## EDITOR ROASTS HOOP TOURNNEY AND REFEREE

Sandpoint Editor Takes Fling at Hudson, Who Referred State Basketball Tournament and Claims That His Decisions Gave Filer Wildcats Victory Over Northern Idaho Team.

"Hootenannies" is the headline of a lengthy editorial a few days ago in the Great Office Review a Sandpoint newspaper.

The editorial takes quite a crack at Idaho in a sporting crack, commenting freely and with wit on the subject of the recent state high school basketball tournament staged here, the management of which was with strenuous objections from J. C. Foster, Sandpoint coach.

The editorial follows:

"Hootenannies! "So many athletes have come from that wretched state basketball tournament at Boise, that the cumulative effect of the evidence has become so overwhelming that management and rotten officials. If the hootenannies ring true, Idaho should be forever ruled out of consideration for Idaho athletes. For if these fellows place, let where sportsman should be the men and all important factor, it should be in the field of athletics, and in junior athletics first.

"After the basketball match with a 10 point foul over Filer and 10 minutes left to play, both sides of personal fouls and had the fault charged against the two remaining players with a foul total of 10 for the game, lost the game, and made a protest to the coaches. Five of the eight coaches present supported the Sandpoint team. Sixty-two agreed that the officiating by the Hudson brothers was of an anti-athletic variety and not in keeping with the modern game of basketball. The opinion of these coaches was that the Hudsons, both of whom are from the Sandpoint team, were wrong in charging a personal foul against a defense player every time he touched an offensive player, regardless of whether the player had definitely fouled, backpedaled, stepped or something else as the specific offense. This attitude of the referees broke up the Sandpoint defense, its history during the conference session under such referees as J. Wesley Taylor of South Central and J. Miles Hunter of Lewis and Clark high school of Spokane. It had its effect, too, upon the Lewiston play, and without doubt was responsible for the other team from outside the Boise-Nampa section, where the Hudson refereeing was known and accepted by players and coaches. Of course, had outside referees officiated, the handicap would have been taken from Sandpoint, due to the misleading interpretations of the Hudsons.

"Yet when this situation was protested at the tournament, nothing was done to remedy it. Why?"

"Well, the tournament was staged by Boise high school, and Professor Adams, who doesn't know a basketball ball from a jumping bean, was made manager. He no doubt thought it would be wise to have some of the boys before the auditors through at officials, so the Hudsons got the jobs. Idaho management, Boise officials and a Hudson team in the tournament. Hudson's it.

"And the Hudsons. One of them was never known to play basketball, and the other, trying to fool the editors of Idaho time when Idaho had the worst team of its history, couldn't manage the boys in a state tournament. That was several years ago.

"In the meantime the game has changed somewhat. So Sandpoint officials got up against an attitude that called for girls' rules, in

That a defense player was all right as long as he looked around in front but safely away from the man with the ball and happened to intercept it when the offensive player got ready to throw it, but that who he tried to get the ball he was all wrong; why, the Sandpoint defense went to pieces. Naturally, Hudson was notified from the coaches about the referee's errors and for taking the ball away from an opponent—and without violating the rules against holding, checking or backpedaling.

"Reports from Boise state the Hudsons were so rotten that Boise, high school athletes, were named the four when two Sandpoint stars were pulled out of the Boise game, which neutralized the coaches' board the referee. Coach Peter took his officials and left the ball, for which he was only taken to look by the Hudson papers, which omitted anything of the prosecution. Then, when Sandpoint was winning with two subs in the fourth, the Hudsons called the Sandpoint team to time out and said he would throw them out of the tournament if they didn't substitute on a penalty. The Boise report said Boise was overcome by brute strength. With two subs in the lineup that, hence, Sandpoint, after being out, had no choice but to substitute.

"Childish observers inform us the 'deal was rotten.'"

"Whether you're a sportsman who supports participants in the tournament, voted it to Yacatocho.

"So two cups were awarded. The second one to Boise. "Boise management, Boise officials, a Boise team and a sport team cup to Boise.

"But the rest of the state ought to be so disgusted by this kind of sportsmanship, the Boise sportsman, who developed a kind of a school boys; that it ought to chase the Hudsons at both end of the 'home' state, that it ought to be a disgrace.

"And in the meantime the phony of the tournament should be taken away from the teachers' association, who get what it belongs to, the state-board of athletic control.

"That at least would insure competent management and equipment, basketball officiating at all state events in future.

"It is said that when a Sandpoint man at Boise took the basketball situation before the chamber of commerce there, to call town support for a change of officials and fair play, the secretary of the chamber did not even know there was a state tournament being held."

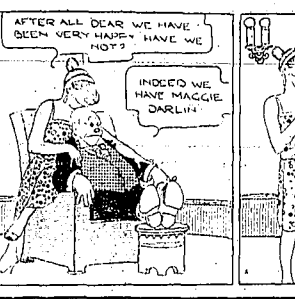




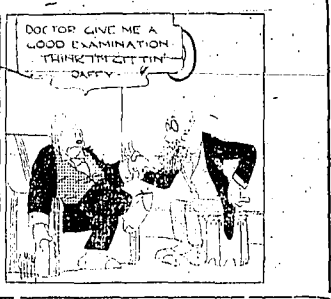

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# BIG PAYMENT TO CANAL ON ASSESSMENTS

### Records Are Broken in Three-Day Liquidation by Prosperous Residents of the Twin Falls Tract; All Unsatisfied Levies Go Delinquent Tonight.

Between Saturday morning and Tuesday night, a total of \$2,000 or approximately 12 per cent of the total assessment of the Twin Falls Canal company was paid into the office, according to F. C. Lynch, secretary, who is busy with a crowd on this last day. # WATER IS SHORT SAY DIRECTORS

### The Wood-River System Stockholders Are Told to Conserve Supply.

SHOSHONE, Idaho, March 31.—There will be sufficient irrigation water for the Big Wood river canal system to mature 70 per cent of the average crop, in the opinion of the board of directors after hearing the report of a survey of the water-head, in accordance with the opinion, the board passed the following resolution: "Owing to conditions as determined by present information, it appears that water will be sufficient to mature only 75 per cent of the ordinary crop, and it is recommended that the canal system be not allowed to exceed 20 per cent of their total contract amount, also with the understanding that each stockholder be permitted to use less water when he deems it necessary at a time when a majority are using their allotment; also, at the beginning of the season no stockholder shall be permitted to draw in excess of 70 per cent of his contract amount, and that excess shall be taken up to double the 70 per cent requirement whenever water is due a stockholder due to nonwithdrawing of storage, all deliveries to be governed by canal and lateral capacities. The company plans to start the irrigation season with a 60 per cent head about April 15. Later deliveries will be run as needed for the grain crops."

# Burley Road District Redeems \$35,000 of Highway Bonds

BURLEY, Idaho, March 31.—The Burley highway district has redeemed \$35,000 of its \$75,000 6 per cent bonds for this year. Plans of the highway commission are to retire the outstanding bonds as fast as possible in compliance with the call or maturity of the principal bonds in this district. An important item in the annual report just issued by the highway district is that during the past year three miles of new road have been built and more than twenty miles of highway have been reconstructed with gravel.

The district has built several new wooden bridges and put in five metal culverts and seven siphons the past year.
