Labor Crisis Impends In England as Cabinet Considers Situation

All Eyes on Premier Baldwin, in Whom Power to Avert Strike Rests; Fight at Settlement Falls; May Continue Subsidy.

LONDON, April 30.—With only seven hours remaining to which to avert the coal strike and lockout which may begin at midnight, Premier Baldwin today met his cabinet in the house of commons to seek a last minute peaceful settlement. The cabinet was in session for minutes. There was considerable activity in the lobby where opinion was unanimous that the situation was grave. It is understood that the premier will be summoned to meet Mr. Huchingson, minister of the coal strike. Mr. Huchingson has left Windsor castle for London. Conservative quarters confirmed that the miners had rejected the cabinet offer. Although the miners insisted that they "never" had submitted to a "cave-in" proposal.

TRAIN SCHEDULES REDUCED 5 HOURS

CHICAGO, April 30.—Three rail lines operating between Chicago and the coast have announced a reduction of five hours in the running time between here and the Pacific coast. The fast trains will make the trip in 63 hours instead of 68 hours. There will be a \$10 increase in the fare. The roads announcing the new speed rate are the Santa Fe, Chicago and Northwestern, Union Pacific, and the Rock Island-Southern Pacific.

NINE BALLOONS STILL IN RACE

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 30.—Nine balloons and their crews, entrained for the National Geographic Society's expedition for the Lincoln flight, were all believed to be flying a steady course through southeastern Missouri and southwestern Illinois, hoping for favorable weather. The balloons have been in the air over 3 hours with no sign of report down.

40 CONVICTS STAGE RIOT

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 30.—Details of a riot at Folsom prison, where 40 infuriated convicts sought to kill 20 check inspectors by hurling bricks at them, were reported today. Today as officials retreated into the disorders there, White Freeman and Tom Tucker, two white convicts, were taken to "straw boxes," who had given testimony before the grand jury investigation of alleged riotous prisoners, in favor of prison officials, were the intended victims. Both Freeman and Tucker are trustees.

Kingmore, through attorneys, has unsuccessfully tried to evade the punishment.

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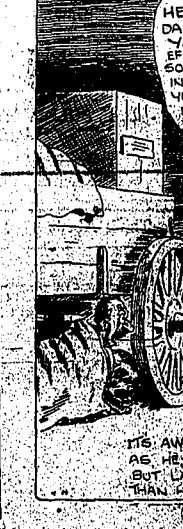

Taking the Profit Out of War

By BERNARD M. BARUCH

[The February issue of the Atlantic for 1925 carried a paper by Mr. Slaty...]

War was once described as Prussia's most profitable industry... It needs only a scant examination of history to learn that other countries were assiduous to the same business.

So, as America has taken the lead in making impossible national profit through war, it too may be America's privilege to point the way to other nations... It is more than a belief—it is a certainty, although not widely known.

At the time we entered the war, the price of steel was at its peak, and tending higher because of the war's insatiable demands... The price of steel was at its peak, and tending higher because of the war's insatiable demands.

The resources of a country might be referred to as the five M's: (1) man power; (2) money; (3) material resources; (4) machinery; (5) morals.

It was comparatively easy to fix prices and to distribute material, and indeed to stabilize the wages of labor in those industries in which prices were fixed.

It is only fair to say that this condition was primarily brought about by the patriotic and patriotic spirit of the war.

So it became evident that the price fixing program had to go even further... The war industries board was organized like any other supervisory committee.

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One of them provided that manufacturers, jobbers and retailers of shoes could make and sell shoes only of a fixed quality at a fixed price from effective July, 1919.

Another plan of this nature: The wearing apparel had in 1918 been called to Washington, together with the various industrial groups and notified that regulations would have to be made in regard to retail prices and the method of distributing.
