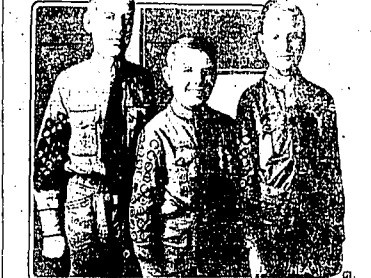

A new serial will start in a few days in the Twin Falls Times and we hope our readers will enjoy this story from the pen of Harold MacGrath entitled "The Man With Three Names." This is a story full of romance and adventure and shows how a young man made his dream come true. It is short and will be completed in twelve chapters.

Idaho creamery men will discuss the regulations for creameries in Boise next Friday. The farmers are losing nearly one thousand dollars annually because of the present regulations on creamery products, according to one of the leaders of this creamery movement, Idaho exports annually nearly twelve million pounds of butter and six million pounds of cheese and yet the Federal regulations are so strict that it greatly hampers this growing industry. The Co-operative Creamery of Southern Idaho was brought about largely because of this stringent regulation.

More than a half million Kiwanians are in session this week in Montreal and the success or failure of this organization hangs in the balance in a measure. Kiwanis was organized a few years ago with an unselfish motive and with the idea of constructive service, but if this organization fails to cling to these ideals it will in just that measure lose its place in the sun. If here and there selfish members use the organization for their own ends then Kiwanis will fail in just that same measure but if its membership succeeds in holding on to the high ideals for which Kiwanis was built then this organization will go and render a great service to the respective communities in which it is now operating.

Twin Falls will stage a celebration which will open the eyes and we trust the hearts of thousands of citizens in Southern Idaho. A celebration of this kind must be educational and if it is properly staged it will teach some great lessons. This is particularly true since this fourth is the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. If this pageant is properly presented it will not be all show and glamor, but underneath will be the mighty truths upon which this nation was conceived and brought into being by those states who dared to stand forth in the face of gigantic odds for the future liberty of a great nation.

It looks today as if the great state of Iowa had nominated Senator Brookhart in place of Senator Cummins at the primary held yesterday. This was not a vote on the relative merits of the two men but rather a denunciation of the action taken by the United States in unseating Brookhart. There is no one but believes that Senator Cummins is a much abler man than Brookhart but because of the insult offered this state in unseating their choice for the senate they have re-acted and perhaps elected a man who is much less able to represent the state than Senator Cummins. This, however, is only a denunciation and the people may speak again in the general elections this fall and say, "We will have none of these," and elect a real choice of the people in some other party representative. We cannot help but feel somewhat concerned for such an able statesman as Senator Cummins, but such is politics and he perhaps will render a greater service in some private field of adventure.

THE GENIUS FOR TAKING PAINS

A little pocket notebook belonging to Charles Dickens came to light the other day which furnishes an interesting sidelight on the genius of England's greatest novelist. That little notebook contained nothing but names, Erasures, changes, variations indicated the evolution through which the names of Dickens' characters went before they emerged on the printed page in startling suggestiveness. No name was right for Charles Dickens until it was perfect.

Herbert Kaufmann, one of America's greatest editorial writers, especially noted for his brief, punchy sentences writes and rewrites every article a dozen times or more. An article which is to include not more than six hundred words in its final form will appear in six thousand words in the first draft. Each rewriting thereafter consists of the elimination of waste words. The final article is the quintessence of eleven longer ones which preceded it. Elbert Hubbard once said of Robert Louis Stevenson, "He never used a synonym." If he could not find the right word he waited until it was found. No sentence ever went to the printer which did not express exactly what Stevenson intended it should express.

Irvin Cobb, America's inimitable humorist, is one of the most painstaking workers of all our modern writers. His free and easy style is studied out with scrupulous care. He once spent three days in the New York public library hunting for one word to complete a story. Nothing but the right word would do.

"It is only a trifle," says the amateur or the second-rater. "A trifle can ruin perfection," says the trained worker with conscience and experience.

Not every man can be brilliant, but any man can be accurate and there is no genius finer than the genius for accuracy.

New York City.—An expression of the intense antipathy of the younger generation is the new American crawl stroke, in swimming, says Josephine Guerin, famous swimmer and high diver. The crawl, like the breast stroke, of which Miss Guerin works for readers of this paper, is more effective exercise when done in pools. But while the breast stroke goes best to a wall, the crawl is an aquatic foot-race. Says Miss Guerin, "Time the six-pence and banjo for, 'When I Think of You,' or put a record on the victor in the water's edge, then—take your position—'Hankle claw in front, palms down, both legs extended straight out behind you.' 'Tummy Struggle: Breathe, hand straight, pull down to the body. 'Step up Strokers: Throw arm over the level of the water, slightly bending the elbow.' 'Tummy Struggle: Blow the arm out straight in air, keeping the arms straight with the palm down on a level with the shoulder. As the right hand comes to 'be level of the left hand, start down stroke with the left hand. 'Breathing for the crawl is on every other beat.'"

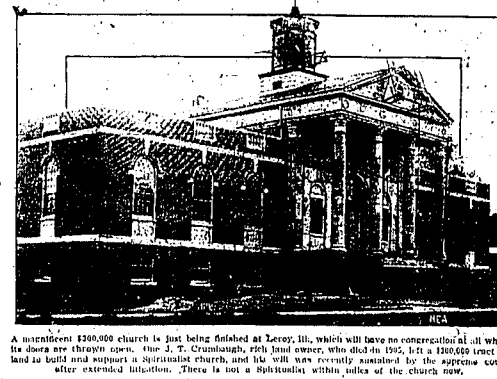
