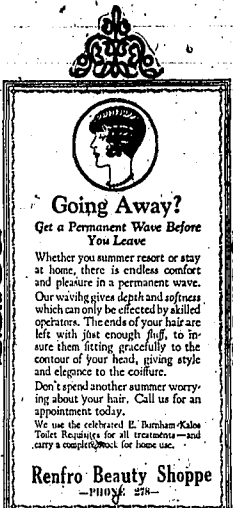

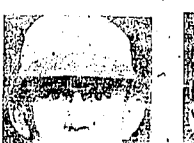

The Shoshone camp for the Twin Falls county scouts will be in readiness for the boys by the middle of June and the wild flowers will be in full bloom by that time. The boys from this county are exceptionally fortunate in having such a wonderful site for a summer camp. Later in the summer the water may be somewhat low so the camping program must be staged earlier this year than usual.

For the first time the people of Twin Falls saw the class of 1926 of the Twin Falls High in one body last evening at the Baccalaureate sermon in the Methodist church. They make a beautiful sight and we trust that they will qualify as well in deeds as they do in looks when it comes to real community service. They were urged to go on and get a college education as a means to greater service by the speaker of the evening. This is indeed sound advice and we, as the speaker stated, believe a college education is in the reach of every member of the class if they only determine to reach out and grip it.

You will do well to hear the discussion of the direct primary question tomorrow evening at the Laying the Corner. Several other political issues will be discussed, such as the oleomargarine bill and other issues which will be paramount questions in the campaign this fall. Representatives of the three political parties will speak so it cannot be called a partisan affair in any sense of the word.

Thus far The Times is the only newspaper that has had the backbone to publish a complete report of Barry Dibble's suggestion to the city of Twin Falls on Municipal Light and Power. Garbled reports on such issues are unfair to the citizens of Twin Falls and yet this is what has generally happened by certain subsidized newspapers in this community and some people seem to like this sort of reading. A newspaper should be asked and compelled to tell the "whole truth and nothing but the truth."

We notice that the cleaning establishments of Twin Falls are making a special cut rate for the spring clean up on old suits. It is not our business to question the motive, but we presume that it is simply an encouragement for folks to clean up this spring. Quite a number of buildings are being cleaned up and painted up and this gives the town a better appearance in general.

The birthday of John Amos Comenius, March 28, will in future be observed in all the schools of Czechoslovakia by a "peace lesson" of a half hour. An order to this effect was issued by the ministry of education on March 6. Comenius, the great Czech teacher, was the first to advocate a world peace campaign through general education of all nations.—Emanuel V. Lippert in School Life.

Citizenship night schools in Alaska are maintained by the Territorial Government, and will be established in any community in which 12 persons signify their desire to enroll. In addition to reading, writing, spelling, grammar, and arithmetic, history of the United States is taught and the fundamentals of good citizenship are inculcated. Pupils enrolled this year include 93 citizens, 140 aliens, and 103 persons who have declared their intention of becoming citizens.

### FOOD AND WEATHER

Almost any person of normal mind is quick to appreciate the value of dressing for comfort as the temperature rises, but not every one is wise enough to change his habits of eating to conform to the principles of health established by medical science after much study and investigation.

In the summer months it is the part of good sense to ignore even the injunction of the federal agricultural department to "eat more meat" in order to help the stock raisers, and it will be found that persons who are moderate in the use of meat, practically eliminating it from the ration in summer, will find it easier to maintain a condition of health.

Any other articles of food which are found to overwork the vital organs or bring distress in any way should be readily discovered by the adult—even without the advice of a physician, and such foods may be abandoned to the advantage of better health. Foods which are promptly assimilated in the winter months become harmful in the summer.

Nobody likes to have the charge applied to himself, of course, but it will probably be found that excesses in eating are at the foundation of more physical ills than almost any other cause. The dangers from over-eating are multiplied in the days between June 20 and September 20.

The butcher and the grocer may find their business somewhat reduced by an extensive practice of moderation in eating, but after all the conservation of life and health is about the most important business in which any one may engage.

