Letter Received by Reval-  
ista's Mother Demands  
\$50,000; Police on Trail.

Twenty-five Thousand Dol-  
lar Reward Posted for Re-  
turn of Evangelist.

LOS ANGELES, May 28.—Mrs.  
Minnie Kennedy, mother of Al-  
vin Karpis, who was held for  
ransom, has received a letter  
demanding \$50,000 ransom  
for the safe return of the missing  
evangelist.

The letter, received on May 25,  
was given to police detectives  
today and an immediate in-  
vestigation was ordered.

It is stated that Mrs. McPherson  
would be killed unless the ransom  
was placed on a Fresno-bound  
street car at 7:30 a. m. May 28.

LOS ANGELES, May 28.—Search  
for the body of Amos Bessie Mc-  
Pherson was abandoned today by  
the authorities.

Life guards and other official  
searchers, who have been looking  
for the body of the evangelist since  
he reported drowning ten days ago,  
discovered a further search appeared  
fruitless.

Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of  
Alvin Karpis, continued the hunt  
where the authorities left off, and  
a band of seven hunters  
followers in a patrol of the beach.

Official investigators of the mys-  
terious disappearance of evangelist  
McPherson actually convinced now that she  
is alive.

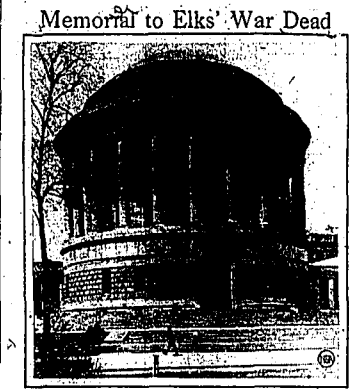
Mrs. Kennedy, on the other hand,  
claims to be the mother who had been  
run off from the beach. But "Bessie"  
McPherson drowned while swimming  
in the ocean.

To silence rumors that the evangelist  
had been seen at various  
places and was not drowned, a re-  
porter Mrs. Kennedy had offered  
a \$25,000 reward for the safe return  
of her daughter.

"We have no hopes that the re-  
ward will ever be claimed," said  
Mrs. Kennedy. "We believe that her  
body is in the sea and that her soul  
is with her Saviors."

jury may launch an investigation of  
Mrs. McPherson's disappearance, ac-  
cording to the foreman, William T.  
Carter.

Class consists of 56 Members and Miss Boys Are Over 6 Feet Tall Five Honor Students; Dean Roberts and Officials Give Sound Advice at High School Commencement.

BUHL, May 26.—The commencement exercises of the Buhl high school were held here last evening in the high school auditorium which was crowded to capacity and many were turned away. The stage was beautifully decorated with spring flowers and the class entered and over the stage was an illuminated "Twenty-six." As the curtain was raised the 56 graduates were seated on the stage and presented a remarkable picture. Superintendent M. Van Patten with the speakers took their places on the platform and the high school orchestra under the direction of Fred H. Barry rendered a selection from the "Bohemian Girl." The invocation was offered by Rev. J. Elliott Sloan, pastor of the Christian church, a double quartet of girls sang "Amen," by H. Lane Wilson.

Miss Lillian Hejmanek, salutatorian of the class, gave a eulogical address and thanked all who had aided in making it possible for the success of the class. Miss Emily Ward, who is valedictorian of the class, gave a scholarly address and told of the various stages through which the class had passed in reaching their goal. Marlon Ward sang "Trees" by Haebach in good voice and was accompanied by Mrs. A. W. Ostrop.

In presenting the graduating class Sup. Van Patten stated that four members of the class were born in Buhl and nine of the boys were over six feet tall. Mr. Van Patten stated that they needed a larger auditorium and a more varied curriculum but the lack of finances would not permit any great changes at this time. He also stated that Buhl had won almost honors in subjects by having two state championships in this past season. But this is not the main purpose of the school.

W. Hatfield, president of the board of education in presenting the diploma stated that there was a considerable number who had failed to make their grades and this was largely due to carelessness on the part of the parents. He urged that the parents and particularly the fathers be urged to support the boy. "If every father would give just a little time and attention to his boys' school work they would have no failure class," said Mr. Hatfield.

