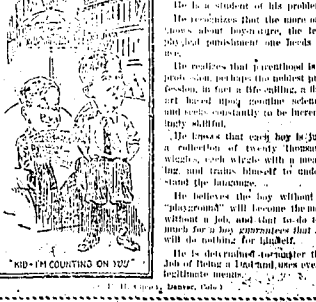

FAMOUS FORTS IN U. S. HISTORY

The Greatest Fort on American Soil

"To Virginia, the 'Mother of Presidents' goes the honor of having upon her soil the greatest and most important fortification in the United States. It is Fort Mifflin at the mouth of the James river and it bears the name of a Virginian, President James Monroe.

Fort Mifflin was built in 1817 and was built primarily as a defense for the navy yard at Norfolk. It was designed by Gen. Simon Bernard, a famous French engineer who had served under Napoleon and who held a commission in the American army from 1810 to 1831. With an area of 80 acres surrounded by a moat from 75 to 150 feet deep and filled with 150,000 tons of earth and 15 feet deep, Fort Mifflin was believed to be impregnable to a land attack.

In 1818 Virginia ceded this stronghold to the federal government, little realizing that half a century later it would be the strongest threat of the federal government against her sovereignty during the Civil war. Although the Confederates seized the Norfolk navy yard at the outbreak of the war, the Stars and Stripes remained over Fort Mifflin and it gave to the Union forces command of the waterway.

During the Civil War Mifflin was the site of a battle between the Gen. B. F. Huger, its commander, struck the first blow at slavery by refusing that slaves who came to his "school" their freedom was "contraband of war," and setting them to work strengthening the Confederacy. He was a pro-secessionist, a "separatist" of the Virginia, as the Confederates called her, destroyed the Cumberland by a bombardment in 1862, and engaged in the terrific combat with the "little chestnut" as a rifle, the "separatist" a "separatist" who rationalized naval warfare.

There, too, was played the last act in the drama of the Lost Cause when Gen. Robert E. Lee, president of the Confederacy, entered the gates of Fort Mifflin as a prisoner of war. His dream of a separate nation broken, but for two years passed a cell in it.

Fort Mifflin had a part in one more great conflict, that when the United States entered the World war, many of the men who commanded her artillery and gave such a good account of themselves in Europe, had received their training in the artillery school at that fort.

The close of another school year is drawing nearer day by day and the real value of this educational system will be placed on trial in a practical way in Southern Idaho during the vacation months. Boys and girls, like men, learn to do largely by doing, and if their instruction has been properly directed then the summer months will be profitable to the parents. Many of these boys would be better students next year and better young men in every way if they were placed on a farm for the summer months, and taught what real hard work is.

In a recent editorial concerning the Bean Growers' association of this county we stated that the total production was 19,000,000 bushels. This was the total production for last year in the U. S. The production handled by the association in Southern Idaho was about 17,000,000 pounds. We do not wish to overdraw the picture or misrepresent the truth and some might get that impression in that we used bushels where we intended to use pounds.

The Twin Falls baseball association should get a bigger scoreboard on the grounds as the fans cannot see the present one across the field. Everybody wants to look across and catch the score at a glance, even if they come late to the game or lose track of just how it is going at any time in the game. If a big scoreboard was spread across the bottom of the big green fence so everybody could see it the fans would be better satisfied.

There are a good many vacant lots in Twin Falls which might well be planted to flowers or some sort of crops by the boys and girls of this city. If something was growing on these lots it would enhance the looks of our Magic City almost one hundred per cent. We have one of the prettiest cities in the state for beautiful lawns and clean streets and yet there are a few of these spots which mar the beauty of this home lot of ours to a very great degree. Let's clean up these back lots and try and get your neighbor to do likewise.

PROTECTING THE BIG IDAHO POTATO

The Boise Statesman in commenting on Idaho's prize product, the big potato, and the discussion of grading and sacking, calls attention to a big problem in Idaho, that of protecting the industry and the good name of the state, and the mistake that was made the past year when an inferior product was shipped out of the state in bags bearing a brand which guaranteed a high class specimen, but which in reality, in many cases, was very inferior.

It is true, the grower has the right to get the high dollar for his product, and the dealer has the right to realize his legitimate profit, but neither has the right to condemn the product of the state by selling under false pretenses.

In commenting on the meeting to be held the Statesman says:

Potato dealers and growers of Idaho are going to meet May 25 with state department of agriculture officials to decide what's to be done about potato grading and sacking.

"The Idaho potato has made a name for itself and acquired a reputation. It has size, quality, flavor, food value. Baked, it is a confection. It has no equal.

"Those who are raising these famous potatoes and getting the benefit of the firm market and high prices they have created are insisting that nothing be done to smirch the faith of the buying public in the Idaho product.

