

ONE KILLED 14 INJURED IN TORNADO

Storm Sweeps Through Three Oklahoma Counties; Damage \$50,000.

Massachusetts Summer Resort Swept by Fire; 12 Summer Homes Burned.

SPRUH, Okla., May 8.—One dead, 14 injured, six seriously and more than 50 homes destroyed by a tornado that swept through eastern Oklahoma counties last night. Damage is estimated at \$50,000.

The dead: Leonard Tidwell, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Tidwell, whose house was swept away.

SPRINGFIELD, Miss., May 8.—The Casino, the club house and more than 12 summer homes of North Spring, Miss., were destroyed by a fire that started in the Casino building.

A fireboat was summoned from Gloucester and two coast guard patrol boats aided in battling the flames, which spread rapidly before a heavy wind.

The fire which started in the Casino building was discovered by the lighthouse-keeper on Bakers Island, had a half way. The fire was still burning this afternoon when it had caused the estimated upward of \$100,000.

DID NORSEMEN REACH AMERICA? MACMILLAN WILL SEEK ANSWER

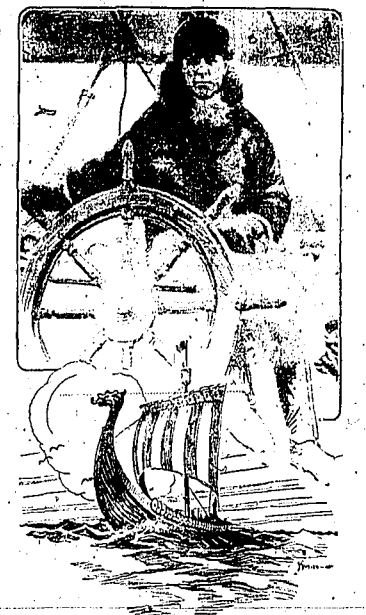


Photo of Donald B. Macmillan, Polar explorer, at the helm of his ship and below, an artist's drawing of an old Viking craft.

SPACE LEASED IN HOME OF PRESS CLUB

\$10,000,000 Edifice Will Be 13 Stories High, a Monument to Newspaperdom.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—Seventy-five per cent of the space of the National Press building, the new home and office building of the National Press Club, under construction here, has already been leased.

The structure is being erected on the site of the historic Exhibit House and Newspaper Row which adjoined the hotel-for-many-years and which lay overgrown blight in the early part of the century. The location, 14th and P. streets, N. W., is in the heart of the business section of the city and within walking distance to most of the government departments and the White House. The cost of the project including the land will be \$10,000,000.

The building will be thirteen stories and basement. The lower, and interior portion will house a 2,500 seat theatre which has been leased to Fox Theatres Corporation for thirty-five years. The remainder of the first floor will be the exception of the theatre to the theatre and the building will be occupied by stores that the expected to bring the highest rents in the history of Washington real estate.

The second to the eleventh floors, including the part that will be used for the theatre, will be divided into offices for newspaper correspondents, news associations and other professional tenants. The top two floors will be the home of the National Press club. The National Press building will stand as a monument to the press of the United States.

SOVIETS IN EFFORT TO AID STRIKE

English Refuse Offer of \$1,000,000 From Russia; Communists Urged.

Japanese Workers Urged to Give Financial Aid to British Comrades.

MOSCOW, May 8.—Russian trade unions are to send two million rubles to the British strike committee, in addition to a previous gift of a quarter of a million rubles.

Another 200 million gold rubles, at present exchange, equal \$100,000,000. The communist international has written the British communists, declaring:

"Your task is to raise the strike movement to the highest form of a liberation of the working class for ever."

The letter adds that the question of forming a labor government in England is the immediate task of the day. It outlines the program for such a government, including nationalization of the coal industry, satisfaction of the demands of the strikers and giving work to unemployed.

LONDON, May 8.—British labor today refused to accept assistance in the industrial war from communists in Moscow.

The Trades Union Council announced that a check for a "considerable sum" had been returned to Moscow from an expedition of warm approval of the gift.

HONOLULU, T. H., May 8.—The Japanese Federation of labor unions has announced that it has agreed to contribute to the financial aid of British strikers, according to a special Tokio dispatch today to the Hawaii Herald Star.

All Japanese labor organizations are voting sympathy for the strikers and leaders have forwarded messages of encouragement to British comrades.

BASIN OF VOLGA RIVER FLOODED

MOSCOW, May 8.—The Volga river basin is suffering from the worst floods since 1894. The great Russian stream has spread out to a breadth of 29 miles near Kostomarov. Reports that 2000 houses have been swept floating downstream came from Nizhnevograd. No estimate of damage or casualties has been made.

SUFFRAGIST IN ROLE OF BOBBY

LONDON, May 8.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, former militant suffragist, joined the women's auxiliary police service today for the first time in the strike crisis.

"I felt that I had to do something in the face of this great emergency," she told the United Press. "I have no contact with my own organization as a result of my seven years in Canada."

"I sought to join the most vital service in the emergency which would make for the preservation of order and hence joined the auxiliary police service."

Mrs. Pankhurst declined to comment on the various charges of violent resistance in the police which she was formerly a famous exponent in winning strikes.

ANDREWS TO ASK CHANGES IN DRY LAW

Seeks Leaders of Bootleg Industry; Home Brewing May Have Approval.

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Home brewing and even running a small still in a private dwelling will be the product for personal consumption, may be carried on free from federal interference under the new plan announced today by Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews.

