Idaho Banks Third in Apple
Production; Shipments Total
\$21,000,000 with Total Produc-
tion of 4,000,000 Barrels;
Washington Leads All States.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 3.—Washing-
ton led in commercial apple
production in the United States for
1925, with New York second, Michi-
gan and Idaho tied for third place,
and California, Oregon, Illinois, Cali-
fornia and Pennsylvania following in
order, according to figures just issued
by the foodstuffs division, de-
partment of commerce. Commercial
apple production in the United States
for 1925 amounted to 12,500,000
barrels as against 25,000,000 barrels
in 1924, or an increase of 8,480,000
barrels.

United States exports of boxed ap-
ples for 1925 amounted to 4,242,140
boxes (value \$12,720,000) against
5,718,572 boxes (value \$17,750,000) in
1924—a decrease of 1,476,432 boxes
and nearly \$5,000,000, according to
the commerce department. Exports
of boxed apples for 1925 amounted
to 1,376,615 barrels (value \$5,276,
500) against 1,660,000 barrels (value
\$5,647,443) in 1924—a net in-
crease of 278,800 barrels and about
\$275,000.

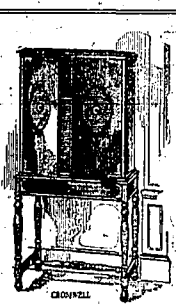

BROOKHART FIGHT RESEMBLES BUCHANAN DOUGLAS WAR

The fight in the senate over the acceptance of the majority report favoring unseating of Brookhart and the seating of Daniel F. Steek ought to be decided on its merits, namely, on the question of which of the contestants received the most votes, but it probably will not be. If the senators are true to their oaths neither the political affiliations nor the economic views of the rivals should figure in the matter at all. One or the other received a majority of legal votes, and the one who did is entitled to the seat.

Brookhart, who, unlike Borah, did not support Coolidge, was not given the support of the national administration in his fight for election, while the Idaho senator received the administration support. Brookhart, by the way, is a bona fide radical. His speech in opposition to the World Court, quoted at length in a Times editorial, was consistent with his views, and evidently honest. He took the position that the court had a logical place in the legal machinery of a competitive system, but he argued that the present competitive system was "doomed, and rightly so." This view was more consistent with that of the third party socialists of Victor Berger type than with the republican or democratic parties or even the conservative wing of the progressive party.

It does not necessarily follow, however, because Coolidge opposes Brookhart that his opponent, Steek, is in any way in harmony with administration views. The general attitude of Stephen A. Douglas as tariff reciprocity and the slavery question was much closer to that of President Buchanan than the attitude of Abraham Lincoln was. Yet during the famous senatorial campaign of 1858, the entire influence of the Buchanan administration in Illinois was thrown to Lincoln. Douglas fell out with Buchanan because of his bitter fight against the adoption of the Lecompton constitution for Kansas, which the administration wanted adopted. Even on this, there was just as much essential difference between Lincoln and Buchanan as there was between Douglas and Buchanan, but the president wanted to discipline the Illinois senator, who for nearly seven years had practically dictated the policy of the government, not as an obstructionist, but as a maker of policies.

Douglas writes to Buchanan and warned him that he would fight any effort to put over the Lecompton constitution for the Sunflower land. Had he merely stated that he would mildly oppose and personally vote against the administration Douglas might have retained his place in the good graces of the president, but when he insisted that the Lecompton constitution must be defeated, Buchanan reminded him of the fate of a senator who stood out against "Old Hickory." "Let me remind you, Mr. President, that Andrew Jackson is dead," replied the "Little Giant," who had been Jackson's chief opponent during the declining years of the hero of New Orleans. Buchanan said his temple at the instigation that he was no Andrew Jackson, and they parted in bad humor. Determined to crush Douglas, the president threw all his strength to Lincoln, but at the time failed to unhorse the famous party leader. The support of Steek by Coolidge is not evidence of understanding between the men.

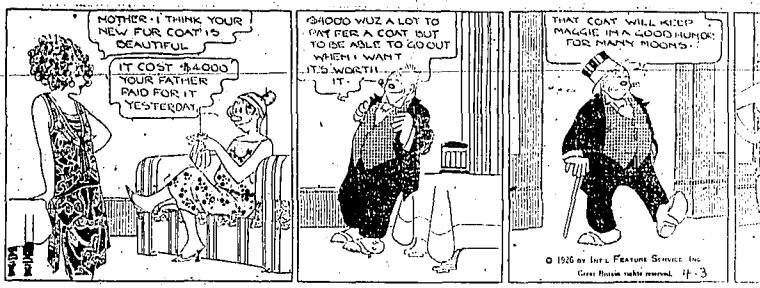