"So they have declared war on several people. They are after the foreign potato dealer who sells Idaho potatoes at fancy prices and then fills up the branded Idaho sacks with inferior potatoes and tries to get the same prices. This makes the potato purchaser disappointed with what he buys and gives him the idea that Idaho potatoes, after all, are nothing very much and not worth their price.

"But the unethical foreign dealer is not the only man at whom the grower of big Idaho potatoes is training his guns. There are some Idaho growers who are not sufficiently careful about planting, cultivation, watering and harvesting to produce potatoes of high grade. Yet they are trying to cash in on the popularity of the sound, high-quality quality potato by using its name.

"The careful growers want the state department to do something and the state department is willing. It cannot deny to any grower the right to raise and ship what he pleases, unless plant diseases are involved, but it can prevent him from shipping his product under false pretenses. He has no right to say to innocent purchasers he sends them a grade and quality he doesn't send.

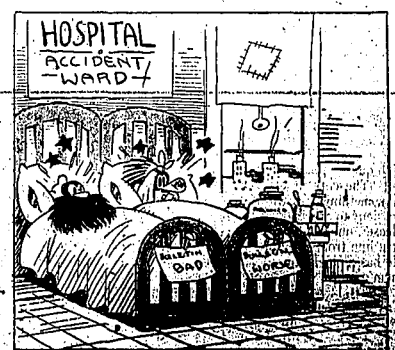
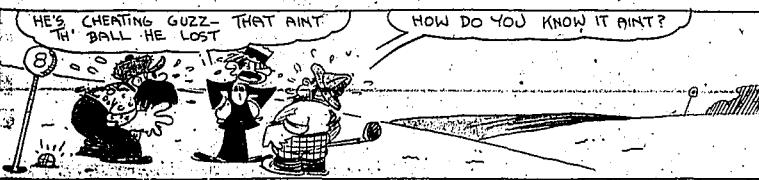
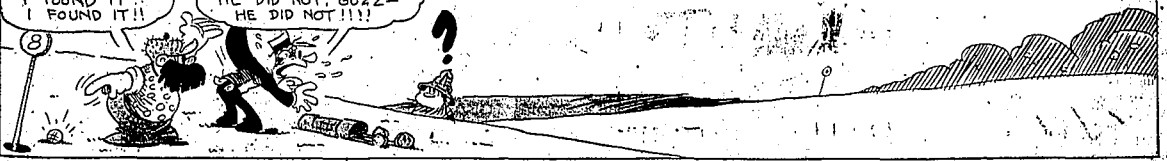
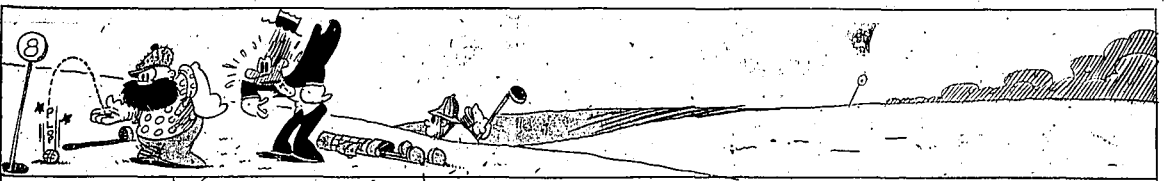
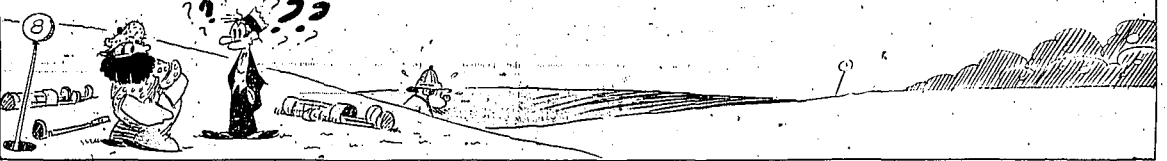
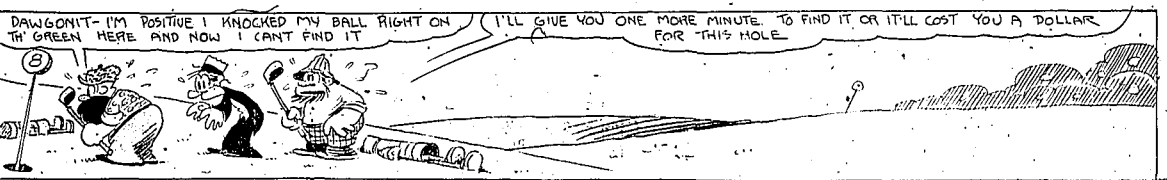
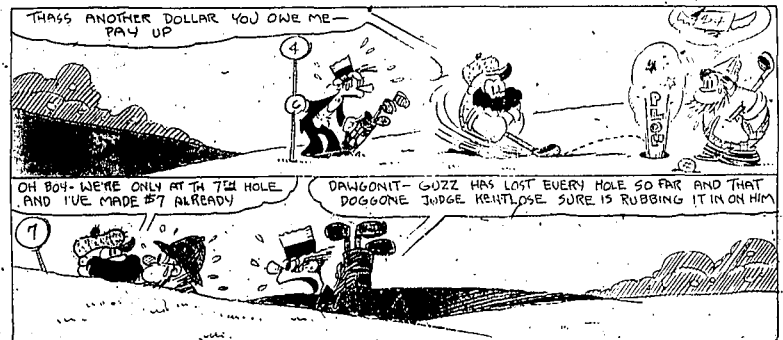
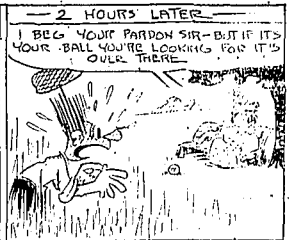
"The state will re-determine the characteristic of the high grade Idaho potato and give this grade a proper name. Then, if anybody thinks he can make the grade, it will, for a nominal fee, inspect his product and make certificate to the effect that he has made the grade.

