Twin Falls Shows Best Record in Large Herd Test in Medium Herd and Highest in Small Herd, as Reported in Report of Official Tester.

The report of the Pioneer Concentration Association for May, just completed by W. J. Izyne, shows 95 cows in 28 herds. A total of 115 cwt. of milk were produced on 40 pounds of feed at each. The total average pounds of milk was 912.5 and butterfat 23.2. The high herd in the large herd class was made up of registered and grade Holsteins and owned by L. J. Trenchard, of Twin Falls, with an average of 116.5 pounds of milk; 45.1 lb. of butterfat. There are 27 cows in the herd. In the medium herd herds, the highest registered and grade Holsteins of J. R. Long of Butte gave an average of 110.1 milk and 46.5 of butterfat. The small herd champions were the four grade Jerseys of W. F. Hanson, with an average of 104.2 of milk and 46.5 of butterfat.
