Part Sales of Oakland Reduced to Minimum

A recent compilation of the several department records of the Oakland Motor Car company for the year 1925 revealed that parts sales to Oakland dealers averaged only \$7.28 per car, based on the total number of Oakland cars known to be in operation.

As these parts sales included a large volume of accessories, this actual parts rate for regulars averaged 11 cents much less than the per car amount.

The number of Oakland cars in service totaled 218,665, including all Oakland cars registered on January 1, 1925, plus cars sold during the year. According to M. A. Armstrong, director of service for the company, the low service cost per car is particularly significant, since approximately 20 per cent of these cars are more than five years old. The average part cost for 1925 is the lowest in Oakland's history, and the company were favorably with the entire industry, which is estimated to average about \$12 per car for all makes.

Each summer for seven years a Negro preachers' institute has been held at Bettis Academy, in the sand-hill country of western South Carolina. This year's attendance included 300 preachers and 180 teachers; and they spent four days in intensive study of educational and religious subjects, under the leadership of Dr. James H. Dillard, president of the Jeunes and Slater funds.

Extravagance and waste in county and state government must be eradicated at once or else the whole fabric of the majority party will be busted this fall when the voters go to the polls. Reckless spending of the people's taxes has been going on at a terrific rate and ordinary horse sense should have taught these representatives of the people that economy is the chief virtue of county and state officials. President Coolidge's suggestions along this line does not seem to have trickled through the surface of these men who handle other people's cash in an official sense.

Purchase of an attractive site for the new \$31,000 Eden high school building has been announced by the trustees of Eden's rural high school district. Bonds recently voted for this purpose have already been sold to the state. Bids upon the actual construction of the building are being received and it is believed that work will be commenced at some time in the immediate future.

Unusually large graduating classes will receive their diplomas in Idaho high schools this spring, according to word received at the offices of the state board of education. Nampa, Gooding, Emmett, Rupert and Meridian are among the cities which have reported record-breaking groups of seniors. That increases of this type reflects business prosperity is the opinion of the state commissioner of education.

Twin Falls high school's cost per student for the year 1924-25 was only \$83.25 as compared with an average of \$101 for Idaho and \$124 for the United States, according to information compiled by Ernest D. Bloom, superintendent of the Twin Falls schools, says a report from the State Board of Education.

On investigation recently made in schools of England developed that half of the school children who breathe through their mouths, a third of these who are hard of hearing, and a fourth of those who suffer from enlarged tonsils had these defects before coming to school, though the age of entrance is early in England. The need of pre-school medical attention was clearly shown.

The Texas Education Commission has recently been created by the executive committee of the State Teachers association. The commission will decide important questions of educational policy and practice submitted by the executive committee. The commission includes men and women prominent in many departments of educational work in the State. Expenses incident to the meetings will be borne by the Texas Teachers association.

BROAD CHANGE SANCTIONED
WASHINGTON, April 21.—The Interstate Commerce commission today authorized the Santa Fe railroad to an auto control of the Fresno Interurban railway, an 18 mile line in California. The control will be exercised for the purchase of capital stock.

WALLEY OIL MEET IN BUHL MONDAY

Gathering in West End City on Night of April 20 Will Take Up Question of Signatures with C. H. Mullins in Person;

There will be an oil meeting at Buhl Monday evening for the purpose of considering the conditions in Melon valley, for which nearly 200 acres have already been purchased under agreement with Charles H. Mullins of Miles City, Mont. At a meeting last Monday evening 1000 acres were signed up. Mr. Mullins will be present in person at the meeting, next Monday evening. Blank copies of the leases proposed for signature are already in the hands of Twin Falls people who are keen in Melon valley.

Terms of Lease. The terms of the lease provide for the payment of a royalty of 12 1/2 per cent of all gas and oil. Mr. Mullins agrees to send a geologist within 60 days from the acceptance of this lease and to commence drilling a well within one year on each piece of ground leased or within three and one-half miles of it within that time. If a dry hole is found a second well will be commenced within 12 months. The lease is good for five years and can be renewed as gas and oil is produced.

Mr. Mullins has the right to occupy so much of the lands as is necessary for such mining operation, prospecting, boring, drilling, producing and marketing gas and oil, to construct and maintain pipe lines which shall be buried 12 inches below the surface when otherwise would interfere with farming operations. He also has the right to build surface roads, buildings, tanks, the refineries and other structures to operate and market such products to use gas, oil and water from such lands as may be necessary without charge.
