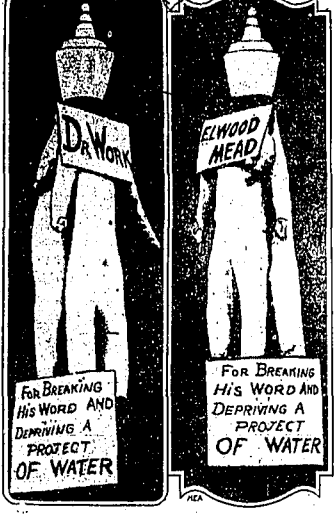

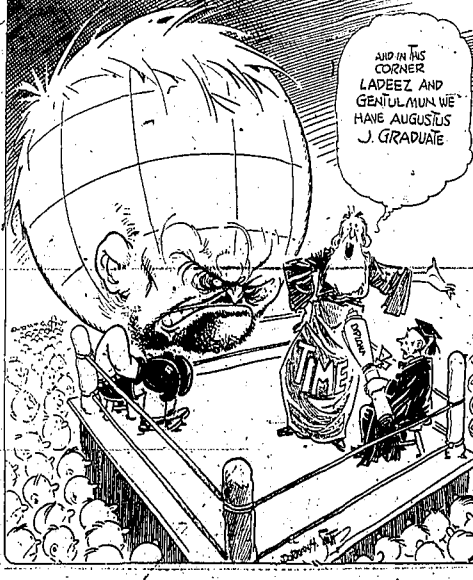

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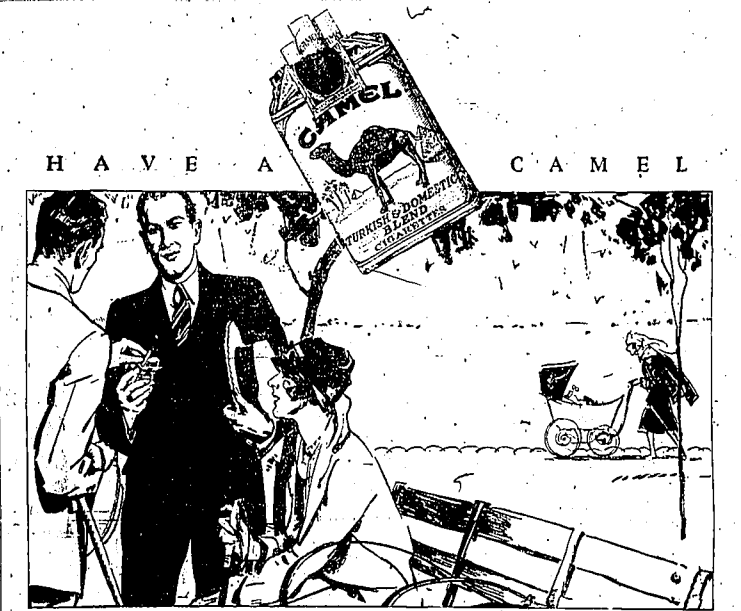

THE IMPARTIALITY OF SCIENCE

Science knows no color line. A high power rifle in the hands of a Chinese coolie, an African bushman or a Mexican bandit will shoot just as far and kill just as surely as when fired by an American soldier. The chemical reactions in a Japanese laboratory are exactly the same as those witnessed in an English or German laboratory. Science knows no morals. Her laws and her forces are at the disposal of all who master her secrets and no nation can long hope to keep them a secret. The radio will broadcast the nonsense of Voliva at Zion City, Illinois, as perfectly as the broadcast of Dr. S. Parkes Cadman in Brooklyn. Electricity can be directed to heal or hurt, to kill or to make alive. Bacteria can be introduced into the human system to make us immune to disease or dropped from a mechanically controlled airplane far out of the reach of anti-aircraft guns upon a defenseless population to develop gangrene and contagion and work a havoc of death. Science knows no sympathy. When the influenza germ came out of the east and swept its desolating way over the earth, it laid low the rich and the poor, the scholar and the half-wit, the humble and the great. Men of medicine, meanwhile, dragged themselves through interminable days and nights, ministering in all homes alike. Death and healing work according to the laws of nature in all bodies the same. Only man, with his social customs, class organizations, race prejudices and religious prejudices draws boundary lines. The Almighty made the rivers and mountain ranges but man has made the boundary lines. When humanity learns the lesson of the impartiality of nature then the brotherhood of man will begin.

POISON AND PESTS

(By Newton Hibbs) The scientists have evolved a new philosophy of fertilization. A fundamental of the new philosophy is bacteria culture rather than gericides for pest control. The use of poison has been demonstrated to give disease germs predominance as an ultimate effect, because the disease germ is more resistant than the life bacteria, which are exemplified in native soil fertility. The arsenic of the universal tree spray precipitates to the cambium cultural home of bacterial plant life and robs the tree of native vitality. The opposing agencies of health and disease are native compensating forces, the blights bred in the molds of darkness and the life bacteria in the sunshine realm. There is no limit to native, sunshine plants' resistance, but when resistant bacteria are murdered by poison sprays the ravished tree becomes a helpless victim of the pest germs of darkness. If the true biography of Madam Ladybird were proclaimed it would be an agricultural epic. Her colopentron majesty leads the hosts of pest eaters, but poison sprays and acid soil dressings have driven her to the wildwoods. The new fertility is to be bacteria culture and not bacteria poison. The present scheme of death-dealing for life promotion is based on perversion of facts only half learned. The murder of Madam Ladybird and her army of insect eaters is killing the old goose that laid the golden egg. Bacteria fertility can now be "cultured" in sterile field soil to produce maximum crops by natural inoculation. As no atom of matter is ever destroyed atomic organisms are perpetuated to be servants of man's superior intellectuality. The scientific farmer can propagate appropriate bacteria to predominate every enemy of plant life. This is the new philosophy of fertility—mastery of bacteriac enemies by home-made opposing bacteria.

Thirty per cent of the elementary school children in Indiana are taught in one-room schools. Last year 352 one-room schools were abandoned, but there are still 3029 in the state. Only one county, Marion, has entirely discontinued one-room schools, but three other counties have only one one-room school each.

The movement for parent-teacher associations in colleges is growing. A committee for this service has been created by the national congress. The chairman says that college authorities welcome any reliable means of imparting information to the public. The college parent-teacher association aims to bring about fuller cooperation between college authorities and college patrons.—School Life.

Five demonstration schools are maintained in Santa Barbara County, Calif., where best methods under trained teachers are in actual practice. Each elementary teacher in the county is allowed this year two days to visit these schools and observe the work, and the time is counted as part of the five days given annually to teachers by law for insitutory work.

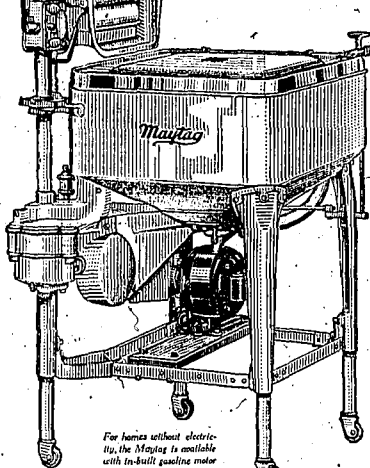
