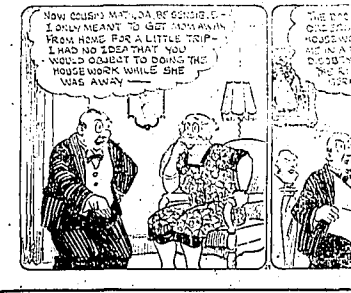

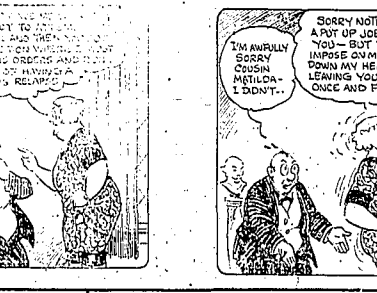

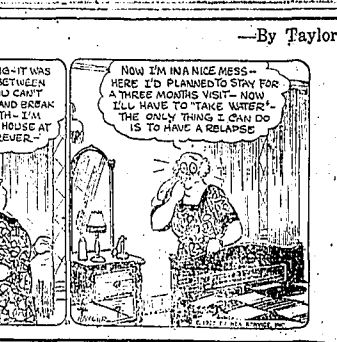

## TWINS OPEN FINAL WEEK OF TRAINING

Bull to Be Practice Camp During Last Days of Practice; Large Crowd Sees Regulars Down Yankees to 2.

Driving down the home stretch toward the opening date of the Philadelphia league schedule, the Twins entered their final week of practice Monday morning on the high grounds. They will open the season a week from tomorrow at Losan.

Manager Zambach has adopted the high ball as the most effective training spot in the region and each morning shortly before 10 o'clock the Twins pitched to the near-by city in a matter of hours, starting with the burning sun as the sun goes down in a blaze of glory.

If the final week of training for the Twins and, according to Manager Zambach, there is going to be plenty of work all week with practice games thrown in in profusion.

## FOUR COACHES OPPOSE TRACK MEET IN TWIN FALLS

Coaches From Burly, Filer, Rupert and Burley Complain That Track at Lincoln Field Is Not Proper Place to Hold District Track Meet; Bloom Replies.

Four coaches in Southern Idaho have filed protests against holding the district track meet at Lincoln Field in Twin Falls this week.

The following is the protest and how it was given some effect to these charges by Superintendent E. H. Bloom, manager of the district meet.

To the Board of Control, consisting of John H. Hillman, Pres. Its Twenty and E. H. Bloom:

"I am under the impression of the Southern Idaho District track meet on Lincoln field, Twin Falls, Idaho.

"We state the following reasons: 1. The track is 320 feet short of the 400 yard run.

"Second—There is no straightaway over 200 yards.

"Third—The track is not suitable for the various curves suitable to all participants.

"Fourth—The narrowness of the track—only five lanes in width.

"Fifth—By actual count only 125 people attended the sub-district meet April 23.

"Sixth—The management of the sub-district meet held in Twin Falls was inefficient and the organization poor.

"Signed and approved by the following coaches: S. S. Stevens, E. K. Kiferon, Rupert, Idaho; James H. Neal, Filer, Idaho; "Ernest Kimmion, Burley, Idaho; Bloom, Burley, Idaho.

In reply to the first charge that the track is 320 feet short of the 400

yard, it is actually 257 feet short.

Answering the second charge Lincoln field has a straightaway of 150 yards.

In reply to third charge ninety per cent of the colleges have tracks not over 1/2 mile in length and the law books are usually run on curved tracks.

Dee Alvord, who holds the state record in the low hurdles, got his training on the low hurdles.

Replying to the fourth charge Mr. Bloom states that there are six lanes of 40 inches width instead of five as stated by the coaches.

The State Bar Association is to be congratulated for having the backbone to express their conviction to the supreme court in favor of debarbing one former Attorney Dampier of Rupert for sending obscene literature through the mails. We have felt that this should be done for a good many months and if the attorneys in Idaho are to keep their skirts clean they must cleanse their organization just as all such bodies must do to hold the esteem and respect of the public.

