

Great Britain Empowers Armed Forces to Check Her Increasing Disorders

Government Discounts Reports of Riots; Radio Message Serves Army and Navy With Power to Act to Preserve Peace.

LONDON, May 7.—The British government operating under the drastic emergency powers act, today authorized her soldiers and sailors to act as they saw fit to prevent disorder of which it appears to be increasingly apprehensive.

The following message was broadcast over the official wireless this afternoon: "All ranks of the armed forces of the crown are hereby informed that any action they may find necessary to take in honest endeavor to aid the civil powers will receive, both now and hereafter, the full support of his majesty's government."