Recognizing that a man's home is his castle, the dry ear has decided to ask congress to change the wording of pending legislation designed to allow federal agents to search any private dwelling suspected of violating the prohibition law.

Andrews sent a bill to congress to strengthen the Volstead act. Its search would be limited to a search of stills. The prohibition chief has agreed to change the measure so that the government officers can obtain search warrants for private dwellings only after it is ascertained that intoxicants are being made for "commercial purposes."

Home brewing or any making of beer from alcohol does not worry Andrews. He is after the ring leaders of the bootleg industry and in fact, looks certainly to drive all illicit manufacturing of intoxicants directly into the homes of citizens.

British Leaders Fear Growth of Radicals as Week of Strike Ends

Soldiers Discard Braid and Trimmings and Don Khaki As Empire Prepares for Eventualities

LONDON, May 8.—The British army today put on active service uniforms for the duration of the strike emergency.

In the soldiers' guards parade and at Buckingham Palace, where entries on duty usually were now to be seen in khaki and full war equipment.

The fear that groups of strikers may desert their present conservative leadership and align themselves behind the radical elements of the labor party is growing as Britain faces the first week-end of the general strike.

ABOUT ENGLAND. Meanwhile the government is taking active measures to cope with trouble. Tanks moved alongside, a fleet of patrol boats, this morning, their destination unknown.

Following rumors to the effect that two million men were to be called out by the army, the government officially informed the United Press that it has made no plans to call out its second line of workers which agreement on one hand and the great forty-eight persons have been arrested following disorders in Glasgow.

Mr. Winston Churchill, wife of the chancellor of the exchequer, is sharply interested in the most important major problem, local transportation.

NEW YORK.—Ready Mann may take to the courts, the objection of the state athletic commission which voided his contract as manager of Harry Gray. The former middleweight champion claimed that Mann had tricked him into signing the contract.

At midnight a convoy of 200 food trucks, each carrying three or more steel belted troops armed with rifles, passed through Central Park going from the docks district to the government's food depot in Hyde park.

The convoy was escorted by 15 armored cars.

WAR VETS IN DRY PROTEST

NEW YORK, May 8.—In a naive protest against prohibition, a delegation from the World War Veterans Club Wine and Beer League today draped their banner over the statue.

For ten minutes two black banners 15 to 20 feet long from the top of the statue which depicted the soldiers in the front of the war were waving down the bay and watching the strange spectacle.

At the trial before Judge P. M. Gurnea the court made the trip without the protesting veterans. They were dressed in citizens clothes and did not reveal their names.

It was too minor and insignificant a demonstration of the kind was notified of the act and was immediately pulled down. The club members were warned by the police and the banner was taken down.

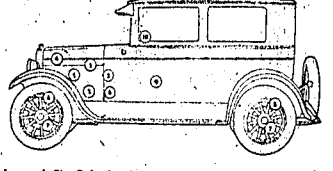

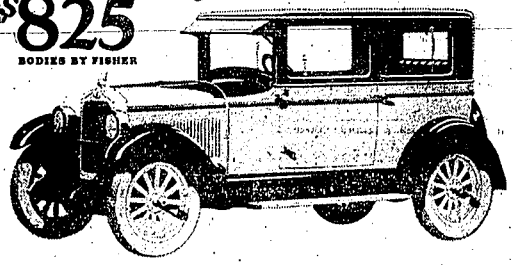

IDAHO JUDGE MAY BE APPOINTED

A vacancy has been created on the circuit court bench through the resignation of Judge Wallace McCamant of Oregon. This resignation has been accepted. It is effective on May 3 when Judge McCamant will retire. He was originally appointed by President Coolidge, whom he placed in nomination for vice president at the republican national convention. Senator Johnson of California, opposed the confirmation of the nomination of McCamant, charging the latter with violating the instructions given him by the voters of Oregon as a delegate to the republican convention. His instructions were to support Johnson. The fight on Judge McCamant's confirmation was intensified when he stated before the senate judiciary committee he did not consider the late Theodore Roosevelt a good American. This he qualified in a statement given to the press the next day, asserting he said "Roosevelt's judicial decision was not good American doctrine." Johnson's charges and Judge McCamant's testimony and statements eventually developed a situation that made confirmation of his appointment impossible. Apparently, to relieve the embarrassing situation he has resigned, says The Capital News. This vacancy on the circuit court bench should particularly interest Idahoans, because there is, on the federal bench in this state, a jurist who has every qualification for circuit court judge. Judge Frank S. Dietrich, who for so many years has served the Idaho jurisdiction of the federal court so aptly and well, should be a successor to Judge McCamant. He is not only possessed with every qualification, but his long service on the district court bench merits a promotion to the circuit court.

Honors Paid Leader of Woman Suffrage

Representatives of women's organizations in Norway recently gathered together to pay tribute to the memory of the first 100 year-ages of Asta Huxton, one of the pioneers of the woman's movement in that country and a worthy and original aid who has been the model for Norwegian dramatists and sculptors. Hints to waters of dry creek in litigation since 1908 were determined late yesterday by Judge W. A. Haddock. There were more than 20 litigants whose joint and several rights aggregated 2779 inches. The title of the action was Jerry Donald, et al vs. Frank Terrill, et al.

Terms of Decree.
The decree reaffirmed decree entered March 7, 1924, by District Judge Little Price in the case of F. J. Terrill and Annie Terrill against Samuel Land, A. J. Fuller and J. E. Bower for adjudication of dry creek water rights, and established water rights on the stream as follows:
