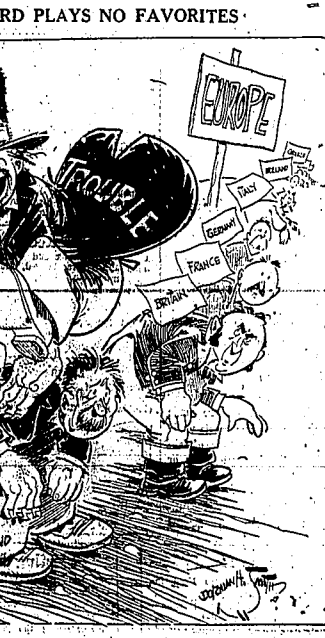

Still the mystery grows. "When will work start on the Rim to Rim bridge?" The Times is anxious to give its readers some information but all we can find today is a picture of a disaster in the window of a real estate office on Shoshone street south and this is a sad story.

If it cost the republican party two hundred thousand dollars to carry the last election in Idaho through advertising in the newspapers of the state what is the use of having subsidized newspapers? It might even be cheaper if they were just plain independent papers with a regular advertising rate which would be fair and square to all. The time is rapidly approaching when readers do not wish to be saved by the political trickery of a partisan organ anyway. They would rather read the whole truth in an unprejudiced report and decide for themselves who should be elevated to the power of ruling their fellowmen. No one today is born with the divine right to rule and we feel that the people can choose better than seventy-two newspapers under the control of a political machine who should sit in the seats of authority in this state.

Now comes certain corporate interests and through their organ advises the people that a municipal plant for the generating of power and light is an unsafe investment for any municipality to foster. Yet we invest our good hard cash in a municipal waterworks and our irrigation systems in Idaho are nothing more nor less than community owned. If these business enterprises have proven a success isn't there every likelihood that a municipal power and light plant might prove equally as successful? Now we have a big concern here producing electric energy off our water right and, according to this subsidized organ we must not throw any monkey wrench into the machinery and thus curtail the fat dividends which this institution is making. It matters nothing if the people are paying more than a fair and just light and power rate in Southern Idaho and yet furnish the generative power through our streams. Capital must not be hampered and meddled with by municipalities or private corporations for fear that it might be frightened out of this territory and the great State of Idaho would thus lose a small amount of taxable valuation which of course would be ruinous to the commonwealth.

## COOLIDGE SETS BAD PRECEDENT

(From The Tribune)

President Coolidge's executive order authorizing enrollment of state and city officials as prohibition agents will not be refished by millions of American citizens. Their objections are not so much on account of the attempt to enforce the Volstead act by what they regard as an unwarranted extension of federal authority, but because they fear that the same method may be employed for other and far less worthy purposes. We do not believe President Coolidge had any such thing in mind when he issued the executive order, but there is no telling what evils may result in the future.

State and city officials are elected or appointed to perform certain duties, which are defined by laws and ordinances. They are paid by the commonwealth and municipality. They cannot serve two masters and perform their full duty. Either the work of the state and city will suffer or that of the government will be neglected. No other result need be expected.

As state and city officials of high and low degree are the creatures of political parties, they could be used by the party in power at Washington for political purposes, and under such conditions it might become possible for a president to perpetuate himself in office. This is no idle fancy. It has happened time and again in the history of the world and will continue to happen so long as leaders of men more ambitious than patriotic.

But, even if we allow this to be an extreme view of the situation, the fact remains that a very great many of the men and women of the United States resent interference of the government at Washington in their domestic affairs and the assumption of authority which in effect tends to obliterate state lines. It is repugnant to their understanding of the organic law of the country as adopted by the fathers of the republic.

Under the rule of the czars in Russia, myriads of secret police spied upon the people of the empire and no man's life or property was safe. Even the most upright men and women were arrested upon trumped-up charges, cast into prison and their property confiscated. Many of them perished in dungeons or in the wilds of Siberia. All because they were suspected of not being friendly to the czarist regime or failed to bribe the secret police.

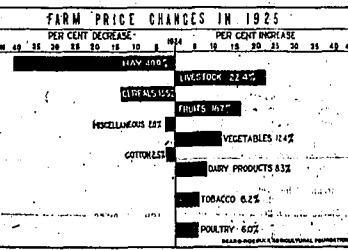
Americans are not Russians, and would never allow such a system to obtain a foothold in the United States with their eyes open. So perhaps they will quickly resent the least assumption of undue authority by state or city officials who sport a federal badge, prohibition or no prohibition.

## Farmers Income for 1925 Shows Rise in Prosperity



WHEAT farm production has not yet assumed a proper relationship to consumption as a whole, states the Sears-Roback Agricultural Foundation. American agriculture has been more properly balanced during the past year than it has for five years, and is slowly reaching correct proportions. Only three staple farm crops, reports the Foundation, showed a decrease in gross farm prices for 1925 as compared with 1924. The crops included were hay, cotton, corn, wheat and one or two small miscellaneous crops. On the other hand, the products which increased substantially in price for 1925 over 1924 were cattle, hogs, sheep, fruits, vegetables, fluid milk, butter, cheese, tobacco, poultry and eggs. The American farmer is beginning to place some figures on the right-hand side of his ledger for the first time in five years and is feeling of national farm prosperity, due to increase of farm prices, is being reflected in the business and industrial prosperity of the entire country.

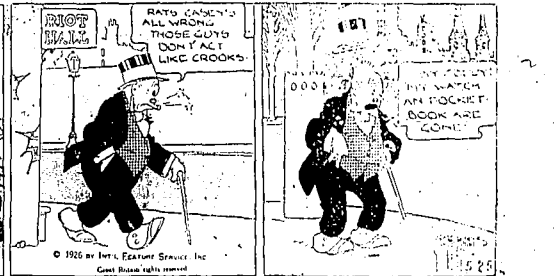
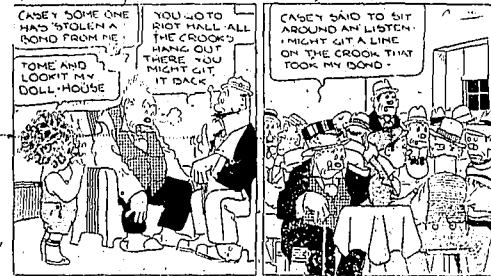

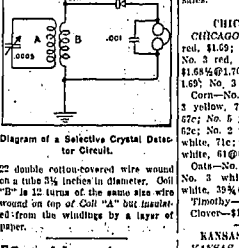
