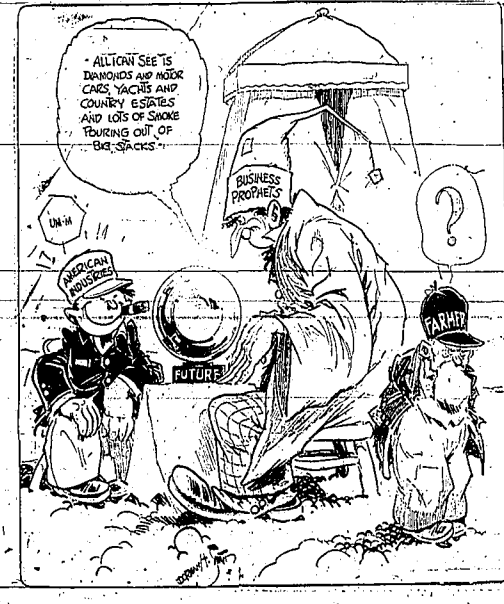

Helen Wills and Other Members of America's Tennis Team Are Going After European Championship in Aggressive Fashion.

NEW YORK, March 20.—America's maximum of tennis strength is represented in the women's team named by the United States Lawn Tennis association to carry the national emblem into France and England this summer.

"It is not only the strongest team that we could create but we believe that it is the most formidable group of women players ever assembled," Julian S. Myrick, chairman of the executive committee of the association, said.

Captained by Mary K. Browne, the veteran California star, the choice Helen Wills, national champion, who is now in Europe, Elizabeth Ryan and Miss Marion Zinder-Sheeler will act as alternates but only those will prevent the regular appointees from taking the title.

"We regret that Mrs. Molla Mallory (six times national champion) could not arrange her plans to accept an appointment on the team," Myrick said.

"She has made other out of the fact that she will answer an emergency call if anything should happen to the other players in France or England."

Myrick said there was no truth in the report that Mrs. Mallory refused to consider the invitation unless she would be ranked as the number 2 player on the team, a place that was given to Miss Ryan.

The team will not sail as a unit but will meet in Paris some time during May for the beginning of practice.

BUHL LAND ACTION IS CARRIED UP

L. W. Meyer and "B" Appeal in Supreme Court from Judgment Given to Thomas Clinton and Wife on Ground That Dealings Were Unconscionable.

Decision that the court erred in ruling that T. K. Hardman had acquired from the judgment of Superior Court in the suit of L. W. Meyer and wife against Thomas Clinton and wife on ground that dealings were unconscionable.

The plaintiffs in the suit below, who are the respondents in this court, moved for reversal of the judgment of the supreme court. On the 14th day of November, 1918, the said Thomas Clinton and wife entered into a contract with the said L. W. Meyer and wife.

On the 21st day of July, 1920, the said Clinton and wife sold a portion of said land to the said Meyer and wife, who sold the same to the said Clinton and wife. The said Clinton and wife, who were the respondents in this court, L. W. Meyer and Minnie Meyer, his wife.

After an oral contract was entered into and new arrangements made concerning the purchase made by Meyer.

Under this new arrangement Clinton and wife conveyed to Meyer and wife that portion of the land which Meyer and wife had purchased from Clinton and wife and conveyed a mortgage on the land and then reconveyed the land to Clinton and wife. In November, 1921, contracted to sell this land back to L. W. Meyer and Minnie Meyer, his wife, and in this contract the said Clinton and wife stated that the purchase price should be \$12,000 and Clinton and wife acknowledged receipt of \$2828.

Clinton and wife made four payments on January 1 of the years of 1922, 1923, 1924 and 1925, and to pay a mortgage of \$4200. Meyer and wife made a prom note, dated November 25 on crop for 1922 to secure the two payments that Clinton and wife made on January 1, 1922 and January 1, 1925 and also note of \$100 with chattel mortgage to secure payment on land contract.

Under this contract the said Clinton and wife were to be paid in full by the said Meyer and wife on January 1, 1926 and January 1, 1927 and also note of \$100 with chattel mortgage to secure payment on land contract.

The unpaid evidence on behalf of Clinton is that Clinton received from Meyer upon said mortgage and on January 1, 1924, 1925, 1926 and 1927, the sum \$10,055 part thereof in the hands of the clerk of court and to Clinton and Meyer from January, 1927 and 1927.

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the proceeds of crop sales, which Meyer wanted to use to pay the interest on the mortgage, the proceeds of which Meyer was to receive under his contract of purchase, but Clinton did not permit this to become a check, which was made payable over to Clinton in January, 1923; \$1127.00 of the above amount was received by Clinton through foreclosure of his mortgage against Meyer. This was January 24, 1925, and on February 4, 1925, Clinton received \$46,872.00 from foreclosure of chattel mortgage against Meyer.

Almost immediately after receiving these two payments Clinton served notice on Meyer that he declared the real estate contract at an end, demanded possession of the land, and declared a forfeiture of all moneys received.

He then almost immediately followed the giving of this notice by the institution of this suit.

Meyer and wife answered, filed a cross-complaint and sought a cross-combable declaration of the part of Clinton, demanded the return of all moneys paid by them to Clinton, which totaled \$112,273.00, less reasonable rent on the premises.

The district court sustained Clinton's contention, declared the contract rescinded and cancelled and decreed that Clinton was entitled to a forfeiture as against Meyer, and to be entitled to retained all purchase money and from this decree this appeal is taken.

Those who oppose the plan claim that it will lower the level of the water in the dam so low that irrigators for future years will suffer hardships unless they resort to the use of the pumps. However, if this plan could be followed this year it would increase the crops on Salmon tract by at least a million dollars, according to estimates furnished by those who are acquainted with the yields in this section of Idaho.

It is just a little unfair for the extreme "drys" to claim that the prohibition poll which is being conducted throughout the nation by leading newspapers is "wet propaganda." Such a charge does not have the correct ring and sounds just a little like sour grapes. It is undoubtedly true that the "drys" have remained away from the polls and have not cast their ballots as freely as those who favor a change but to point that this is a concoction of the "wets" is straining a point. We feel that it is simply a sincere effort to get an honest expression of opinion from the voters through the medium of the newspapers. To charge that this is not propaganda involves the sincerity of these agencies which have taken part in the movement, which is utterly unfair and such a charge is uncalled for on the part of any faction.
