AMERICAN LEGATION IS BOMBED

Chancery of Embassy in Uruguay Scene of Explosion, Ambassador Reports.

Action Assumed to Be in Protest to Execution of Sacco and Vanzetti.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—An attempt to blow up the chancery of the American legation in Montevideo, Uruguay, today was reported to the state department by American Minister Grant-Smith.

The bomb exploded at eight this morning in the vestibule building in which the chancery is located. No one was injured. "Telephone calls later were made to the legation," Grant-Smith reported.

It is believed here that the bomb attack is connected with the protest of radical organizations throughout Latin America against the recent decision of the Massachusetts supreme court, denying a new trial in the Sacco and Vanzetti case, convicted of murder.

Rumors all over the world charged that the chancery was a "frame-up" and was due to the act's political belief.

A similar attempt to destroy the American embassy at Buenos Aires was made on May 17. Attempts have been made against American legations in Paris, and other European cities since the last attempt on the Sacco-Vanzetti case has been on appeal.

UTAHN FOUND DEAD IN HOTEL

Edward Wooley Shot Through Heart in Colorado; Mystery Appearance Point to Murderer.

DENVER, Colo., June 4.—With no clue to the identity of the assassin of Edward T. Wooley, 35, who was found dead in a hotel here yesterday, police today were continuing their investigation.

Wooley, who had registered at the hotel since May 11, giving his address both as Fresno and Lake City, was found yesterday afternoon with a bullet wound in his heart. The bullet had 185 in bullet entered in his hand. The hotel room was in disorder and an unimpaired rope made from a bed sheet dangled from the second story window. It was first thought a possible suicide, but police now are certain that Wooley was murdered.

PANAMA GIVES GREAT BRITAIN EQUAL BASE

Serious Charge Judged Against Government of Panama; Control Granted in England to Charge.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4.—Government officials today took calmly charges filed by Richard Childs of Brookport, N. Y., that British interests, through their concentration in Panama, had secured control of naval base, obtained the right to police territory near the Panama canal, and could act as a threat to the United States.

Official records did not substantiate Childs' charges. It was said. Officials pointed out that the concessions were granted to a British corporation, limited. British companies in which Americans held stock more than a year ago, and that the concessions were made in 1914.

Despite the fact, reaction of Congress, however, is not to be taken as a sign of alarm. Chairman Borah of the senate foreign committee, however, introduced a resolution which would have a committee to investigate the concessions. Consideration of the resolution in the senate will come upon objection by Senator Curtis, republican floor leader.

Butte, Mont., June 4.—All three bodies of the victims of the explosion in the mine cave-in had been recovered today with the finding of the body of Harry Lapsala many hours after the discovery of the bodies of two other men, J. Stuart Henderson and Joseph Lantz had been taken from the mine last night.

Lapsala had lived hours after the cave-in, which occurred on Tuesday, and his death had been greatly encouraged the rescuers. Later he was silent and it was concluded that he had died of an aneurism or other victim.

The bodies of Henderson and Lantz were recovered late yesterday and were placed in a casket almost instantly.

PROHIBITION GUN FIGHTS CLAIM 140

Secretary Andrews Orders Men to Shoot Only in Emergency to Keep Down Death List.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Gun battles between federal dry agents and bootleggers, moonshiners and gangsters have resulted in 140 casualties since prohibition became effective, the United Press learned today from official figures.

Because of the growing fatality list, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrew has ordered his enforcement men to shoot only in emergency and not to shoot except in self defense.

Fifty-nine prohibition officers have been killed in the past six months, persons evading, or resisting arrest have been killed.

Two dry officers were killed in E. E. Grant was killed in a liquor store near Henderson, N. C., this morning. West Virginia, Georgia, Tennessee, North and South Carolina where moonshiners operate in rural districts in the most dangerous territory of the country for government officers. More dry agents have been killed in these states than in any other section.

Most of the slain dry officers had their lives ruined while bootleggers flourish. Several were murdered to prevent their giving evidence in court.

Many of those killed by government officers were men who had no other means of support. The dry agent to shoot to protect his, own life. Several persons were shot off a train in Tennessee in handling of liquor, it was admitted.

