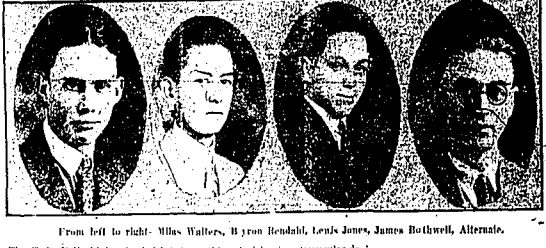

WILL SMITH BACK McADOO FOR PRESIDENT?

The prediction of Robert T. Small, noted political writer in the Salt Lake Tribune last Sunday, that Governor Al Smith will be a presidential candidate in 1928 and his remark that Kentucky democrats hope that McAdoo may be drafted, are of possible significance to all who are not obsessed with the fallacy that the liquor question is the sole American issue.

Consider the way straws are blowing. Months ago one of Smith's principal lieutenants went to Georgia and was received with open arms by the McAdoo men of the dryest sort. Smith's candidacy in 1928 is impossible, even more so than it would have been in 1924.

Smith has been a progressive governor. A moderate wet, his long record has shown that this is rather an incidental feature than the vital point in his career. McAdoo is a life-long prohibitionist, but he has sense enough to know that while the prohibitory law should be enforced, so should other laws, like the anti-trust law, for instance. In view of this, it should not be hard for these leaders to work together, in the event that McAdoo should be called.

Right now there is no democratic leader save McAdoo and Smith who really inspires anybody with great enthusiasm. If there were such a man, he would be nominated and elected. There is no Woodrow Wilson or Grover Cleveland in any gubernatorial chair on whom the eyes of the nation are focused, nor is there any immediate prospect of such man arising before 1928. Democrats tried nominating a governor of more than ordinary ability in 1920, but he was badly beaten. They nominated a lawyer and diplomat of unusual ability in 1924, but one who appealed but little to the masses. McAdoo and Smith both have strong personal followings and with Smith eliminated, McAdoo would be the sole outstanding figure at this time.

The Volstead act will not be modified by 1928, notwithstanding the victory of Vane in Pennsylvania, nor will either party adopt a wet plank in that year. Under such circumstances nomination of a wet by the democratic party would be political suicide. Anyhow, since the constitution is what it is, the common sense thing is to regard the Volstead act as something to enforce with other laws, and turn to the consideration of economic and international issues that are pressing for solution.

IDAHO HIGHWAYS NEED MAINTENANCE

It is false economy to permit well-built highways to deteriorate and go to pieces on account of the lack of attention, and in order to keep the maintenance costs down, but that is what Idaho is doing in a number of particulars, all of which will call in the end for greater expenditures.

The highways of Washington and Oregon are in far better condition than are the highways of Idaho and the comparative costs of keeping up the roads in the respective states loses its significance when the real facts are understood.

The first cost of building highways is great enough to justify a reasonable overhead, if the first cost is to be justified at all, and without the upkeep the first cost money is soon dissipated and lost.

Oregon is oiling its roads and they are as near perfection as it is possible for roads to be. There is some inconvenience for the first few days after the oil has been spread, but the end justifies the means. The state of Washington keeps its highways sprinkled and wet down, which while not as good a binder as oil, serves its purpose well and is far better than the neglect that Idaho is permitting its roads to suffer.

The old world system of road patrol is in effect in Washington and Oregon with piles of building material placed by the roadside, which is used in repair work when the first evidence of wear is in sight. That and the sprinkling and oiling help to keep the roads in their present almost perfect condition.

Another system of road patrol is very much in evidence regarding the speed regulations, with the result that the roads are not "murdered" by the pounding of heavy and fast-moving traffic. The load weights are adjusted and overloaded trucks and vehicles are not permitted on the highways.

The fault in Idaho lies with its people, who in their demands for economy have made it impossible to build and keep the roads in the shape that the neighbors are able to do, and where from three to four times as much is spent on the roads as in Idaho, but to drive over them brings about the conviction that it is money well invested, for the motor transportation has come to stay, and has reached proportions which justify an expenditure which will make highways the best.—Exchange.

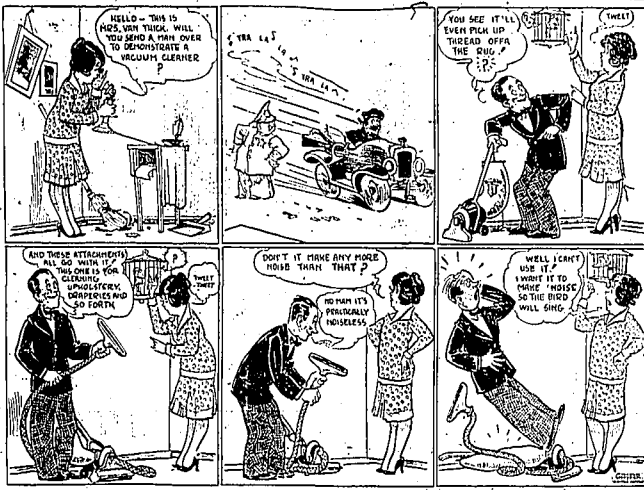
