IN THE IOWA ARENA

The senate has decided that Smith Wildman Brookhart was not elected to the United States senate. It was Daniel F. Steck whom the people of Iowa intended to represent them in that august body.

So Brookhart goes back "to the people." But mark this: He does not go back with bowed head as one disciplined by his own constituents. He goes back to assume the role of an unfortunate disciplined by a party hierarchy at Washington. He goes back as a martyr ejected from a seat into which the people of his state put him. He goes back to tell the people of Iowa that the senate is dictating who shall be their representative.

And with this sort of talk, he hopes to defeat that Republican stalwart, that "regular," Albert Baird Cummings of Des Moines.

His talk will weigh heavily with disgruntled Iowa farmers. Congress has not won back its popular support lost in recent years. It still has a reputation for blundering ineffectiveness. Tell the corn-growing countymen that a bunch of senators have done them dirt, and, love Brookhart or not, they will be out to punish the bunch of senators.

Cummings will bear the brunt of their attack. He will represent the stand-pat group of senators. His record is as regular as Brookhart's has been irregular. Back in '88 he was an Iowa state legislator. In '92 he was a presidential elector. Both that year and in '94 he was chairman of the Republican state convention in Iowa. He was on the Republican national committee from '96 to 1900. He was a delegate to the Republican national convention. Twice he was elected governor of his state. Four times he was elected to the senate. Naturally he will be the candidate of Republican regulars again.

Brookhart may defeat Cummings. He may even do it for the Republican nomination. He might run independently. The latter chance gives Democrats a gleam of hope.

For Democracy is scarcely entitled to an Iowa senator. Steck's seating upsets a lot of dope. It was possible only because Iowa Republicans were out to discipline Brookhart. It was a fluke. And yet if Brookhart and Cummings divide the Republican vote, why not another fluke election of a Democrat?

That is a prospect which worries the national committee. If Coddie-Republican control of congress hangs on Iowa, the nation may be sure a fight will be waged rivaling the World Series in interest and importance. It will be Brookhart vs. Cummings, but Democracy vs. Republicanism, a national fight waged in a state arena.

And it does not sweeten the situation for the Republicans to realize they have several uneasy Republican senatorial heads to guard in territory normally Democratic which went over to Republicanism in the Harding landslide in 1920.—Statesman.

The Statesman in its biography forgets that Cummings was not always the ultra-conservative that he is today. He won his "place in the sun" by originating the low tariff policy known as the "Cummings Plan." In some ways it was rather hazy, but he did introduce a bill to take the tariff off all trust made goods. This, by the way, was the original main feature of the Sherman anti-trust act, and when it was stricken out, the most vital feature of the measure was annihilated. As he grew older he grew more conservative and by the time that Dolliver was assisting in the fight against the Payne-Altgeld tariff bill which gave the democrats the house in 1910 and would have elected Wilson in 1912, even though Roosevelt had not run, Cummings was comparatively quiet.

APPEAL IN THE BRÜGGEMAN RULING PLAN

Canal Board Decides to Put Question of Interpretation of Contract with Clover Tract to the Supreme Tribunal of Idaho.

Appeal will be taken from the decision of Judge H. Bruggeman, in favor of Charles H. Bruggeman, which was decided at a hearing of the Twin Falls canal board yesterday. Under the master of irrigation, the area of the tract by 50,000 acres had been taken under adjudication. In making the canal, it was the duty of the ditcher and contractor to be obeyed. Manager Burton Smith was instructed to cooperate with the ditcher under the provisions of the state irrigation unit, the Hurley district and the north side in measuring water.

The Bruggeman suit. The following is the statement of the case of Bruggeman as outlined by Attorney S. T. Hamilton, with whom is associated in this case, the firm of Wolfe & Wilkins. Mr. Bruggeman is a land owner and resident on what is known as "The Clover tract" which tract is located southwest of and above the main or mainline canal of the Twin Falls Canal company's system; and this tract receives its water for irrigation from the mainline canal.