Dean Paul Roberts Spoke. One of the finest addresses by a class of graduates that we have listened to for months was delivered by Dean Paul Roberts of the last evening. In part he spoke as follows:

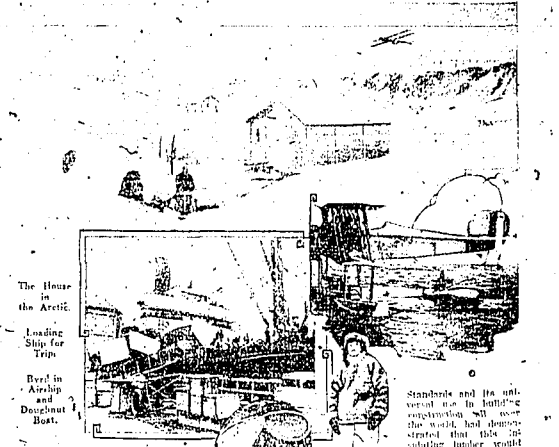

ATHEISTS PLAN CAMPAIGN

The Society for the Promotion of Atheism has announced that it proposes to organize a society of atheists among the students of every college in America.

This stands a good deal like killing the goose that laid the golden eggs. Without the Christian church America would have no educational system worth the name and no colleges in which to organize atheist societies.

Yale university was organized by 10 ministers in 1701. Harvard university was organized by the Colony of Massachusetts Bay as a church school and was given the name "Harvard" in recognition of John Harvard, a young clergyman who died, bequeathing the sum of nearly four thousand dollars and a library of three hundred volumes.

Hamline university, the first college in Minnesota, was organized by the Methodists and the University of Minnesota was first organized by missionaries and later, under the leadership of ministers, was taken over by the state. The University of Kansas was organized by the Episcopalians and Presbyterians and later became a state school. The State Agricultural College of Kansas began as a Methodist school.

Nineteen of the first twenty-two superintendents of public instruction in Kentucky were ministers of the gospel. The Episcopal church organized the state educational system of Florida. Wisconsin had no normal colleges for the training of teachers outside of denominational schools until long after the Civil war and the history of almost every other state is quite similar.

Peter Cartwright, the eccentric backwoods Methodist preacher of Illinois, introduced the bill into the state legislature which provided for the establishment of the University of Illinois and several preachers were on the first board of directors. Chicago university, one of the greatest schools in the world, was founded by the Baptists.

Among the earliest pioneers of every state were Jim missionaries and priests who preached the gospel, buried the dead and built churches and colleges. In almost every state in the Union the first educational institution of college grade was organized by some church or religious society.

More young men and women have been helped through college by the churches than by any other means except public taxation. If atheism had been successful in 1776 there would be almost no colleges in America, now, in which to organize student societies of atheists, for atheism can lay claim to having inspired the founding of but one college in all of America, Girard college of Philadelphia.

MAN POWER WASTE

Much concern is shown, and quite properly so, over the tremendous loss of life resulting through motor accidents in this country. This terrific drain on human life and activity seems almost impossible of stemming. And it is all the more deplorable because a great majority of the accidents are preventable. But there are other drains equally as disastrous and equally as preventable. Secretary of Labor Davis, realizing that something should be done to lessen the number of industrial accidents and to decide upon some line of prevention, has called a conference for this purpose in Washington next July. He invites all the governors or their representatives to the conference, as well as representatives of industrial units and insurance organizations. The secretary, in issuing his call, declares that a conservative estimate places deaths from industrial accidents at 23,000 a year, with non-fatal injuries at 2,500,000 annually.

This is the serious side of the situation, but Secretary Davis goes on to show that through these mishaps the loss in wages for a year totals close to a billion dollars through loss of time aggregating in a year 227,169,970 days. He believes that fully 85 per cent of the accidents were preventable. He asks cooperation of all the states and all accident reporting organizations "to the end that attention may be called in specific terms for the more general adoption of safety methods which have been successful in the places they have been tried." There is a further deduction to be made from both classes of accidents, which all who observe may apply, and that is the dependent families left through deaths and through the head of the family being made a cripple, with reduced earning capacity, if not totally disabled and made a dependent, whereas he was a producer and a provider.—The Tribune.
