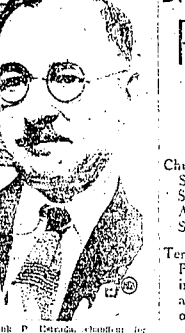
PERMANENT FARM RELIEF NOT LIKELY

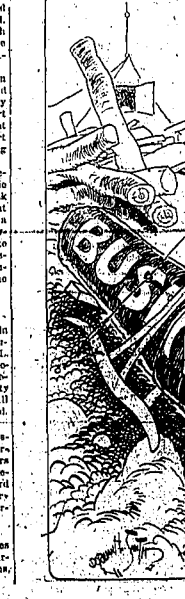

## W. C. T. U. REPORT ON RESOLUTIONS AS ADOPTED HERE

The following is the full text of the resolutions adopted Friday afternoon by the Women's Christian Temperance Union:

Resolved, That we urge the repeal of our slogan, "Adultery, Fornication and the wearing of the white ribbon have as a witness that we stand not on our heavenly Father for the protection and aid of the prohibitionist of the past year, therefore, Resolved:

First, That we urge all to work and pray for the election of dry men in our coming primary elections.

Second, That we urge the repeal of our slogan, "Adultery, Fornication and the wearing of the white ribbon have as a witness that we stand not on our heavenly Father for the protection and aid of the prohibitionist of the past year, therefore, Resolved:

Third, That we endorse the voluntary campaign plan for the prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors; that we emphasize our department work and especially those departments which are for the benefit of youth and children of the community.

### SELECT GOOD BULL FOR BEEF CALVES

Buying a good bull is the first step in growing better beef calves at much less cost per pound, says the United States Department of Agriculture in a circular letter.

Having selected a good bull, he is the breeder's individual in the herd. Not only should he have special feed at times, but he should be kept in a separate paddock of feed so that he may have the freshest of the herd except during limited seasons of the year. Unless a special lot of feed is provided, some means of giving the bull exercise should be provided.

The bull should be well fed during all seasons, but especially so just prior to and during the breeding season. It is possible to give the bull a ration may consist of roughage and grain, but a small quantity of grain should be fed. The grain quantities should be varied according to requirements. As a general rule excess quantities of silage should not be fed in a bull doing heavy service.

The feed for a bull should be given during as much time as would constitute a full ration for an average cow.

### Prevent Pig-Baiting by Proper Feed and Care

A sow's desire to eat her pigs may be a source of trouble, unless, although it is not intended to destroy her young. When the sow is complicated she becomes ferocious, and the piglets are in danger of being killed. 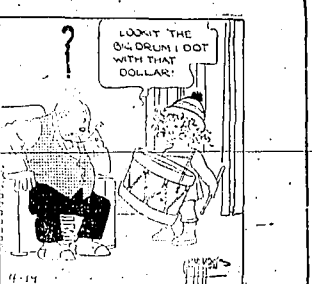

Herd of 19 registered and grade cows owned by Clyde Walker, here of Twin Falls, with average of 47.5 pounds of butterfat and 1227.5 pounds of milk per cow again held the title of herds with 15 or more cows, and the herd of 10 registered and grade Holsteins owned by J. R. Long Bull, with an average of 46.3 pounds of butterfat and 1104.7 pounds of milk, held first place in the medium sized herds of from 10 to 15 cows.

Three grade Jersey cows owned by Clyde Walker, here of Twin Falls, produced an average of 45.6 pounds of butterfat and 1037.3 pounds of milk and led the lot of honor roll for month.