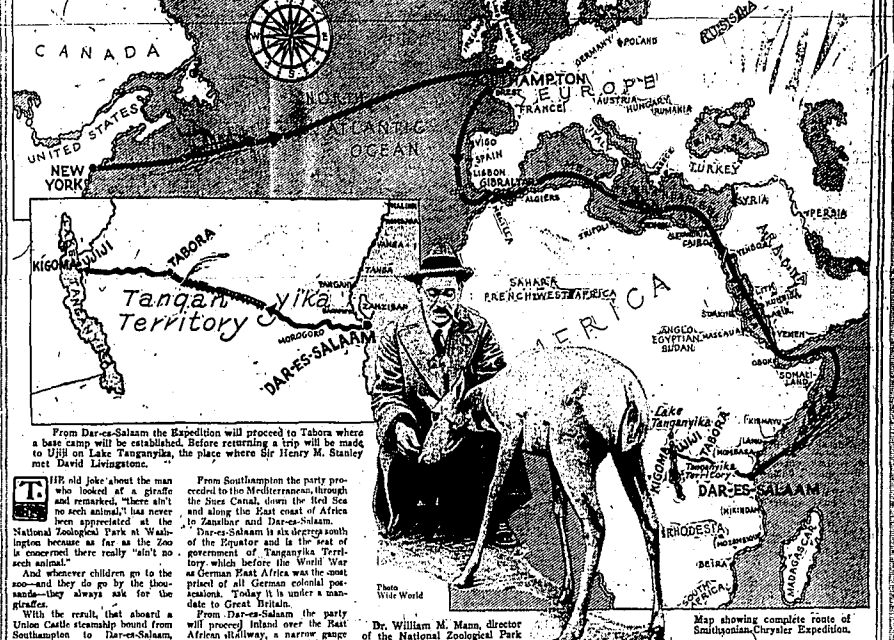

## TANGANYIKA TERRITORY, IN EAST AFRICA

### Destination of the Smithsonian-Chrysler Zoological Expedition



From Dar-es-Salaam the Expedition will proceed to Tabora where a base camp will be established. Before returning a trip will be made to Kilim on Lake Tanganyika, the place where Sir Henry M. Stanley met David Livingston.

The old joke about the man who looked at a giraffe and remarked, "There ain't no such animal," has never been appreciated at the National Zoological Park at Washington because as far as the Zoo is concerned there really "ain't no such animal." And whenever children go by the Zoo—and they do go by the Zoo—there they always ask for the giraffe.

The land rises from the coastal plain to a plateau 1000 to 4000 feet above sea level. Large tracts of which are dry and covered with thorn scrub. It is there that giraffes as well as rhinoceros will be captured.

In Tanganyika the men hunt or do nothing at all while the women do all the work. The next of the coming of the Smithsonian-Chrysler Expedition will spread rapidly about the territory and there will be plenty of natives anxious to play their part in the capture of animals. Tanganyika natives love to hunt because when they hunt they often do not eat. When they do eat they eat what they have paid for a day and their food.

The expedition will do very little killing except to obtain fresh meat for the natives and for members of the party. The object of the expedition is to capture the animals which can be transported back to America.

From Southampton the party proceeded to the Mediterranean, through the Suez Canal, across the Red Sea and along the East coast of Africa to Zanzibar and Dar-es-Salaam. Dar-es-Salaam is the headquarters of the Interior and is the seat of government of Tanganyika Territory which before the World War was German East Africa was the most prized of all German colonial possessions. Today it is under a mandate to Great Britain.

With the result, that aboard a United States steamship bound from Southampton to Dar-es-Salaam, east of government of Tanganyika Territory, in East Africa, there is a group of five scientists and naturalists, all determined not to return to America without giraffes and a hundred other species of wild animals for the National Zoo.

The expedition is known as the Smithsonian-Chrysler Expedition and is headed by Dr. William M. Mann, director, National Zoological Park at Washington. The expedition was made possible by the gift of Walter P. Chrysler, motor car manufacturer.

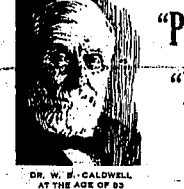