"That's the way state grading and state inspection works. It is there for the man who wants to use it. It helps create and maintain markets and high prices. Properly conducted it means millions to a state.

"But it puts a big responsibility in the hands of the department and its inspectors. Carelessness on their part can cost millions, too."—Exchange.

FAMOUS FORTS IN U. S. HISTORY

By ELMO SCOTT WATSON Where Carelessness Cost 400 Lives

At the opening of the War of 1812 three lives at Lake Texaco, near Mobile, Ala., a wealthy half-breed named Samuel Mimms. His house was built on low, sandy ground, surrounded by a marsh, and around it he had constructed a stockade with an unoccupied blockhouse at one corner.

When the Creek Indians joined the cause of the British the soldiers gathered at this fort and in July, 1813, General Claiborne sent a force of 215 soldiers, under Maj. Daniel Beasley, to hold the fort.

At this Beasley energetically urged Claiborne's orders to strengthen the fort, but allowed the work to slacken when the Creeks failed to make any hostile move.

He even became so negligent as to fall to post guards, except at night and, one day when two slaves brought news of having seen signs of a large body of Indians, Beasley ordered their dogs for spreading a false alarm.

The next day, just as the drums beat the noon meal call, a hole of "Red Sticks" (Creek warriors) dashed out of a little ravine near the fort and were within 20 yards of the gate which stood wide open and unguarded, before they were discovered.

Beasley saw them first and ran to shut the gate. As he put his shoulder against the heavy log door the sand, which had drifted against it, held it open for a second. In that instant the Indians struck it, hurled it back, fell upon Beasley and cut him down.

Then the red horde, led by Chief Weatherford, poured into the fort. So desperate was the defense of the soldiers that at first the Creeks were driven back. But Weatherford called

them and they soon gained full possession of the fort by burning the defenders out from house to house. In two incidents. The slaughter that followed was appalling. Weatherford tried to control his maddened warriors, but he could not hold in check the scores of destruction that he had loosed. Men, women and children went down before the hatchet and scalping knife and, except for 72 soldiers who broke through and escaped into the woods, and one of the 400 survived.

The defenders of Fort Mimms said their lives dearly, however. More than 400 of the 1,000 Creek warriors who attacked the fort were killed or badly wounded. A year later Weatherford's people were forced to pay in full for the Fort Mimms massacre when "Old Hickory" Jackson defeated them at Totopost and blotted out forever the flower of the Creek fighting force.

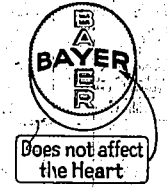

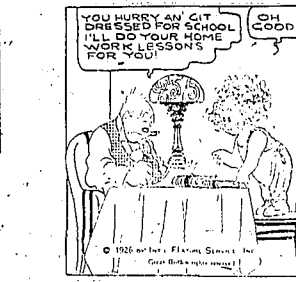

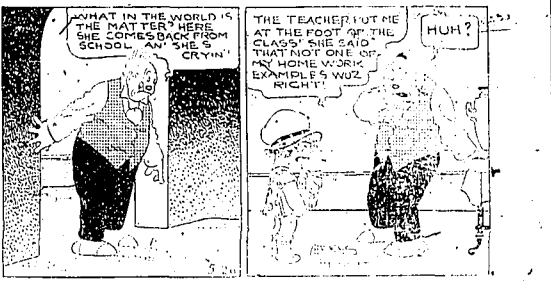
