Idaho Realtors Meet in Twin Falls Riots Increase; Strikers Seek Funds

Flyer Reaches Pole by Plane; 15 Hour Flight

Commander Byrd Wins Honors for America in First Air Flight to World's Top; Only Two Others Have Same Distinction.

Lieutenant Commander Richard E. Byrd, U. S. N., and Floyd Bennett, his pilot, returned today to King's Bay, Spitzbergen, after 15 hours flying in their big three motored Fokker plane, and announced they had flown to North Pole.

If their claim is substantiated by scientific checking on instruments and data, they will have brought to America signal honors. They will be recognized as two of four persons who have seen the North Pole. All of the four are Americans.

The Robert E. Peary, who in 1909, at the climax of years of persevering effort, marched with dog teams over the Arctic ice to the pole and Matt Henson, who was Peary's sole companion in the final sled trip to the top of the world's Peary in 1909, and two men who were in comparative obscurity, much of the time in New York.

Byrd staked everything on a desperate effort to realize an ambition to be the first to reach the pole by air and to beat the record expedition ever to reach it.

He had originally set to wait until later in the season before making "first attempts," said Captain Richard E. Byrd, who is the American representative on the expedition.

Byrd's expedition set their departure for early in King's Bay, and their polar dog team, Captain George Wilkins, and the Detroit Aero-Club expedition in Alaska.

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NORTHEAST TEXAS HAS HAIL STORM

Ice Blocks As Large As Hen Eggs Pepper Region Near Dallas; Windows Suffer.

Demonstration Follows Million Dollar Barrage of Saturday Night; Crops Lost.

DALLAS, Tex., May 10.—North-east Texas drew its quota of hail, wind and rain today following a week-end of high temperatures, according to advices here.

On the heels of Dallas' million dollar hail storm barrage Saturday night, heavy ice fell at Denton, Denton and Honey Grove today.

Denton reported hail stones as large as hen's eggs, with considerable wind. Hundreds of windows were broken in the residential sections, while downtown business houses were seriously damaged. Heavy wind uprooted trees but no casualties were reported.

Crops and gardens were ruined at Honey Grove by hail and wind followed by a soaking rain. North and west windows were swept clean by the hail, which lay six inches deep in the streets at the height of the storm, the advices said.

Ditched Car to Avoid Collision; Auto Burned Up.

In order to avoid a collision with a live car which was racing east at 10 o'clock last night at a point just beyond Hansen, Jack Tarr ran his car into a ditch, turning it over. The auto, a 1916, was completely wrecked and was destroyed. Mr. Tarr says that just after crossing the bridge over the ditch he saw two cars approaching, evidently racing. Just as they got near him, one started to pass and there was no room for all three on the road.

Mand and Woman Fight Duel with Shotguns in Row

COLIHA, Calif., May 10.—John Haeche, Williams resident, was held in jail here today following a shotgun duel with Mrs. William Duncan, in which the woman was killed.

The shooting occurred in the yard of the Duncan home, where it is claimed Haeche followed his wife from their residence and started an argument. He ordered her to retreat, some shot and refused, Mrs. Haeche told authorities.

Mrs. Duncan ordered Haeche to leave "or I'll shoot you." Haeche went home and secured a weapon, returned to meet Mrs. Duncan similarly armed. Both shot, and the woman fell mortally wounded. Haeche was not shot in the stomach but was seriously hurt.

"CAT EYE ANNIE" TUNNELS OUT OF NEW YORK PRISON

Notorious Jewel Thief Digs Through 18 Inch Wall and Scales Another.

AUBURN, N. Y., May 10.—Directed by a woman, an 18-inch wall was tunneled through at the New York State Prison here today.

The woman who was serving a ten-year sentence for grand larceny, was in solitary confinement as an incommunicado. She escaped by wall entries were off duty.

After digging through the wall with an iron bar used for raising the heavy prison windows, she took a plank from the green house and scaped a 12-foot wall to freedom. When she was out, searching parties have been unable to find any trace of her.

VIOLENCE INCREASES IN BRITAIN

Two Constables Wounded in London Clashes; Crowd Fights for Food.

LONDON, May 10.—Violence broke out today in London on the seventh day of the strike. A special constable was stabbed in the back today and another special constable was struck over the head with a hammer and seriously injured in a riot at Nine Elms, South London, the government announced.

Forty persons were charged in a Canningtown riot, according to a government statement. Two persons were arrested. Seven persons were arrested in suburban Crookston.

A crowd attacked a food truck three miles from Newcastle and gave the police a hard fight before they were driven off. Seven persons were arrested.

Workers in 23 countries of the world were requested to rush funds to the British strikers to enable them to hold against government efforts to smash the general strike which began seven days ago.

The Trades Union Congress committee this afternoon announced that \$25,000 had been received from the Dutch Federation of Trades Unions and that the general plan for funds had been telegraphed by the International Trades Union headquarters in Amsterdam. The telegram was to all affiliated unions.

Conciliatory tone and optimism characterized today's official government communique in which the government summarized the developments of the past 48 hours. The strike was principally distinguished by the prevalence of good order, the communique said.

