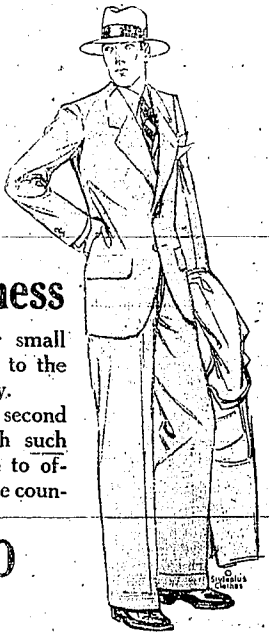

The Twin Falls Canal board is making a move in the right direction when they attempt to get an exact measurement of the water which is lost in transmission from Blackfoot to Milner dam. This information is essential to every irrigationist on the South Side tract and should have been compiled a long time ago in order to give the water users of this tract any justification as to their future protection against waste.

Until the word came from Portland yesterday to the effect that Murray would be on the job in a short time to start the Rim to Rim bridge across the Snake river a good many people had begun to think that the recent high water had washed the whole thing down the Columbia into the great Pacific, but we are glad that this is not the truth of the matter.

In the passing of former Congressman James H. Mays, Idaho and Utah loses a sterling citizen and an eminent statesman who served his country in a public and private manner which is worthy of the emulation of every real American. Three of his sons served overseas during the World war and the former congressman rendered valiant service for many patriotic organizations. The fact that the Twin Falls Canal company rejected the proposition to lift several thousand second feet of water from the American Falls reservoir and pass same through the canal for use on Salmon project lands need not be considered as a final rejection of this proposed plan. It has hardly been before the public long enough to allow sentiment to crystallize in its favor. If this proposition is worthy of serious consideration then it may be brought up again and again until it is given due consideration or until it gets a thorough hearing at any rate before the public and the canal board. We are only in favor of such projects in so far as they tend to provide more water for some of the acreage on this tract which now is in need of more irrigation water to make same produce to the limit.

MINIDOKA FARMERS TO FIGHT PHEASANTS; WILL DIP CORN

Crow repellent Will Be Used to Protect Grain from Chineses Imported Into Idaho. Request is Made for Open Season of 30 Days This Year.

Complaints are recently being made by a number of Minidoka farmers that the great red change is being done in some sections by Chinese immigrants taking up the corn out of the fields as fast as it is planted, says the Minidoka County News.

A letter received this week by Attorney H. V. Cronan, secretary of the Minidoka County Grain and Cattle Association, from Mike Crane, Minidoka, U. Thomas of Idaho, says:

"I have received several complaints from farmers in your county with reference to damage being done to their corn crops through the operations of Chinese pheasants.

"There is a solution known as 'crow repellent' that has been used with great deal of success in various sections of the state. The corn is dipped in this mixture before planting and when used in this manner the pheasants do not appear to bother." The solution, the letter adds, does not damage the corn.

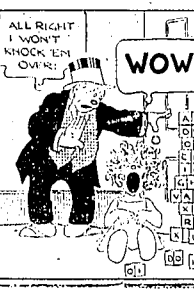
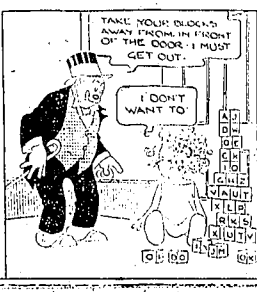

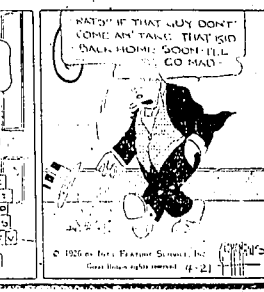