McPherson Woman Said to Be Alive and Will Explain; Search Is Given Up by All

Los Angeles Police Officers Leave San Francisco for Headquarters; Captain Cline Disappointed at Failure of Ormiston to Keep Engagement.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—Mrs. Frances B. Marshall, prominent San Francisco mission worker, announced today that she had received information to the effect that Alice Simple McPherson, missing Los Angeles evangelist, is alive and well, and will return to explain her absence within 12 days.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—From a maze of "clue" telephone notes, "anonon" demands and contradicting reports of the woman's "appearance" a several parts of the state at once, California officials today had extracted no probable concrete fact upon the investigation surrounding the mysterious disappearance of Alice Simple McPherson, famous evangelist of Anaheim Temple, Los Angeles, is dead.

"I have felt that Mrs. McPherson was dead from the start," declared Captain Herman Cline of the Los Angeles detective bureau.

"I have taken no stock in the ransom notes, the mysterious threats of bodily injury to Mrs. McPherson unless money was forthcoming.

"There was only one angle to the case which cast doubt on her disappearance. That was the mysterious behavior of Kenneth C. Ormiston, her former radio operator."

Captain Cline, came to San Francisco yesterday to question Ormiston.

"Today he returned to Los Angeles, with his mission not accomplished."

"I have waited a full day for Ormiston," Cline said to his department. "The chances that I was high and knew where to find me, and had promised that he would see me. Apparently he is hiding out."

That Cline concluded that Ormiston had nothing to do with Mrs. McPherson's disappearance. He has some other reason, not connected with the McPherson case, for desiring to evade further publicity.

Captain Cline left instructions with San Francisco detectives about the question to be put to Ormiston should he put in appearance.

Ormiston's failure to appear was always disappointing to Captain Cline. The investigation involved and complicated through the introduction of Frenchmen daily, would have been cleared had Ormiston appeared and denied, as he was expected to do, the many rumors which "faded" him with the disappearance. Captain Cline said.

As long as he fails to appear, his official summons the case will remain closed and Mrs. McPherson's death will still be denied by many, even though she, beyond doubt, is dead, the Los Angeles captain of detectives said.

CROP CONDITIONS UTAH Salt Granted One Half Rate to Twin Falls County

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The late spring has made the outlook for most of the principal crops uncertain, with the exception of winter wheat, which will yield a bumper crop of 1,000,000 bushels greater than last year, the agricultural department announces. The winter crop which will be harvested in August will be about 1,000,000 bushels less than last year's crop.

The winter is late everywhere except on the Pacific coast. The late spring, however, does not necessarily mean an unproductive season, the department said.

Dry weather has had a still a serious handicap in the south and west, where wheat and other parts of the northwest has been wet, however, in the southwest.

UNCLE SAM GIVES JUNE BRIDES ADVICE

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4.—The volume entitled "Brides Advice" has been distributed through the U. S. department of agriculture.

When the fresh fruits and vegetables are available this summer it is well to can a little for the winter months. To guide the new housewife in canning a pamphlet has been prepared by the department of agriculture.

"Clean and prepare the food or vegetable, using only sound, fresh, or fruit products. If the vegetable or fruit is to be peeled, dip it in cold water for a few minutes. If no preliminary cooking is needed put it at once in the jars.

"Pack products in 1/2 or 3/4 of water. To jars of can of vegetable add salt and hot water if there is not sufficient liquid to fill the container. To fruits add syrup or fruit juice.

"Adjust seals and tops of glass jars or rubber and place them in the canner. Seal the jars air tight. Cook the products in the boiling water. Keep all canning jars under observation at room temperatures for at least one week.

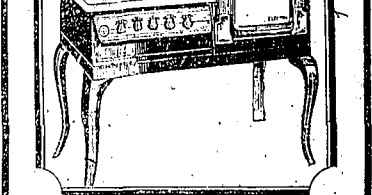

If the world could live on promises we would all grow rich in a few days and quit work entirely. What an awful world this would be in that case. Not fulfilled pledges is what the world demands today, regardless of how honest and sober you may look when you express your plan of the future. Idaho is not a member of the "Show Me Tribe," but we have a large population of that class of people here so we must make our pledges come true.

There never was a time in the history of America when the independent newspaper was in such demand as it is today. Citizens are ceasing to be bound to any political party or clique but are demanding that any party or organization to get their support must function nearly one hundred per cent for the people. The partisan newspaper represents only one side of the great issues both at home and nationally, and therefore, the voter hears only one side and is not allowed to give much thought or judgment on these issues. In other words, the partisan organ tries to do the thinking for him and places the issues in such a fashion that he cannot help decide in favor of the party or clique which that organ represents.