"The Clover tract" contains approximately 4200 acres of highly improved lands and the settlers have made improvements in the lands, which are and equal by the betterments on any similar area under our far-famed canal system. These lands were included in the original Carey act, segregation of the South Side tract and were a part of the land contracted to be reclaimed by Twin Falls Land & Water company under its contract with the state of Idaho in pursuance of the state's obligation with the United States. It was found, however, that this area of 4200 acres was above the gravity flow of the mainline canal and that to irrigate these acres a system of pumps was necessary to lift the water to a gravity level. Twin Falls Land and Water company made a survey and estimate of the cost of such pumping system and it was found to cost \$30 per acre for each acre to be irrigated. This company under its contract with the state was to receive \$25 per acre for the reclamation of which these lands were a part. To install this pumping system would have reduced the profits of the company \$120,000; and the company refused to construct the pumps and to install the necessary plants to lift the water. At this crisis Mark Coffin and Dr. V. Dorr went before the state court board

and were permitted by the board to erect the pumping system as now constructed and used and to charge \$30 per acre for each acre under the gravity ditch to which the water would be lifted by the pump. This charge of \$30 per acre was additional to the \$25 per acre received by Twin Falls Land and Water company under its original contract and thus the settlers on the Clover tract paid \$55 per acre more than the gravity flow of the gravity flow without the aid of pumps and in addition to this payment of the \$30 per acre these settlers maintain and operate the pumping system. Messrs. MEMORIAL OF D. A. R. TODAY

Monument and Tablet to "Captain Molly" to Be Dedicated at West Point.

WEST POINT, N. Y., April 15.—The presentation and dedication of the monument and memorial tablet to the state conference of the Daughters of the American Revolution, in memory of the Revolutionary hero, Margaret Corbin (Captain Molly) will take place at West Point and Highland Falls, N. Y., today. These memorials consist of an inscribed brass tablet, which will be presented to the Church of the Holy Innocents, at Highland Falls, and a granite memorial monument with bronze tablet, which will be erected to the United States Military Academy, West Point, New York. Brigadier General Joseph B. Stewart, superintendent of the military academy, will deliver the address accepting the latter memorial.

Mrs. Parker Leeds, of the ceremonies will be divided into two parts, that of the presentation of the tablet to the Church of the Holy Innocents at Highland Falls occurring at 12:30 p. m., in the following immediately afterward the presentation of the monument and tablet to the military academy, this latter ceremony taking place in the military cemetery, where Margaret Corbin's remains were reburied after their disinterment on March 16 of this year. For both occasions Mrs. Albert Brooks, Parker, chairman of the Margaret Corbin research and memorial committee will make the address presenting the memorials to the state on behalf of the committee, and Mrs. Charles White Nash, state representative of the New York state conference of the Daughters of the American Revolution, will make the address accepting and presenting the memorials on behalf of the state conference on both the Church of the Holy Innocents and to the military academy. Mrs. William T. Welden, state chair-

man of historic spots, will unveil the monument at the cemetery. The United States Military Academy band will be present at the ceremonies at West Point cemetery. After the address and upon the conclusion of prayer and benediction by the Rev. Clayton E. Wheat, chaplain of the West Point cemetery, soldiers at the military academy will fire three farewell saluting volleys, followed by the sounding of " taps " by the drum major. And thus will Captain Molly Corbin, after a hundred and twenty-six years, finally be laid to rest forever in the "honor roll" of the state of New York. Her grave, which is the location of the Revolution itself and among those who, like her, have also given their best, even their lives, for their country.

SALMON SUITS DWINDLE TO ONE POINT

Question of Whether Five-Sevenths Share of Water Stock Per Acre Shall Go to 300 Acres Is Sole Issue Under Adjudication; Partial Dissolution of Injunction; Awaits Only Drafting of Final Decree; All Elements in Favor of Plaintiff.

