

TWIN FALLS YOUTH IN BOUZE ROW

Maurice Sanderson Expelled From Oregon Institution For Alleged Use of Intoxicating Beverages.

WAGNER, Ore., April 17.—Maurice Sanderson, a student at the University of Oregon, was dropped from the institution today. Use of liquor was said to be the cause.

Sanderson, with Clarence L. Paly, a senior, was charged with the lawful presentation of a bottle of gin and tonics. Each was fined \$100.

LICQUOR HEARING. WASHINGTON, D. C., April 17.—Drys brought college professors and Canadian officials to their defense today to refute their evidence.

Concentrating upon these two features of their case before the senate subcommittee investigating the anti-saloon league, called a A. S. Gage, University of Chicago.

The drys plan to present their case briefly during the 15 hours of their day in court which was granted to them to answer the arguments of the wet.

It appears now that the hearings may close within a week. Drys obtained consent of the committee for four hours a day, which would conclude their case in five days.

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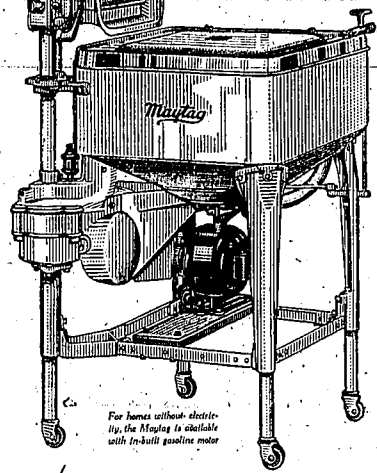

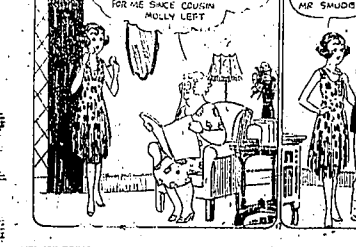

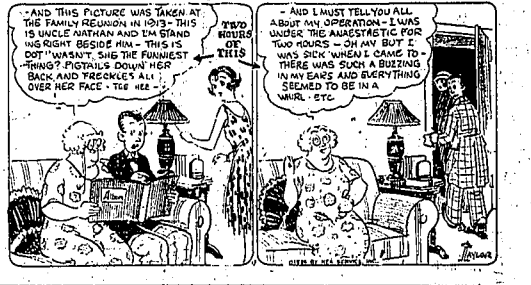

RECLAMATION SETTLERS TO BE HANDPICKED

It is too late to remove the dark spots from the early history of government reclamation and irrigation endeavors; but those dark spots should not be permitted to cast their shadows into the future and inspire gloomy predictions on coming federal activities in agricultural building. Secretary of Interior Work, in a recent public utterance, recognizes the basic ailment of government reclamation. He said that the wrong kind of settlers had been permitted to take up land on new projects. A survey of one project showed an ex-deep sea diver, an ex-baseball player and a half dozen other ex-this or ex-that, men who obviously were not fitted to take up new land and make it produce as might be expected.

Hereafter the government is going to hand-pick every settler for reclamation projects. In the early days of western colonization everyone was invited to come and take a homestead. The west wanted people and it didn't make much difference then whether they could make a success at farming or not. After several notable failures, some of which took place right in our own intermountain region, an era of enlightenment has dawned.

Reckless settlement of irrigation projects is just as damaging as reckless colonization. The west still needs more people, but one good citizen, a dependable pioneer who can be expected to build up the taxable wealth of the commonwealth, is of more value than a dozen herdled in just to increase the census count. In its strictest significance, "hand-picking" settlers may sound cruel, but it will eliminate in the long run a great deal of the suffering and sorrow that come when the law of the survival of the fittest begin to operate.

SOUTHERN UTAH WELL IS GUSHER

The first indication of an effort to make Salt Lake the center of the oil industry in Utah is the filing of an application by the Utah Oil Refining company for right-of-way for a pipe line from the well recently brought in nine miles southwest from Moab on an airline to a point on the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, a distance of about thirty-eight miles. The cost is estimated at about \$700,000. This proposed expenditure shows the faith of President John C. Howard in the future of the oil industry in this state and city, for the oil will be refined right here in Salt Lake.

There are a number of things which should be done at once in order to establish this city as headquarters for the development of the oil industry in Utah. The gusher now flourishing near Moab is but one well. Other wells are to be drilled in the same field, however, and so far little or nothing has been done in the way of providing accommodations in that locality for prospectors and investors who are desirous of taking a look at "No. 1" before investigating the possibilities in other Utah fields. It would be a wise move upon the part of the proper chamber of commerce committee, or the chamber itself, for that matter, to go very thoroughly into the matter of good roads, hotels, transportation, telegraph and telephone facilities in the eastern Utah oil fields. Certainly nothing that can be done for the comfort and convenience of capitalists and others who come to Utah to look over the oil fields should be left undone.

Chinese Rickshaw Is Being Displaced by Motor Cars

The rickshaw, that frail two-wheeled vehicle operated by man power, which has been the Chinese method of local transportation for centuries, is passing before the modern type of motor car and truck. The route of China have little room there for use of rubber tired conveyances, but many of the native population, as well as foreign residents, prefer this rickshaw mode of transportation which, even when it is displaced, is a country where this is reckoned by dynasties or centuries.

Even in the newer military regime of China, which is now building against the incursion of soviet doctrine, the motor truck has become an important link in the operations. The tie factor is regarding about this condition is the use of Dodge Brothers motor cars and Graham Brothers trucks, which are now in general use in the provinces of Hankow and Honan.

Recently a shipment of thirty Dodge Brothers trucks was made to General Wu Pei Fu, commander of the Chinese army at Tientsin, in the Province of Chihli. General Wu is using this fleet for transporting troops and for road building.

Two other large shipments of these units were received by the L. E. Gale company, Dodge Brothers dealers at Hankow. These shipments were the largest to other points in the province of Hankow and Honan for road building and for transportation needs.

The shipments comprised two train loads, one load containing 65 Gray Dodge Brothers trucks destined for Kankow, Honan. The other train load, consisting mainly of Dodge Brothers chassis, was for distribution from the L. E. Gale company's headquarters at Hankow.

The line shipment was made across the Pacific ocean to Shanghai, where the large shipment was transferred to lighters for the trip up the Yang Tze river, a distance of 600 or 700 miles inland. 

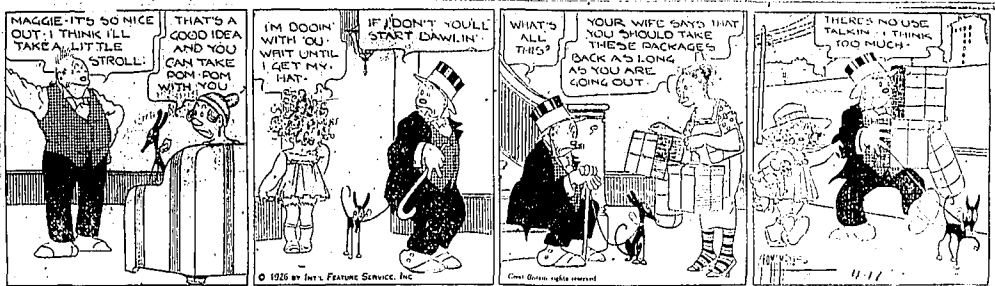
