

TOURIST IS HACKED BY TAXE-FIELD

Highway Robber Hacks California Tourist Up and Leaves Him Beside Road Victim Has Seven Huge Gashes About the Head

Youth Is Arrested Walking Down Highway and Came From California; Claims He Is Going to Kansas.

DENVER, Colo., June 1.—Frank Metz, 57, of Orville, Calif., is in a critical condition here today, suffering from serious wounds in the head believed to have been inflicted by a hold-up robber near Lyons, Colo.

Metz was found in a highway with his automobile in the highway two and one-half miles east of Lyons yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Heck and Ralph Larson of Deer Trail, Colo.

He was brought to Denver on the Denver-Kansas City bus and was rushed to the hospital, where physicians say he has but a slight chance for recovery.

Metz had no money or jewelry when found and investigators believe he was a tourist.

Metz was formerly an engineer for the Northern Pacific railroad and that he lived at Livingston, Mont.

A letter, addressed "Dear Dan" and signed by Hazel Metz, 3516 Grand avenue, Parsons, Kansas, was found in his car.

## POCATELLO TAKES GAME WITH BRUINS

Skinner Zamloch Protested Use of Old Balls Which Pocatello Insisted on Putting Up for the Bruins; Bowers Got Away to Bad Start and Was Driven From the Mound in Sixth; Zamloch Relieved Him.

POCATELLO, Idaho, June 1.—The Pocatello Banerocks annexed their fifth straight victory yesterday afternoon at Overland park, defeating the Twin Falls Bruins in the opening game of the series by the score of 15 to 6. Bowers, who started on the hill for the Bruins, was chased from the mound in the last of the sixth, after Pocatello smashed six hits and scored eight runs. Zamloch relieved Bowers and finished the game without getting into serious trouble. In the midst of Pocatello's halting rally in the sixth, Skipper Zambach protested to Umpire Spencer that old balls were being thrown in, and when Spencer refused the protest, notified the official scorer that he would protest the game to the league president on the ground that Pocatello had failed to provide a required box for balls on the field. The Banerocks clouted Bowers to all sections of the park to walk in the first two men at bat in the initial inning and they scored on a single by Dwyer—Hosberg, Dwyer, Zienko and Zambach found him for safe blows in the third and Pocatello scored three more. The entire team got on his offerings in the sixth, in which eight runs were scored. Bonner pitched a good game for Pocatello and kept the hitless record by the visitors well centered.

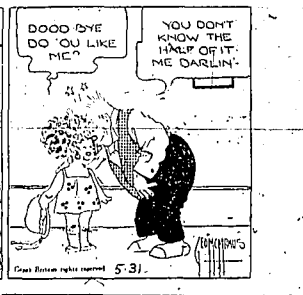
