The fruit crop in Twin Falls county has not been damaged nearly as bad as was first reported. This proves to be the rule and we feel sure after reading the report of the district horticultural agent that we will have a great deal of fruit in southern Idaho regardless of the heavy frosts which did considerable damage. Perhaps what fruit we have will be of a better quality and larger because of the frost cutting down the yield for each tree.

Regular attendance in the Preston schools is costing that city at least \$3000 each year, according to information recently compiled by Supt. J. W. Cordie. It has been estimated that the daily per capita cost of maintenance, whether the student is present or not, is 27 cents. Unfaithful attendance being responsible for almost half of all failures, computation of the dollars-and-cents costs of such failures (necessitating, of course, the repetition of work) becomes a relatively simple matter.

Every common school district in Bonner county is free from all indebtedness with the exception of bond obligations not due at the present time, according to data gathered by that county's superintendent of public instruction, Mrs. Jessie Hawkins Truck. This favorable condition is said to be due in part to prompt 1925 tax payments.

Some time ago we suggested a name for the Twin Falls baseball team and asked the public to suggest another name but thus far few names have been suggested outside of the two daily newspapers. Since then the name "Twin" has been suggested and we feel that this is the best suggestion that has come because it carries with a multitude of ideas concerning this part of Idaho and also carries the idea that it is a twin arrangement between this city and the other two cities in southern Idaho. Buhl and Burley have joined with Twin Falls in boosting this Utah-Idaho baseball league movement and it is fitting that some name should be used which will cover the idea and yet be typical of the scenery of this section. The name is also short and that is always essential in selecting a name for a baseball club.

The Twin Falls band is preparing for Music Week and for the summer concerts. This city will celebrate Music week in no unobtrusive fashion and beginning next Sunday special programs will be held in practically all of the churches and during the week many leading organizations will feature musical attractions of merit. Twin Falls is indeed a remarkable city for music and few cities this size will be able to celebrate in such a splendid fashion this annual festival.

SANER POLITICAL OUTLOOK

The following editorial from the Pocatello Tribune has a good ring for a newspaper which has followed the crooked path of the Republican party for thirty years or more. Perhaps the Tribune thinks it is about time to confess that everything which the G. O. P. fosters is not always according to the straight and narrow way and therefore the honest confession contained in these lines:

"We happen to be a Republican paper, that is, we believe that the policies as outlined by the Republican party are the most efficacious in the general run. When we say that we are Republican in policy, that does not mean that we are so side-bound that we believe that everything the Republicans do is without a flaw, and anything that the Democrats, Progressives, or Socialists suggest is of necessity, misguided. There were times when partisanship was so imbued in the nature of an individual that every party, except his own, appeared to be bent on the one purpose of sinking the ship of state with all possible dispatch. There are still some people who have such strong partisan views, but we are thankful to report that they are dying out, and we think it a good sign. The change in attitude speaks well for the mental ability of Homo Americanus.

"We do not know the situation as far as the Democratic press is concerned, but we do know that the Republican papers are favored with a free 'canned' editorial service which still clings to the old point of view. Every act of the Republican administration is treated as if it were specially inspired. It lauds the acts of an official, if he happens to be a Republican, and dams to the lowest depths the work of any misguided individual whose grandfather was born in Democratic Georgia or Progressive Wisconsin. The American public is tired of the old stuff. The people want facts and figures and the party which has the courage to come out in the limelight and admit its mistakes as well as praise its accomplishments is going to win out in the long run."

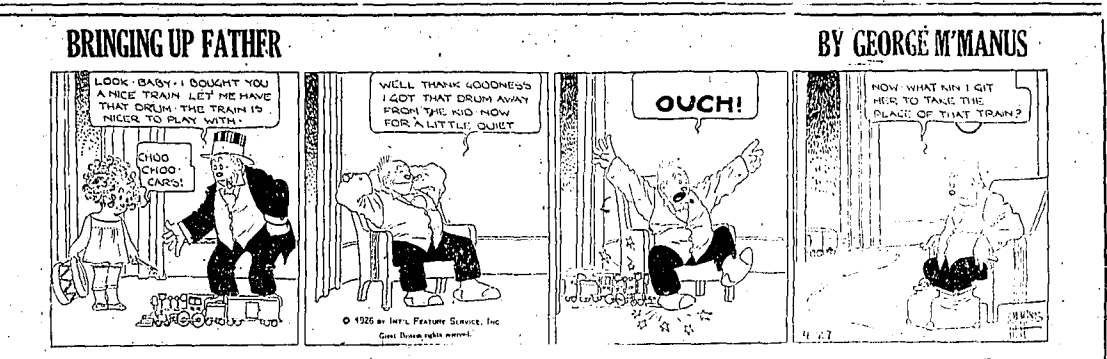

PUBLICITY AND IRRIGATION GET BOOST AT MEET

Speakers of Ranged Last Evening Telling Objectives of Idaho Chamber of Commerce and Modified Plan to Get Water on Salmon River in This County; California Location Results Are Told.

In the presence of 70 farmers, professional and business men at the Robinson hotel banquet presided over by Ascher B. Wilson of the Chamber of Commerce last evening, a modified plan for getting water to land around Twin Falls by way of turbines and Tom Hinkle's hold of the system where by the Idaho Chamber of Commerce plans to raise about \$250,000 in resources by means of systematic advertising. D. F. Dewelco spoke about the results of the recent California trip. President Nelson Heyward of the Salmon River Canal company, spoke of the benefits of the recent adjustment on the Salmon river and about the holding of the inception of the state-wide advertising to this city two years ago. A resolution adopted by A. D. S. Hinkle, H. E. Blumer and Merin G. Hatley, gave a musical program and led closing singing.

The New Plan. In his outline of the modified irrigation plan, Mr. Berg said that this system had been drafted mainly by H. W. Parks as a means of carrying water to the Hansen butte under the Carey act, but was abandoned owing to numerous objections under the present statute. It would consist of putting in the turbines by arrangement with the Twin Falls Canal company and carrying the water into a canal above the high-line and parallel therewith to the Salmon river. The turbines for carrying water to the Hansen would be in the high line and at the division for the Miller and Mountain districts. This would save the objection raised at the Twin Falls canal directors' meeting that the running of water through the canals would involve complicated problems of distribution.

Hedrick Hovels Advertising. Tom Hinkle, field agent of the Idaho Chamber of Commerce, told of the plan to raise and expend \$250,000 in advertising the vast resources of this state. The time has come for Idaho citizens to flush the structure of a completely developed state, supporting all of the industries and all of the population that it is capable of supporting. The Idaho chamber of commerce, properly organized and efficiently supported, will do more to bring population and wealth to Idaho than anything that has been presented in 40 years."

It was announced by Mr. Hovels that he would meet representatives of branches of three counties Thursday and with the state general committee in organizing the state advertising campaign.