Only one legal issue remained to be determined out of all the litigation filed within the past dozen years on the Salmon tract, when the attorney for the defendant, J. S. P. Clark, yesterday afternoon and afternoon adjournment and that relates to the matter of delivery of five-sevenths extra share of water per acre to about 200 acres of land on the B. J. Allen estate. This water Judge Dietrich took under subordination. Final decree relative to partial dissolution of an injunction against delivery of stipulation and when these things are out of the way, the Salmon cases have been finished on much litigation and the litigation of the past. Final decree is a matter of only a few days. All elements are in harmony.

The Legal Issue.
In regard to the Allen estate, represented by Attorney T. K. Harkness who represented 60 of the 70 allottees in the matter which culminated in Judge Dietrich's court Wednesday afternoon, the estate has paid up water right for more than 200 acres within the segregated area, and asks for a five-sevenths extra share of water. In this case the beneficiaries, through their representative, Murray G. Harkness, and Harkness & Hays, their attorneys, point out that they have disposed of all shares in their possession outside the hands, including those in regard to which injunction has been issued outside the segregated area and that all left are appointed to handle the side required by them, through settlement or foreclosure. Judge Dietrich took, under subordination the question whether he should compel the beneficiaries to deliver the extra water to the Allen lands, and if so at what price.

Injunction Dissolution.
Dissolution in part of the injunction issued last summer to restrain the delivery of water to lands outside the segregated area, will be in part dissolved when stipulations mutually satisfactory are drafted by Mr. Harkness and Judge J. S. P. Clark.

This injunction was issued to prevent the accumulation of water between 200 and 400 acres of lands outside the stipulated area, for a part of which potential lands said to be inferior quality were offered for relinquishment. For over 200 acres of the land outside the stipulation area the state district court had issued a mandatory order for delivery of water. In this settlement of water stock for those particular lands has been acquired by Mr. Harkness and there was proposed the five-sevenths share to the acre in a number of instances.

In this last case, the injunction will continue in force, and Judge Dietrich said that the total irrigated area must be kept down to the maximum of 25,000 acres in accordance with agreement entered into with the settlement when the tract was cut down, and to keep faith with his court and with the department of interior.

Terms of Agreement.
Issuance of 22 decrees of foreclosure, default being entered in about 40 of these cases, the other beneficiaries where settlements have been effected and are continuing negotiations to establish title to their lands.
Issuance of 22 decrees of subordination in cases where retention mortgages have been executed and title has been established.
Confirmation of settlement with the beneficiaries for extra shares of water stock by holder of paid up water rights for lands taken up under subordination or through scrip purchases, in all except one case where it was asserted that there is no extra stock remaining for application to the lands in question. These beneficiaries appeared as intervenors in the action.

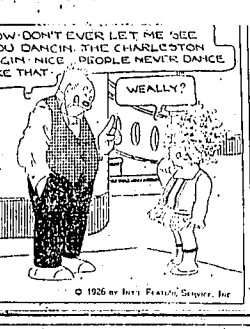

DEFIANCE OF POTATO BRAND STIRS INTEREST

The announcement of Carl DeLong of the firm of Cryder & DeLong, last evening that they would ignore the ruling of W. B. Klossness, state agricultural commissioner, holding that no potato should be sent in branded sacks after Saturday unless those bearing U. S. No. 1 or better, has created considerable stir. Mr. DeLong attributes the slump in the potato market which went down from \$5 to \$4.25 to this cause. E. V. Gilson, deputy horticultural inspector, said this morning that he understood the department intended to enforce the rule. He said that the law required 30 months notice to be given, that such notice had been given and that the time expired April 12.

In explaining this position, Mr. DeLong said that the rule could apply only to sales within the state. If therefore, did apply to their business. The provision to which Mr. DeLong had referred after defining the power of the department reads: "No person thereafter shall pack for sale, offer to sell or sell within the state any such farm product to which such standard is applicable unless it conforms to the standard."

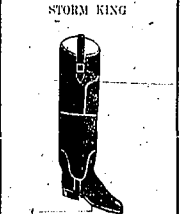
