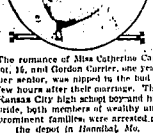

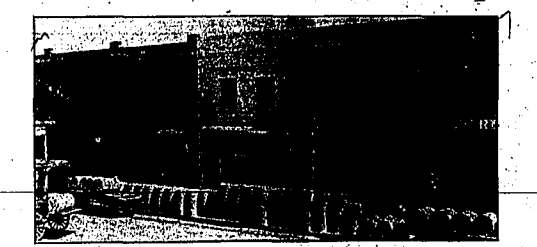

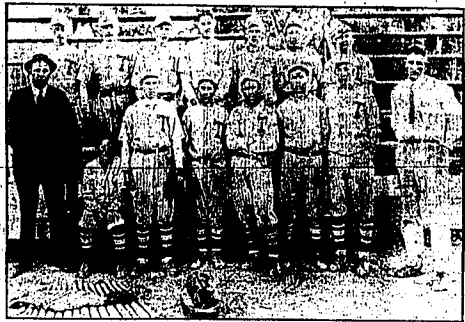

TWIN FALLS COUNTY EXPENSES SHOW HUGE INCREASE DURING PAST FISCAL YEAR

The big increase in the expense of running the county for the year which closed January 10, 1926, amounting to over \$80,000, in many departments indicates that the so-called "Coolidge economy" did not strike here. Perhaps, however, Will Rogers is right in discriminating between republican economy and democratic lower taxes, for taxes will not be reduced by the sort of economy shown by the annual report published by the county auditor. It is true that all republican officials did not have increases. It is true, too, that figuring the extra items like the presidential election, which came on under the democratic board, the total increase for the past year is nearer \$13,000 than \$80,000, but the whole tenor of the report shows big increases. Aside from the county board itself, which spent slightly less on its own department than its predecessor, all the saving items were by democrats. The reduction in the office of the sheriff is striking. The district court costs are less. There was a saving of \$1200 in the fair expenses, under a democratic manager, although there was charged against this department \$3,665.83 for new buildings. Aside from this expenditure the cost of the fair decreased \$4,723.33. The five items: hospital, health, isolation, cost of poor and the division headed appropriations and contributions showed a total increase of \$26,000.

The hospital expense increase was beyond all reason. In this as in other instances, reasonable increase might happen, but it should not require \$14,000 more to run that institution in 1925 than 1924. And while weed extermination is a live issue, it does look as if an increase of \$7,000 for the department is beyond reason. Again an increase in care of the poor of about \$3,000 seems absurd. The same may be said of the increase of \$1900 in the matter of public health. All the appropriations for these departments where increases are heaviest are under the control of the present republican board of commissioners. The same incapacity which seems likely to lose the rim to rim bridge has been shown in handling these departments and the board and the party which elected them cannot escape responsibility.

Had the county commissioners spent a little more time and money seeing that the county got its money's worth, they would have done better.

Save the Thursday Times for reference. The story of May 7 tells a lot about county finances as shown by the report of the present republican auditor of Twin Falls county.

It is said that the present board intends to discontinue the salutory practice established by their predecessors of having an audit by a certified public accountant, and this on the ground of economy. This sort of audit which sets forth the details of who gets the money and for what reason, is worth more than its costs. Of course, one can go to the county clerk's office and by staying there long enough can find out what it is all about, but nobility will, nor will they check up and compare published minutes. A return to the system of an audit by an accountant, with recommendations attached is worth while.

However, the voters are, after all, to blame. Whether they will approve of the present county administration by their votes is a question. A striking reduction in state taxes under democratic administrations was followed by an increase of \$10 under a republican governor who promised a taxless state. But the voters returned this governor and those identified with him are still in power. Will history repeat itself?

ROAD BUILDING

POOR ROADS URGE TOO MUCH SPEED

"There is a connection between good roads and safety," says Charles A. Hayes, president of the Chicago Motor club. "When a new road is built it is generally the practice to build it as it is properly marked, that curves are gentle or that they are super-elevated, that as many railroad crossings as possible are made level, that the highway engineers of today bring to bear upon their work a knowledge of accident prevention.

"If the road from the motorist's home to his office is built in places, he tries to make up for the time lost on the last spot by going faster than he should where the road is good. If the road were all good, he should enjoy himself at an even and moderate rate of speed. But roads urge drivers to extra speed.

"Bad roads cause errors; they lose time and state of mind, and they are indirectly responsible for many accidents.

"The menace of the glaring headlight is none so deadly on the unimproved road. The element of danger that is present in light climbing is almost entirely eliminated on the improved road. The danger of skidding on improved roads is not nearly so great as it is on the unimproved.

"Many old roads, built in the horse-and-carriage days, crossed railroad tracks diagonally; this, of course, dangerous, and the new roads now being built that eliminate the crossing, if it is possible crossings are constructed at right angles with the railroad.

"When expensive roads are built, maintenance must be carried on, and this necessitates a crew of workmen, mechanics and other dangers through contact with an unimproved road, are eliminated. If a portion of the improved road is made impassable, maintenance gangs immediately post detour signs.

"As improved roads are uniformly wider than the unimproved road, the danger of the narrow road is lessened. We need more consideration of the physical aspects of streets and highways and less of an inclination to crowd them with automobiles.

"In the future, hope that our society lies in many ways. The building of good highways and competent engineers will decrease accidents."

SAFETY AUTOS URGED by Police Chiefs



HOW TO CUT DOWN MOTOR ACCIDENTS

THOMAS BIRL says 50% of the nation's police chiefs favor the following plan to prevent the mounting motor auto accident toll which in 1925 cost 23,000 lives:

1. Limiting speed capacity to 25 miles an hour.
2. ABSOLUTELY closed car bodies on same principle as street cars.
3. Regular inspection of cars, especially the brakes.
4. Standardized traffic laws.
5. Drivers license subject to stricter tests.

These facts were disclosed by an investigation conducted by the American Automobile Association in a study of police chiefs in 1925. It was found that the plan is favored by the police chiefs of 100 out of 100 cities. The results of the study are summarized in the report of the National Traffic Conference on Street and Highway Traffic, published by the American Automobile Association in 1925.

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The first question about safety is in closed car construction. Thomas M. Howe, president of the Chicago Motor Club, has suggested the plan for the police, that many accidents are caused by motorists "who look down the road."

"Motorists who have never tried the closed car will get a very different idea out of a motorist's eyes when they are trying to explain how the accident happened," he said in a recent issue of Motor News.

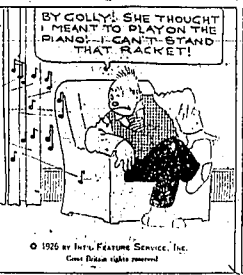

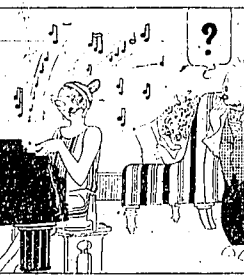
