BORAH WILL EGG ON FOR BROOKHART

Bitter Feeling Exists As Report Against Seating Senator Brookhart of Iowa Comes Before Senate; Committee Favors Seating Democrat; Fight Is On.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 2.—A staff of subterranean plotters complicated the Brookhart-steele congressional election contest today as the senate moved to decide who should receive the seat from Iowa.

A lift over republican leadership of the upper house and hesitancy of democrats to decide in favor of a democrat who might support the administration and an important republican candidate for the majority of opposing sides as the contest was brought before the senate for decision.

Brookhart's election is contested by Daniel F. Steek, democrat, who ran on a platform which caused many administration supporters to vote for him. By a vote of 10 to 1, the senate probed and elections committee prevailed Steek should be seated.

Ordinarily such an overwhelming recommendation of a committee would be followed unquestioned by the senate but Senator Stephen, democrat, Mississippi, filed a lone minority report favoring Brookhart, and started the fight against Steek. In Iowa, republican, John Preston, who presided in the senate, decided from the evidence that Brookhart was entitled to his seat and agreed to lead the floor fight to overturn the majority report.

WETS HOPE TO GET CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 2.—Wayne H. Wheeler, general counsel for the Anti-Saloon League, stated today that his organization is seeking to raise \$250,000 to get information to the voters to effect \$600,000 which the wet organizations admit in their letters they plan to raise to try to elect a wet congress.

LOS ANGELES, April 2.—The Texas company, one of the largest independent oil companies has completed negotiations to take over the California Petroleum company, it was announced here today by R. J. Peeler, president of the local concern. The merger, which is being handled through their oil and company, Inc. New York, involves aggregate assets of \$122,206,877.

Attorney General Is Candidate for U. S. Senate vs. Gooding

BOISE, Idaho, April 2.—Attorney General A. H. Connor formally announced his candidacy for United States senator Thursday by publication of a statement in the Tenth District Review. He will oppose Senator Frank H. Gooding, present incumbent. Opposition to the World Court and all foreign entanglements, opposition to further enlargement of the federal government in state matters and support for a debt tariff are the principal planks in Connor's announcement.

Idaho Pardon Board Will Be Asked to Release 25 Men

BOISE, Idaho, April 2.—Twenty-five prisoners at the Idaho state penitentiary have given notice that they will file a petition for their freedom at the regular board meeting next Wednesday. Under the board's rules the application must be on file five days before the session. This is a big decrease in applications for which state officials could save the prison, if the present committee total 50 to 60.

CONGRESS VOTES TO IMPEACH U. S. JUDGE ENGLISH

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Republican and democratic leaders in the house expected to reach agreement today on appointment of a committee to investigate Federal judge George English of the eastern district of Illinois when he is called before the bar of the senate to stand trial for "high misdemeanor" in office.

After the house last night by an overwhelming vote decided to impeach the jurist. Chairman Graham, Pennsylvania, of the Judiciary Committee sought to bring certain members of his committee appointed to manage the case in the senate but minority leader Garrett, Tennessee, objected.

GRAM proposed that five republicans and two democrats be charged with prosecution of English but Garrett interposed an objection on the ground that the party division should be four and three.

Whatever agreement is reported will be put in resolution form and submitted to the house Tuesday.

WILLIAMS BILLS TO PREVENT FOREIGN FUNDS APPROPRIATED

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The Johnson bill granting \$1,000,000 federal aid for five years forest fire prevention programs in Santa Barbara, Angeles, San Bernardino, San Cleveland national forests, California, was adopted by the senate and sent to the house.

DRASTIC DRY LAWS CHANGES ARE URGED

Government Supervision of Cereal Plants, Prison Terms and Heavy Fines for Bootleggers, Confiscation of Vehicles and Search of Private Homes Proposed in New Act.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—New and drastic extensions in the Volstead act, essential to the success of prohibition, were recommended to congress today by Assistant Secretary of Treasury Andrews in a bill approved by the House administration.

The bill, introduced by Senator Gott, republican, West Virginia, had the following points:

1. Revising cereal levee laws to operate under federal supervision.
2. Bootleggers found using reprocessed denatured alcohol for manufacture of beverages to be fined not more than \$2,000 and to be confined to prison for not less than two years.
3. Foreign and counterfeiters of physician prescriptions for medicinal purposes to be sentenced to prison. There is no penalty for this crime under the present law.
4. Confiscation of all vehicles used for liquor transportation without first waiting for the courts to convict the transporter.
5. Search warrants for private dwellings where evidence is obtained that liquor is being manufactured for commercial purposes.
6. A special act by congress making a dry law for the District of Columbia, similar to several state laws now in existence.

BOISE SETTLERS TAKE CONTROL OF BIG PROJECT

Project Settlers Take Over Control of Boise Irrigation Project From Government; Settlers Assume All Responsibility for Maintenance.

BOISE, April 2.—Management of the Boise irrigation project was formally turned over to the board of control Thursday, under terms of the contract entered into between the government and the respective project districts.

Settlers now assume responsibility for maintenance of all lands under the project, and will govern through the control board, which contains one representative for every 2,000 acres of land in the three districts. J. H. Hood, manager under the government, has been elected manager for the settlers. The board will meet the first Monday in each month, to discuss business relative to administering the project.

The three districts on the project are the Blaine-Kears, the Nampa-Idaho and the Wilder. The New York canal district will be included if sections on these lands are later of a district May 8. This will increase the number on the board of control from 7 to 8 members.

Idaho Gasoline Has Produced Hundred Thousand Dollars

BOISE, Idaho, April 2.—Idaho's gasoline tax has brought in proceeds now totaling \$195,220.16 for the months of January and February, according to F. A. Jew, commodity officer for that department. Collections for March will not begin to come in until the middle of April. The three-cent tax paid indicates that \$17,572 gallons of gas were sold during the first two months of this year in Idaho, or 58,621 gallons daily.