Strikers and a flying squad of special civilian constables fought a sharp battle today.

Co-operation Advocated as Progressive

Idaho Real Estate Men Open Annual Meeting at Elks Hall; Mayor Ashton Welcomes Delegates to City; Sessions End Tuesday.

The value of advertising as a means of bringing people to Idaho was stressed this morning at the meeting of the Idaho Real Estate convention in session at the Elks' hall. State-wide co-operation of the real estate men was strongly urged as a means of attracting capital from the outside and show it as a means of "selling Idaho" to its own inhabitants. Delegates were present from seven Idaho cities and from Idaho Falls.

Delegates Are Welcomed. Mayor E. H. Ashton welcomed the delegates in behalf of the city in an address in which he told of the accomplishments of real estate men in the Twin Falls tract in advertising it to the world. When the town was laid out 22 years ago, the early settlers were discouraged until Robert McCullum and a few others went to the real estate business and "sold the world" about the advantages of the town and tract. "We welcome you, because we realize what real estate men do toward building up the state and country," he said.

Thomas Lige Co-operation. Charles D. Thomas welcomed the delegates in behalf of the Twin Falls Realty board, all which he predicted that co-operation of the real estate men in advertising in the state will add all communities should co-operate rather than pursue a selfish policy.

The presiding officer, C. J. Brown, vice president of the Northwest Real Estate association, responded briefly to the greetings extended.

Edmunds Talks Publicity. "We are spending \$1,000 a month in advertising Idaho Falls," and "we will do it for the rest of \$1,000,000 a month," Ralph B. Edmunds, president of the Idaho Falls Real Estate board, was a main speaker today. "What the Matter With Idaho?" "Since February we have sold \$1,000,000 worth and have spent \$100,000 in advertising. We have a splendid building program mapped out; property prices have advanced rapidly and the community is prosperous as never before. If we will get the word out, we have people who will come to this state by the million."

"I came up with a party from California in 1924. The state was in a condition of mutual reaction and discouragement. The newspapers were talking about the 'unfortunate' situation. Farmers were discouraged and anxious of turning Idaho back for the Indians. We organized in September of that year and suggested to the mental people that prevailed. We began to talk up Idaho as the people

TWIN FALLS COUNTY PRODUCTION RECORDS

The following facts are reprinted from our issue of January 30 for the benefit of our visiting neighbors who are here today from all over Idaho.

Twin Falls came into existence in the spring of 1901 through the construction of the Milner dam, which is a unique structure owing to the fact that it consists of a battery of steel gates placed across the river which permits the delivery of water to what is known as the Twin Falls South Side tract and the Twin Falls North Side tract.

The soil in this section of the country is known as the Portneuf silt loam. It is very productive when saturated with water, as is done through our irrigation systems. When the dam was constructed practically all of the land under the two tracts heretofore mentioned was a waste of sage brush.

From this development Twin Falls has grown from some three houses in 1904 to a population of over 10,000 people as shown by the 1920 Federal census which places it as the third city in the State of Idaho.

Twin Falls has sixteen miles of paving, sufficient shade trees and shrubbery to make things home-like; has fifteen church denominations, the usual organizations of a city and sufficient well ventilated school houses to care for the three thousand students that attend school, several wholesale houses and the usual number of mercantile and financial establishments in a city of our size.

In the Twin Falls section of the Snake river valley there has already been developed 35,000 horsepower electrical energy from the Falls of the Snake river, and it is estimated that in this section alone 85,000 horsepower may be developed when it is necessary. Electricity in this section is used for lighting, cooking, heating and power purposes.

We have over 300 miles of cement, gravel and other types of paving in Twin Falls county, with new miles of improvements being made with each year. Climatic conditions are ideal for this altitude. Seldom does the thermometer ever get down to one below zero. Automobiles can be operated the entire year. We are blessed with early Springs and late Falls. The Twin Falls tract waters through corrugating rather than flooding. Our crops are those usually raised in this latitude and the following statement furnished by a local organization, after a sur-

vey of the 1923 crops, will give you some idea of the production on the Twin Falls Tract:

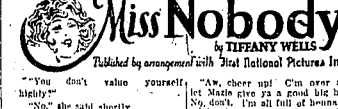

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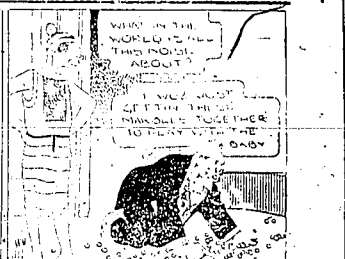
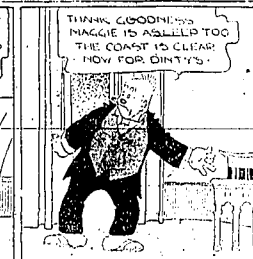

# BUHL MAN IS KILLED IN NEAR BURLEY SUNDAY

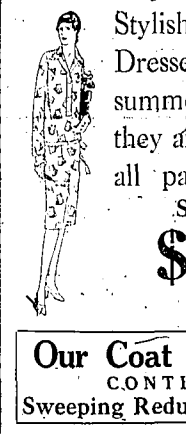
