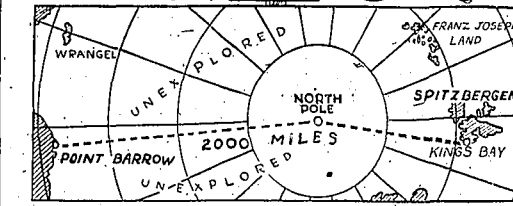

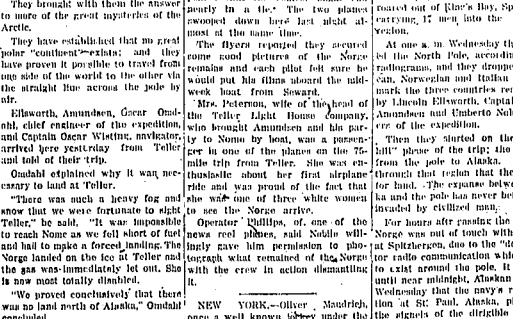


Map showing the dirigible Norge in which Roald Amundsen flew over the north pole from King's Bay, Spitzbergen, to Teller, Alaska.

IDAHOO NEEDS NO DEFENSE, BUT—

Idaho is a clan, or some kind of a hard shelled animal; that only occasionally sticks its head out furiously to glance with disdain at the trend of national and world affairs; according to Martha Dolman Loux of Pocatello, who contributes an article in *World's Work* for the purpose of making an attack upon Senator Borah.

The senator, we glean from it, became a congressional crustacean by virtue of an Idaho environment of isolation. "Idaho for Idahoans" was a doctrine so long absorbed that he naturally became indifferent, recalcitrant, obstructive. The writer cites territorial divisions and alleged community smugness to support the argument, with educational fusses thrown in for good measure.

The proposition, that Idaho is wholly selfish and unconcerned does not seem to be quoted with demonstrative concern so as to be noticeable, if, forsooth, cognizance be taken of the fact that Idaho, through Borah, has taken into its arms the whole world, from Russia to China, has become an influence in shaping the destinies of the nation, for better or worse, and has vociferated that the constitution of the United States take precedence over all. It has been Washington, Jeffersonian, Rooseveltian, Wilsonian in its strongly reflected national impulses. How can it be seriously contended that Idaho is self-contained, disinterested, clannish before the march of national and world activities? 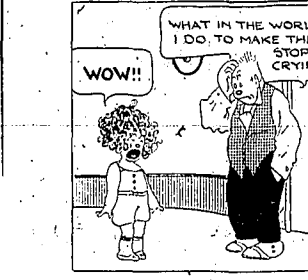

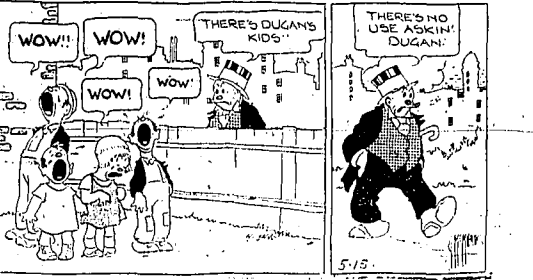