Some reformers lack the consistency which should follow their strong proclamations to the people. The general public in Southern Idaho feels that the Idaho Power rates are too high and yet some writers will condone the Tower company for this reason or that. We have never been in favor of condemning a corporation or a business concern because of its size but we do believe that some regulation should be obtained in the hands of the people if we are going to continue a government of the people for the people and by the people.

The prosperity of Twin Falls and Southern Idaho in particular is reflected in the new buildings which are being erected in this section of the state. Improvements and enlargements to meet the demands of growing business concerns is the order of the day and nearly every carpenter in this county is engaged for the next few weeks. However, let us be conservative and go slow because there is danger of inflation when business is growing by leaps and bounds. We have always felt that it is best to be safe than sorry.

Few cities in the intermountain region look as beautiful at this season of the year as Twin Falls. Her streets are wide and clean, her lawns and gardens are well kept and a majority of the homes and other buildings are freshly painted and clean looking. As the lawns and trees are putting on their new green dresses the sight as one drives about is most beautiful to behold and yet we should not allow our pride to shakeen our efforts to make this more and more the city beautiful.

### BOOTLEGGERS MUST PAY INCOME (BY LESLIE J. ARBER)

A recent decision of the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals, New York (Second) Circuit, in the case of U. S. vs. C. J. Steinberg, involving the question as to whether profits from the illicit sale of liquor, commonly known as "bootlegging," and other criminal transactions, are subject to tax under the income tax law, will prove of interest. The government prosecuted Steinberg for attempting to evade the income tax law and making false and fraudulent income tax returns and alleged that he had made a profit of some \$760,000 from illicit sale of liquor in 1921, and Steinberg claimed that such profits were not subject to tax because of the illegality thereof. The Circuit Court reversed Steinberg's conviction on the ground that improper evidence was admitted, but held as follows:

"The profits arising from prohibited vocations (here, the sale of liquor in violation of the National Prohibition Act) are 'income' within the meaning of the statute and are taxable as such, and one who having made such profits fails to make return of the same is subject to the penalties imposed by the income tax laws for willfully attempting in any manner to defeat or evade the tax."

In discussing the legal question raised by counsel for Steinberg, the defendant, that such unlawful gains as the evidence tended to show were not income within the meaning of the Revenue Act of 1921, the court remarked:

"That the winnings of a professional gambler, the loot of a burglar, the bribes of a dishonest official, the wages of a prostitute, or the profits of any criminal commerce should not be regarded as income, but should for reasons of public policy be regarded as beneath the contempt of the law, is a proposition not without attraction. If they constitute income within the meaning of the law, it must follow that the net or taxable portion thereof must be reached by deducting all the ordinary and necessary expenses paid or incurred in carrying on the trade or business, wherever, whenever for profit maintain a trade, saloon, or fence, would have good right to claim as lawful deductions those losses for protection which are a notorious part of the profitable exercise of such vocations. The moral degradation arising from endeavor to collect a necessarily lawful tax out of occupations by equal necessity unlawful, corrupting and immoral, may well give one pause."

"The power of Congress to define or extend (it makes no difference which, the meaning of that phrase (intoxicating liquor) so as to cover beverages confessedly not intoxicating is too well known to require comment. If Congress can lawfully make and enforce a definition which is an admitted falsehood, as it now does, it can assuredly extend the meaning of the word 'income' to cover items beyond the definitions of any dictionary. That a given sinner or criminal must in the pursuit of his or her prohibited vocation break many laws to obtain the wherewithal to satisfy the taxing law, must be regarded as immaterial."

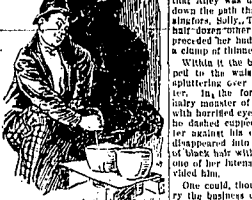

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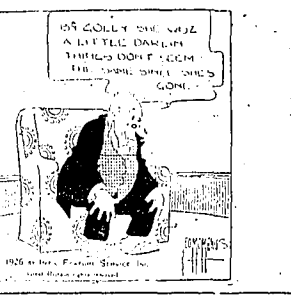
