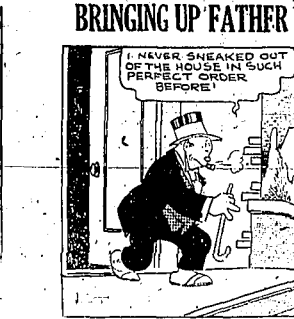

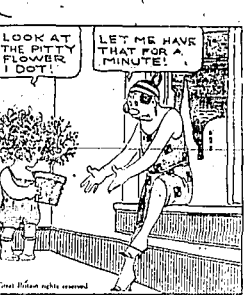

CLEAR LAKES IMPROVEMENT EXTENDED YEAR

Reclamation Commissioner Gives W. C. Hazard or Successors Until May 21, 1927, to Meet Statutory Requirements on Power Site on Which City of Twin Falls Has Option.

Time for making required improvements on the Clear Lake power site was extended today for a period of one year from May 21, by Warren H. Swedenborg, state reclamation commissioner in favor of W. C. Hazard. This gives the city of Twin Falls one year to carry into effect the conditions of its tentative option on the site, should circumstances develop in the future so that the city should desire to exercise such right.

The extension was sought by Mrs. May Snyder and by the Idaho Power company at the time that request for it was made some months ago. The power company had a second filing on the site and had the same extended without extension, the company would have been in possession next January for the occasion, the priority of filing was in litigation for years. Hazard decided the power company in the local court, and on hearing and releasing in the district court.

The city as a condition for its option extended today for a period of one year from May 21, for which it retained the privilege of buying, if it should so desire, the site for \$100,000 or before July 27, 1927, in carrying out this agreement, City Attorney Frank L. Stephen and Mayor E. J. Anderson appeared with Attorney Herffert at the time when the extension was made. Extension was asked for two years.

SUSPECTS RELEASED; REARRESTED

Prosecuting Attorney Moves Discharge When Matter of Huleas Corpus Is Called This Morning; Fugitive Warrant Charging Burglary at Colville, Wash., Is Served at Once.

Discharged on motion of J. W. Taylor, prosecuting attorney, when the Huleas corpus proceedings were called before Judge W. A. Eskbeck this morning, Carl Mason, whom attorney asserted to be identical with Fred Morgan, and C. J. Morris, were arrested on a fugitive warrant issued from the probate court charging them with being wanted for the crime of second degree burglary in Colville, Wash. On arraignment before Probate Judge J. L. Hough at 2:30 defendants pleaded not guilty and time for hearing was set for 10 a. m. Monday. The complaint stated that C. J. 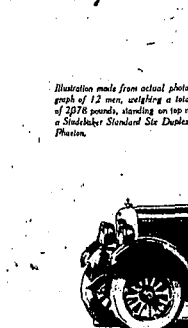
